This contract was awarded to a Breckenridge painter when we have here one of the best sign painters in Texas, Harry P. Schaefer, who is not only a sign painter, but an artist. As a scenic painter it is doubtful if he has a superior in the state, and had he been given this contract the money he would have received would have remained in Cisco. Like money spent with mail order houses, it will help to boost the circulating medium in Breckenridge.

The Citizen does not know the reason for giving this job to an out of town man, but we presume it was at a slight saving, still we hardly believe this justifies turning down the bid of a home man for an outsider.

This method is one of the best means to hasten the demise of a community.

City Commission Plan Auxiliary Facilities To Insure City Water

Mr. P. W. Campbell and J. T. McCarty, of Abilene offices of the West Texas Utilities Co., were in Cisco Tuesday evening, and discussed with the commission the installation of additional pumping facilities at Lake Cisco.

It is possible that some reserve facilities should be installed to insure Cisco adequate water supply in case of accident, but the most essential steps that could be made to this end would be to place someone in charge of the pumping plant who understands the machinery, and knows how to keep it in order. The pump at Lake Cisco is the same that was there when Jesse Penn had charge of the plant, and there was no complaint of a lack of water. Mr. Penn told the Citizen that the pump is still practically new, yet there is insufficient pressure to cope with a fire of consequence, and it is said that there are three men on the job to do the work that was efficiently done by the former pumper. Penn said that he could take the job and guarantee ample water supply with the same facilities we now have. Inefficiency is a costly vehicle. But the tax payers pay the cost. Politics must be served.

Britain Had Benefit of No Bond Money as He Went Into Office

Birt Britain, who for four terms was commissioner for precinct No. 4, authorizes the Citizen to place his name before the people as a candidate for this office in the coming primaries, July 28. While commissioner Mr. Britain served his precinct, and the county, in an efficient and faithful manner, being one of the leading members of the court, who by reason of his valuable experience, his advice and counsel was sought by other members of the board on all important matters that came before the court.

He was always loyal and manifested the greatest courtesy toward all who had business with the court, especially those of his own precinct. There was no long waits for business visitors as he was noted for making it convenient to give all visitors a hearing to state their business as soon as possible.

Most of his constituents are familiar with the accomplishments Britain achieved during his administration. A system of county and lateral roads were builded during his administration that are second to none in the state, but his major achievement was the completion of highway 23, north of Cisco, a project long neglected, as it seemed impossible to get the state highway department to take it over and complete it so that Cisco could have adequate traffic facilities for that trade territory north of this city. In accomplishing the results he had achieved he had no benefit of the bond sales, but had to rely exclusively on the proceeds of the road and bridge funds, with the exception of his pro-rata portion of the money recovered through the courts on the road bonds previously sold, he says.

County and Precinct Bankrupt
"Much has been said about the finances of the precinct during my tenure of office as commissioner of precinct No. 4," Mr. Britain says in his formal announcement as a candidate for commissioner. "To those who have claimed that there was plenty of funds to the credit of the precinct when I went into office, I want to say that at that time the county and precinct both were practically bankrupt, and there were no county roads. During my eight years as your commissioner I builded and maintained a system of county and lateral roads that are second to none in the state, and this was done only with the road and bridge fund at my disposal. In addition during my first six years in office we accumulated a surplus of thirty odd thousand dollars to the credit of this precinct. This surplus was consumed in the construction of highway 23, from Cisco north. This highway was builded out of monies from the road and bridge fund, without a penny of extra taxes to the people, and turned over to the state for designation and maintenance. This work was done by day labor, under my supervision, and the money left in Eastland county. This road was completed at a saving of over \$13,000 under the lowest contract bid.

"Another project that I am proud to name is the Leeray cut-off. At the close of my fourth term, with the splendid cooperation of the people of Cisco and members of the commissioners court, we were enabled to induce the highway commission to take over and designate this road as a state highway for completion and maintenance. Already considerable work has been done, and I am advised that the construction will be rushed to completion as fast as funds are available.

"When I went into office there were pending in the courts claims for right-of-ways, which were later reduced to judgments, which were paid off by the commissioners court while I was in office.

"I never served as your commissioner during the time of the bond issues, therefore, did not have the benefit of any bond monies during my tenure of office. All the funds at my disposal were derived from the road and bridge

Auditor of Eastland County Fatally Hurt In Automobile Crash

Friends of the deceased experienced a severe shock when the news reached Cisco Sunday evening that W. S. Michael had been fatally injured in an automobile collision. This shock was intensified when two hours later reports stated that he had died of the hurts he sustained, about 7 o'clock Sunday evening in an auto collision at a road intersection about two miles north of Romney. Others hurt in this auto crash were Mrs. Ruby Miller and Freddie Michael, 10 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Michael. Reports from the hospital Thursday stated that Mrs. Miller was responding to the treatment nicely, and that Freddie Michael had so far recovered that she was able to leave the hospital for her home in Eastland Tuesday.

The collision occurred just after the car containing Mr. W. S. Michael, auditor of Eastland county, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Michael and their daughter, Freddie Michael, had driven onto the Rising Star highway, and was caused by being struck by another car driven by W. R. Eudy. Riding in the Eudy car besides Eudy was Mrs. Ruby Miller and her two children. None were seriously hurt other than Mr. Michael, Freddie Michael and Mrs. Miller. These three were taken to the Graham Sanitarium for treatment, where Mr. Michael succumbed to his injuries about 9 o'clock Sunday evening. Eudy's injuries consisted of a broken collar bone, which, after receiving surgical treatment, he was able to return to his home.

The body of Mr. Michael was taken to his home in Eastland where his funeral was held at the Methodist church Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with interment in the Eastland cemetery, under the auspices of the Cisco Commandery No. 47, with which order he was affiliated. A Knights Templar escort from Cisco Commandery accompanied the body from the church to the cemetery.

Mr. Michael was one of the best known citizens of Eastland county, and was a man of impeccable character, who was held in the highest esteem

Thompson Leaves Cisco's Gas Rate As It Stands Now

Wednesday Railroad Commissioner E. O. Thompson delivered the decision in Cisco's gas rate case, which was pending before the railroad commission. The issue was on the ordinance passed by the city commission, fixing the gas rate, which was adopted by the commission after Mr. Chester May had applied for a rate of \$1.60 per 1000 feet.

The decision is a disappointment to Cisco people, as we believed that Thompson would be as fair with Cisco, as he was with his own city of Amarillo. It was Thompson, while mayor of that city, who forced the gas company to give a rate of 27 cents. To be consistent he should have the gas company file an application to raise the Amarillo rate, and restore the rate to a parity with that which he has established for Cisco. The physical conditions of the two cities are not dissimilar. Both are situated in the largest gas fields in Texas. Surely if Amarillo is entitled to a 27 cent rate, Cisco's 50 cent rate is not unreasonable.

True, the present rate the Community Natural Hijackers are charging Cisco is not exorbitant, and had the Hijackers been content to let the rate remain at this figure little complaint would have been made.

But it seems Thompson has been "pizened" since rubbing shoulders with the big monied class. At least Cisco people are of the opinion that Thompson, for whom they voted almost to a man, from whom they expected relief, has "taken the shilling" and betrayed his friends. And his decision furnishes grounds to justify this belief. The Citizen is not advised whether the city will appeal from Thompson's ruling.

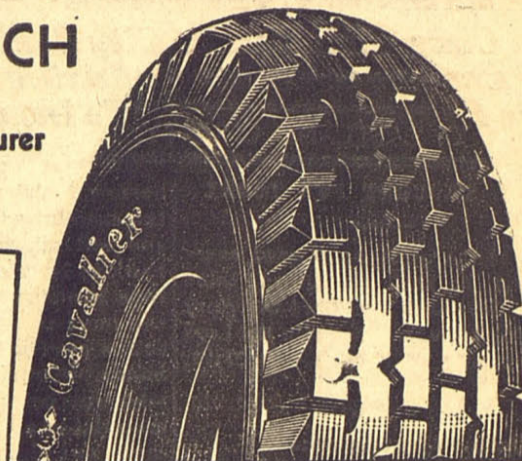

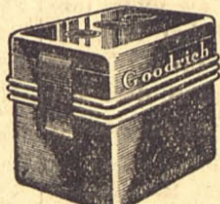

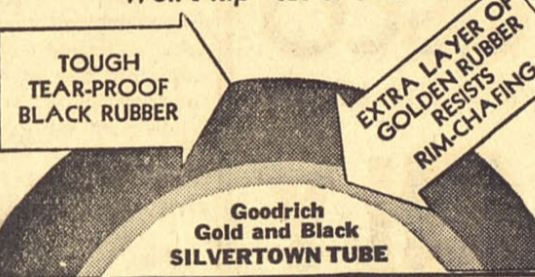

Some of them who have been given fat offices and have no opposition, seem not to appreciate the fact that the newspapers have not attempted to bring out an opposing candidate, so, they have decided to save the announcement fees from their easily earned jobs, and ignore the county press. Probably they may be candidates again next year, and the newspaper who gives them complimentary notices, or fails to remember their attitude in the 1934 campaign, is just simple. Time gives everyone his break, and two years hence conditions may be quite different. However, it won't do any harm for those tight-fisted candidates to read the following from Boyce House, in last Sunday's paper.

"A group of canddates for office in Blank County seem to be making their race on the half shell order. Their names do not appear in the announcement column of the county papers. Lotief Announces For Second Term as 107th Floterial Candidate

In making my announcement for re-election to a second term as your representative from the 107th district; permit me to say, in the beginning, that with a feeling of deepest sincerity and fullest appreciation of you as my friend and supporter, I have enjoyed serving you. It has been a great privilege, as well as an honor, to be your representative and serve on five important committees in the house I have always had the interest of the masses in mind and every vote that I cast was for you and not for the monopolies and the special interests.

Practice Economy

The records will show that I have offered more economic amendments to the appropriation bills of the state departments and institutions than any other member of the 43rd legislature. By so doing, many hundreds of thousands of dollars have been saved the Texas tax payers. In one amendment to the Teachers Summer School bill I saved \$187,375. I mention this only in order that you may know I have never slept at my post of duty, but have always worked for honesty, economy and my friends at home who depend on me to look after their interests.

I was one of the leaders who fought the paid lobbyists of the special interests. I introduced and passed through the house the first resolution of its kind in the Texas legislature, requiring lobbyists to register their names, and by whom employed, with the chief clerk of the house. I was also author of the public utility bill which was passed by the house but killed in the senate. This bill alone would have saved utility consumers and housewives in Texas over six million dollars a year. I was also author of the house resolution which prohibited the heads of different state departments from evading the nepotism law, which prohibited the appropriation of any money for those who evade the laws of our state. This alone created more talk and interest than any other bill during the entire session of the 43rd legislature. I was co-author of the Rollins-Lotief et al, auto registration fee which placed the flat rate of \$6.00 on each automobile, regardless of size. This passed the house but was slaughtered in the senate, as usual. I was also author of the amendment to H. B. No. 733 placing gas pipe companies under the tangible asset tax; this alone would have placed two millions of dollars in the treasury. I worked and voted for the Moratorium bill and the deficiency judgments bill, which are now laws.

Author of Bills

I was the author of House Resolution requiring each member of the house to state, on oath, his connection with any corporation or anyone seeking special favors from the legislature. This resolution made it possible for the people of Texas to know who their representatives are and what connection they have with the special interests, if any.

I favor and will support an old age pension bill, but limit the beneficiaries to Texas pioneers. I would not favor a bill that would permit other states dumping their aged persons on Texas taxpayers.

I worked for and helped pass the rural school aid bill, which added \$6,000,000 for the maintenance of the rural schools.

I believe we should have a law on our statutes prohibiting state representatives from accepting retainer fees from corporations. SHOULD GOVERNMENT PAY INTEREST?

Public sentiment is fast crystallizing against the federal government's policy of issuing interest bearing bonds, thus constituting and fostering a capitalistic monopoly that means peonage to the American people. The Citizen editor has contributed its limited influence against this policy, and heretofore have stood practically alone in opposing the government issuing tax exempt bonds, paying wall street bankers vast sums in interest, and permitting them to usurp the functions of government by issuing money. The federal constitution expressly stipulates that the "congress has the authority to issue money and regulate the value thereof." The latter provision has been recognized by the Roosevelt administration in devaluating the American dollar, but seems to still think it is necessary to delegate to Wall street the authority to issue the nation's currency. Had I been in the white house I would have insisted that the treasury department issue currency to the extent of the country's resources, and retire every federal interest-bearing bond this currency would buy. This would have forced the holders of interest-bearing, non-taxable bonds to take American currency, and if they wanted interest on their money to invest it in legitimate business, which would mean employment of idle labor.

While the Citizen has stood alone heretofore, we are getting into some pretty decent company recently.

Thos. A. Edison, when recommending the government developing Muscle Shoals, was asked if he favored the government borrowing the thirty million dollars necessary to develop and operate this great water power? His answer was:

"No; why should the government

borrow its own credit? If it issues tax-exempt interest-bearing bonds and sell the bonds to Wall street bankers to get the money, by the time bonds are paid the banker will have collected as much interest as the government received on the bonds. In other words, the bankers who will not furnish a nunc of material or a lick of labor will get as much out of it as those who do the work and furnish the material." Mr. Edison also said at the same time: "Any government that can issue a dollar bond, interest bearing, that is good can issue a dollar bill, noninterest bearing, that is good, the only difference is the bill is easier to redeem because it does not draw interest." No one can answer Mr. Edison's argument.

Another opponent of this insane policy of the government "borrowing its own credit" is the Philadelphia Record, which opposes the refunding of liberty bonds and short term treasury notes, which it says is "offering a premium to the bankers to hoard wealth, at the rate of forty million a year in interest, is the price the government is paying for the privilege of handing the bankers this subsidy."

But it will not be many years before the people will become alive and demand that these tax-exempt non-interest bearing bonds be called in, and the government resume its constitutional function of issuing its own money, instead of farming it out to the bankers, and paying them to do the job.

WOODWARD UTILITY "RETAINER"

Walter Woodward, senator of the Coleman district, now a candidate for attorney general, is charged by his opponent, William McCraw, as being an attorney for the Lone Star Gas Grabbers, the company that would impose a rate of \$1.00 per 1000 on Cisco gas consumers, and the company the attorney general may have to prosecute in the trials now pending in the courts. Woodward says he "just represented a little home gas company," but McCraw shows by the records that the "little home business" is a subsidiary of the gas grabbers, the same as the Community Natural Hijackers are the unholy spawn of this conscienceless monopoly. Surely it would be nice to be prosecuted by one of the Lone Star's "retainers." It is probably true that the Lone Star is financing Woodward's campaign. If this be true Texas will be without a state's attorney in its effort to give the people relief from the greed of monopolistic utilities, such as the Lone Star Gas Grabbers and its unholy offspring, the Community Natural Hijackers, have attempted to inflict upon the people of Cisco,

According to the record given by

McCraw the vice president and director of the Coleman Gas and Oil Co., the "little concern" that employs Senator Woodward, is R. A. Crawford, of Dallas. This record also shows that R. A. Crawford is vice president and director of the Lone Star Gas Grabbers; also vice president and director of the Lone Star Gasoline Co.; also vice president and director of the Council Bluffs Gas Co.; also a director in Coos Bay Gas Co., the County Gas Co., the Dallas Gas Co., the Galveston Gas Service, the Galveston Gas Shares, Inc., the Northwest Cities Gas Co. and Stamford and Western Gas Company. Now, wouldn't that be nice if the attorney general of Texas should be the "retainer" of this bunch of utility pirates, than whom a more piratical crew never "slit a throat or scudded a ship."

Many will remember that it was Senator Walter Woodward who represented the "little concern" that attempted to prevent the town of Santa Anna from installing its own gas plant when the Coleman concern was supplying Santa Anna gas. This was while he was senator, sworn to represent the people of his district, that he appeared in

court as the hiring of the most conscienceless enemy his constituents ever had. Santa Anna is in the district Woodward represented. If he will desert his constituents in his own district, and represent a monopoly in its attempt to prevent a community—neighbor to his home town—from getting relief from the piratical practices of the "little concern," which is a subsidiary of the Lone Star Gas Grabbers, what may we expect when the state of Texas is prosecuting the father of all these illegitimate spawns of pre-nuptial assignments?

As McCraw points out: "The State is now engaged in a great court fight with the Lone Star Gas Corporation. Upon the outcome of this court fight depends the struggle of more than 250 Texas cities and towns to get gas rate reductions."

The newspapers of the state, as well as those who might be benefited by the publication of notices in probate matters, have a reason for opposing Senator Woodward's candidacy for attorney general. It was he who introduced a bill to repeal Senate Bill No. 30 in 1929, which required the printing of all matters in probate. It was at the instance of Senator Woodward

that this bill was repealed. No. He was not acting as a "retainer" then, but as a tricky attorney who desired to suppress publication of all legal matters to prevent contests. Attorneys want to get their cases through without publicity if possible, and if legal notices are published in papers with general circulation, somebody might contest the proceedings.

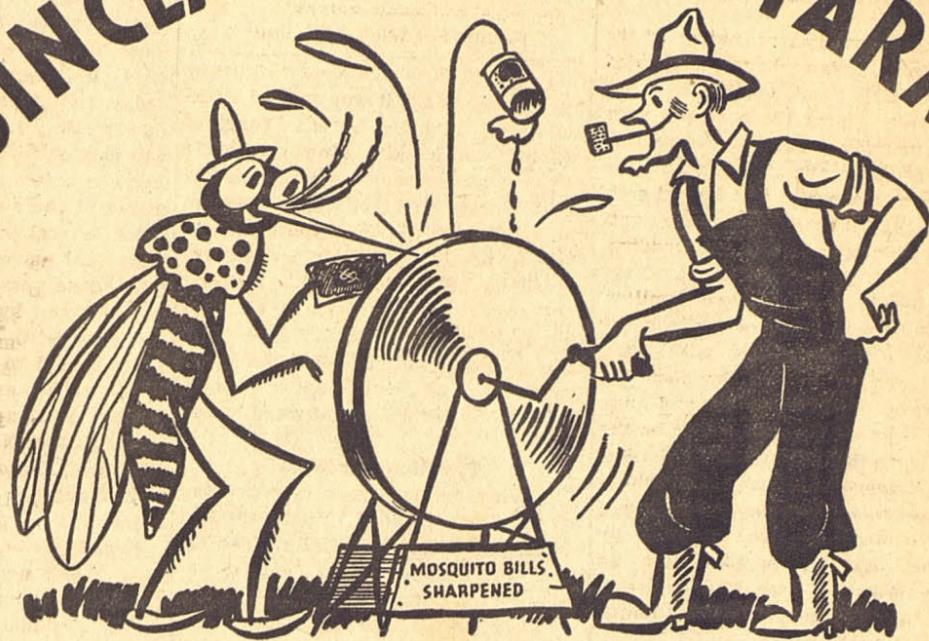

Members of the Church of God enjoyed an ice cream supper last Friday night. Everyone had a nice time and plenty of fun.

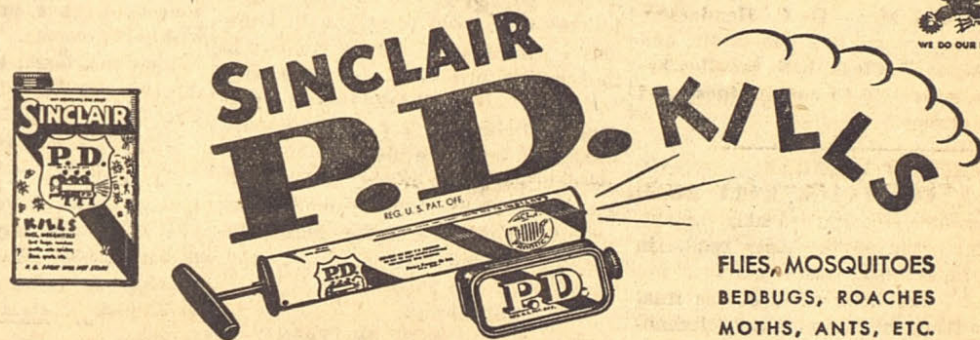

Britain Had Benefit of No Bond Money as He Went Into Office

fund. So if there was plenty of money for building roads it was created without extra taxation by the court of which I was a part. However, while I was commissioner a portion of the bond money was recovered through the courts, which was apportioned to the four precincts, and my precinct received its proportion of this money.

"I wish to call attention to the fact that during my tenure of office not a dime of bonds were added to our taxes except the new court house bonds, which were instigated and voted by the people.

Tax Rate Reduced

"During my last year in office the tax rate was reduced 10 per cent and valuations were materially lowered, as it was the aim of the court to reduce the tax burden to the minimum.

"When I went into office there was turned over to me road machinery and equipment of a valuation of about \$1,000. I equipped the precinct with ample machinery to build roads, at a cost of approximately \$21,000, all of which was paid for with the exception of \$8,000 due in 1933 and 1934. This balance was wiped out by the present court. Much of the machinery and equipment I was forced to buy as it was required in constructing highway 23.

"Had I been your commissioner at this time I feel that my experience would have enabled me to have materially assisted in a more equitable administration of the CWA funds. We never know when an emergency may arrive.

"I want to assure each and every citizen of precinct No. 4 that I sincerely appreciate the honor you have conferred upon me in the past, for which I thank you, and want you to know that I will appreciate your support in the coming primaries. I hope each and every voter will take this as a personal solicitation for your support, whether I have the pleasure of meeting you in person or not, and if I am again chosen as your commissioner you can be assured of the same faithful and efficient service I have rendered you in the past.
