## AUTOMOBILE **PLANTS OPEN AT DETROIT**

## Ford Plant and Other Large Factories Increase Forces


DETROIT, Jan. 12. — The hum of industry, muted in this city for months, was heard again today as thousands of men returned to work in automobile plants.

Street car equipment, long idle, was put in service to care for the extra thousands who made their way to the River Rogue plant of the Ford Motor company and other big centers of manufacture.

Only old employes were taken back. Others had been warned it would be needless to apply, but many of the jobless came to the plants anyway, hopeful that some change might throw a job their

At the Ford plant the force was boosted to 75,000 today, within 10,-000 of normal. At the various Chevrolet plants more than 32,000 men were at work, with the number expected to reach 40,000 by the end of the month. Cadillac had a nor-mal force of 6,000 at work, and 10,000 men were employed in the Hudson and Essex plants. Others reported increased payrolls. The upswing was felt outside of

Detroit, too. The Ford company announced that in its branches over the country 32,000 men would be at work today. At Flint the Buick plant had a payroll of 13,500. Body manufacturers, and makers of countless products used by the motor industry were expected to have to speed up production to keep pace with the demands of the car build-

### Apparently Hopeless Watch Kept During Fierce Game

HORTA, Azores, Jan. 12.—A strong "northeaster," bringing stormy weather and vicious winds, whipped over the Azores today while an apparently hopeless watch was kept for a man and a woman who had challenged the Atlantic on a flight of 2,000 miles from Bermuda to Azores.

Anxiety that had mounted during the hours in which Mrs. Berle Hart and Lieut. William S. Mac-Laren were not heard from in their white seaplane Tradewind, turned to a faint hope that they might have missed their mark, a small group of islands in the ocean, and continued to the safety of the European coast. But no word of their progress reached Paris, their ultimate destination, and ships east of the Azores had not reported sighting their plane. Left Saturday

The Tradewind left Hamilton Bermuda, at 11:15 a. m. Saturday. The fliers were 24 hours overdue here at 7 a. m. today. Unless they landed at sea and were picked up by a ship without wireless, it was feared that Mrs. Hart and her co-pilot and navigator might have become victims of the storm **STRAUSS DIES** that lashed the Azores and sent giant breakers crashing through

# CHALLENGE AUTHORITIES

"Before I'm Through, They'll Be Glad to Quit," She Says

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.--A determined mother who contends that her "fighting" son couldn't have committed murder "because he was afraid of guns" issued a challenge today to authorities preparing to take Leo V, Brothers from his secret prison to charge him openly with the slaying of Alfred Lingle.

"They have me to deal with now and before I'm through with them they'll be glad to quit," de-clared Mrs. Cordell Jessen, 47, St. Louis, who has come here to fight for the life of Brothers, her son. "Leo was a fighter, but not a killer ,and he never was a crook,' she declared hotly in defense of the tall athletic blonde whom Detective Pat Roche says is "the toughest man on earth" and whom State's Attorney John A. Swanson accuses of committing Chicago's most sensational gang murder. Brothers also is wanted in St. Louis, his home town, on a murder charge.

"The man who committed that murder in St. Louis was a friend of Leo's," explained Mrs. Jessen. "If he hadn't died so suddenly of pneumonia he would have confessed and cleared Leo. And Leo didn't tell me that either. I found it out.

DALLAS, Jan. 12. - Police and detectives today sought the attack-Car Belonging to er of H. Grady Todd, 32, Canton (Texas) bakery proprietor, who fought a losing battle with a masked bandit in an effort to protect his woman companion.

Todd was shot through the left thigh and severely beaten with the butt of the bandit's pistol. He was left unconscious on a lonely road two miles east of here after being robbed of a watch, stickpin, and nearly \$40 in cash.

Mrs. Alice Kellis, 27, Canton, Todd's companion, was struck a glancing blow with the bandit's weapon. While Todd and the bandit grappled, Mrs. Kellis hailed two pasing motorists who refused to intervene. After Todd recovered consiousness, he limped to a nearby house where an ambulance was summoned. At Baylor university hospital he was said to be in a serious condition.
