## THREATS ARE REPORTED IN **RANSOM NOTE**

United Press Staff Correspondent HOPEWELL, N. J., March 14. — The law began the 13th day of its futile hunt for the kidnaped Lindbergh baby with new plans drawn up in a conference of all police agencies cooperating in the search The conference was called by Col. Lindbergh himself Sunday afternoon. It followed 12 days of polic and private undercover work which so far has failed to disclose "any definite information of a concrete nature leading to solution of the

A person in the small group with access to the kidnaping ransom note told the United Press today that the document contained threats against the baby and likewise threats against the family should they communicate with police or "a living soul."

This same informant had previ-ously advised the United Press that finger and foot prints left in the nursery showed two men did the actual kidnaping two weeks ago to-

The United Press cannot vouch on its own information for the accuracy of the statement as threats but its informant is a man of high standing in a position to know whereof he speaks.


