Gibbens assisted Rep. Barnes in his bid for the Speakership and entered a rules change resolution which carried, giving the new speaker broad appointment power.

Mr. Elliott, speaking after that the CofC executive committee will meet in the near future to begin mapping a program of work for 1965. He urged support of the CofC, noting that there are many opportunities for service and a great deal can come from serving on committees in work programs.

Gene Abbott, a director of the CofC and a former president, gave a report on the hospital project. He said the matter now is waiting for enabling legislation that is expected soon from the Legislature. All of Eastland County Farmers Unions resolutions were passed by the State Board or Directors at the State Convention which was held in November, according to President Claude Fuller. Some of these resolutions

1. The Union is opposed to making any changes in the peanut program which would cause marketing quotas to be stated in terms of pounds and

2. The Union recommends that a research program between the USDA, State Expeiment Station, and growers be initiated, which will emphasize efforts to remedy se ious peanut production diseases and to improve peanut harvesting methods.

3. Recommends that the Agricultural research Service, USDA, State Department of Agriculture and the State Experiment Station work cooperatively toward more uniform methods of te ting seed germination, and that more effective ways of supervising and controlling these tests be established.

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
