One of the questions on this report is: "Do you expect to earn over \$1200 in 1965?" If so, you show your expected total

earnings for 1965. Many times the estimate shown in January or February is not high enough when a second look is taken in midyear. If you then think your actual earnings will be more than you at first anticipated, you should get in touch with your social security office. Someone there will be glad to help you revise your esti-

You may find that you have already received more benefits than you will be entitled to get for the year and are overpaid. The adjustment of this overpayment need not be made until after the end of the year when you make your next annual report.






