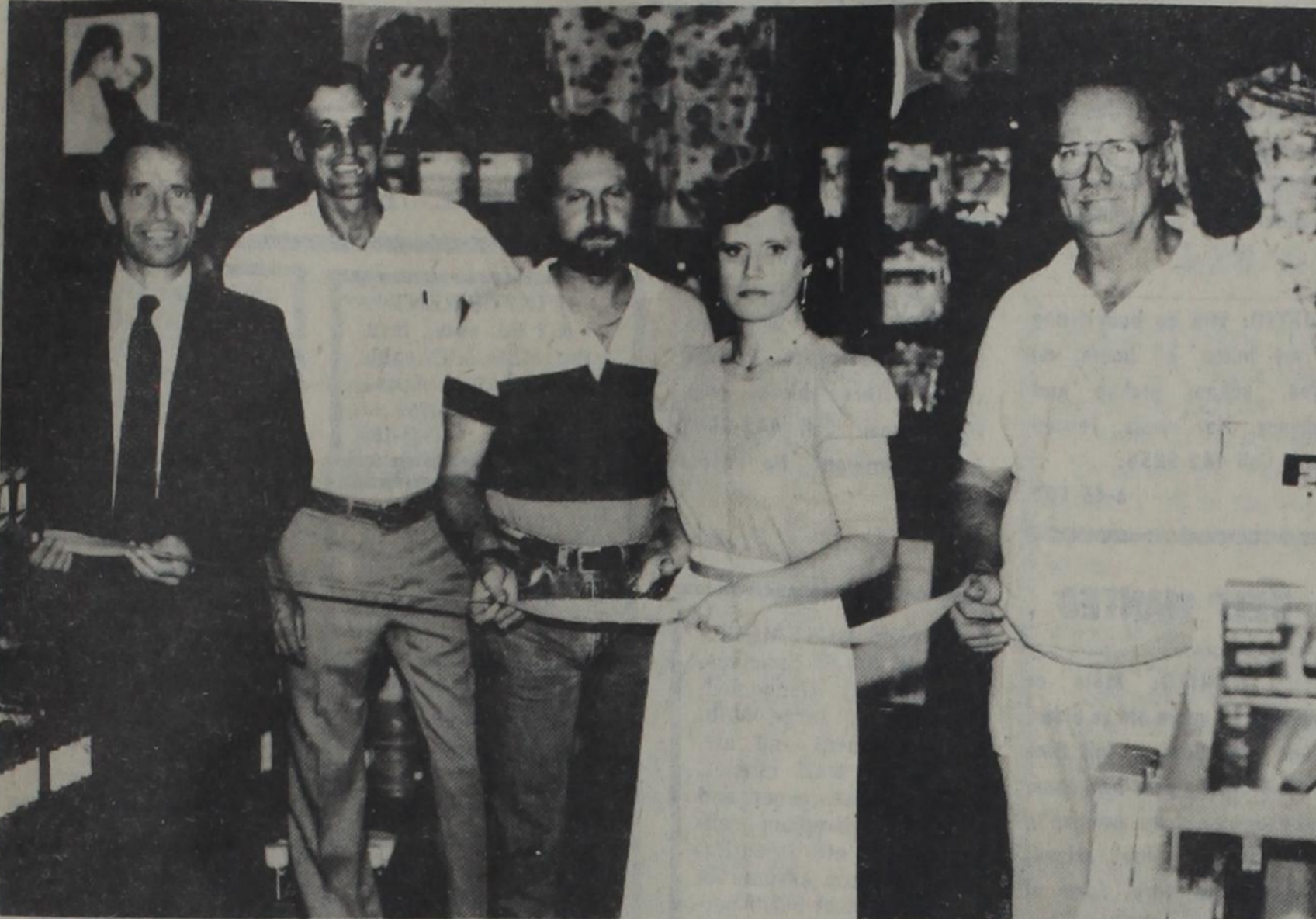


Grand Opening Held Saturday

More Revenue And Less Expenses Face City Budget

More revenue and less expenses will be the main object of the City of Cisco's proposed budget for the next fiscal year beginning in October, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

The council will approve the final draft of the proposed budget at their meetings in September.

City Manager Moore said he has been instructed by the council to tighten up on all expenses in every department. Some of those expenses are fixed and cannot be changed, he said.

The council has also instructed Mr. Moore to reconsider his original draft of the proposed budget and add in some additional revenue from three different areas. Mr. Moore's original draft called for a projected revenue in the General Fund of \$929,200, with projected expenses of \$1,052,360, for a total deficit of \$123,160. The General Fund includes administration, police, fire, street, shop, and sanitation departments of the city.

Mr. Moore projected income for the Utility Fund at \$598,750, with expenses at \$641,625, for a total deficit of \$42,875. The Utility Fund includes the water department, wastewater department, and utility billing department.

In order to generate more revenue, the city is being forced to look at three different areas: (1) A tax increase for citizens; (2) Increase sanitation rates; and (3) Alter the city's policy for the spending of oil and gas royalty revenue.

For the city to expect to collect the same amount of taxes as they did last year, County Tax Assessor Steve Thomas recommended to the city that their effective tax rate would be .53479 cents per \$100 evaluation. The city is planning to up that amount three percent to .55 cents per \$100 evaluation. This increase will generate approximately \$8,150 gross dollars.

Mr. Moore said the city did not want to raise taxes this year because they did not want to increase the economic burden on the citizens. However, Mr. Moore stated if the economic situation in Cisco does not improve by next year, the council may be looking at a substantial increase in taxes.

Over the past three years, the council has tried to hold tax increases to a minimum with only a six percent increase during that time. That averages out to a two percent increase per year.

To generate approximately \$19,000 in additional revenue the city is proposing to increase sanitation rates one dollar per customer per month. Mr. Moore said that new rate will probably become effective in time for the October billings.

Mr. Moore said the city feels the sanitation department should at least break even in a city and the citizens should pay what it costs the city to pick up and dispose of their garbage. During the past two years, the City of Cisco has lost money in its sanitation department.

In the final area the city is looking at for added revenue, Mr. Moore said Cisco has always used all of its oil and gas royalty revenue to pay for capital expenses; however, they are now considering using a portion of that money for the operation of the city.

Mr. Moore said under the new plan, if the city receives its projected \$150,000 oil and gas revenue, \$100,000 will be

budgeted for operation and maintenance of the city. The remaining \$50,000 will remain in the fund for capital expenses and street paving.

The \$100,000 budgeted for city operation will be divided into two parts: \$75,000 for assundry costs and \$25,000 for street improvements.

Another area of concern for the city is the apparent loss of revenue sharing for cities. Mr. Moore said there is nothing definite being said about revenue sharing for the next year, but from all indications there will be no revenue sharing funds.

Cisco has always budgeted such funds for the purchase of vehicles, equipment, and material. Mr. Moore said city equipment will still have to be replaced as needed, but

now the burden will be on the city's budget.

The city usually received approximately \$60,000 from revenue sharing during a year. Mr. Moore said (just for emphasis on how much money that is) in order for the city to replace that much money there would have to be a 23 percent increase in ad valorem taxes.

Another area the city is looking at in regards to tightening up expenses is the passing over of a cost of living increase for city employees. Mr. Moore stresses the area is being studied, but if there is such an increase this year it will probably be a smaller amount than usual and will come about later in the year.

He said the city is reserving judgment on the cost of

living increase until after he presents them with the final draft of the proposed budget. That draft will include the increased revenue from taxes, sanitation, and oil-gas royalty.

Mr. Moore emphasized the council is doing everything it can to hold down the cost to citizens. He said the city is concerned with continuing "its quality and quantity of service as during the past four years."

Mr. Moore stated his appreciation of the city council "for its hard work in regards to having to make difficult decisions on the budget. It can get very difficult when it regards tax increases and employees cost of living raises. It can be a very thankless job."

Registrations Set For Schools Here

Primary School

All new first and second graders will register on Monday, August 19th, from 9:00-11:00 a.m. in Mrs. Webb's room. This will include all children who did not finish

Kindergarten or 1st grade in Cisco. If your child has previously been enrolled in Cisco - moved - and is back again - the shot record and birth certificate are not necessary - these are on file. But all new students need to bring a copy of their immunization records, and second graders need to bring last year's report card (1st grade).

KINDERGARTNERS will register on Wednesday, August 21st from 8:00-11:00 a.m. Your child must be 5 years old on or before September 1st, 1985. Those mothers who came in May need to register their children between 8:00-9:00 a.m. Please come to Mrs. Webb's room. Some of you need to bring additional information - birth certificates or dates of booster shots.

If you did not come to the school (or send information) please wait until 9:00 to come to Mrs. Webb's room to register. Please bring your child's birth certificate (not hospital certificate - that usually has a picture of a hospital on it), and a complete copy of your child's immunization record. A complete record has 3 DPT shots with one after the child's 4th birthday, 3 polio doses with one after the child's 4th birthday, 1 measles, 1 rubella, 1 mump shot (each) or combined into one MHR shot.

All first and second graders will register on Thursday, August 22nd from 9:00-11:00 a.m. Each child already has his/her class assignment, so report to that teacher.

The Kindergarten teachers are: Glenda Denison and TBH; the First grade teachers: Patsy Reynolds, Diane Yowell and Geneva Webb; and the Second grade teachers: Betty Odum, Jeanne Rains, Nell Seider and Rhonda Walker.

Intermediate School

Students in grades 3-6 are to register for school on August 28 at the Intermediate School. Registration will begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 11 a.m.

Students who did not attend Cisco Schools last year are to report to the principal's office to be registered. All other students are asked to report to the homerooms. The

names of students in each homeroom will be posted at each classroom door.

Jr. High & Sr. High

Registration for all grades seven thru twelve will begin Tuesday, August 20th and end Friday, August 23rd.

All students are encouraged to come to the high school during their assigned time and pick up their pre-registration packet so that they will be enrolled in the proper classes when school begins Tuesday, September 3rd.

The drought of 1984 forced Eastland County cattlemen to reduce herds or sell out completely. There have been a lot of estimates of just how many head were sold. Last week we received the 1984 livestock statistics from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Between January 1, 1984 and January 1, 1985 the total of all cows and calves in the county were reduced from 60,000 head to 46,000 head. The first of the year we had 76% as many cows and calves as we had a year earlier. The number of beef cows were reduced from 37,000 to 27,000 during last year. That is a 28% reduction. State wide the cow numbers were reduced only 8% during 1984.

meeting of Texas County Agricultural Agents Association in Austin August 4-7. The purpose of the annual meeting was to engage in discussions relating to key agricultural commodities and professional improvement. Some 400 county agents and guests attending the meeting which was held in the Wyndham Hotel. Key speakers included Congressman Kent Hance, Texas Land Commissioner

Gary Mauro and Texas A&M University System Chancellor Dr. Arthur Hansen. I went on a tour of the 3300 acre Stiles Farm at Thrall. This is a computerized demonstration farm.

Paul Brown of Eastland County received the New Agents Recognition award during the annual meeting.

Tuesday's program featured speakers representing a number of commodity groups. These included Dennis Findley, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service; Ken Horton, Texas Pork Producers Association; Bill Powers, Texas Poultry Federation; and

Ann Anderson, Beef Industry Council. Highlight of the four-day meeting was the "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" banquet on Tuesday evening. Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service Director was the banquet speaker. The agricultural leader from our district receiving the Man of the Year Award was Scott M. Felton of McLennan County.

Peanut harvest is now underway in Eastland County. Dickie Norris of Carbon began digging some early planted peanuts last Wednesday. The peanuts were Pronto variety which mature faster than most varieties. These were pro-

bably not the first peanuts to be dug in the county. Ronnie Love of Chaney usually harvests April planted peanuts by this time. Optimism is still high for a good peanut crop. If Dickie's crop is an indication of the kind of crop we are going to harvest, it should be an excellent one.

The grain sorghum crop could be a very good one also. We harvested a grain variety demonstration on Norman Weiser's place between Cisco and Rising Star last week. The yields were in the area of 2000 to 2500 pounds per acre.

We were disappointed to learn last week that Graslan pellets will no longer be

available for aerial application on private rangeland. This product had proven to be very effective in controlling oak brush on rangeland. Graslan Brush Bullets will continue to be sold for hand application.

Apparently, the decision to discontinue the availability of Graslan for aerial application on private rangeland was a marketing decision. The pellets will continue to be produced and used on Federal lands in Western States. Graslan pellets were a very useful tool for managing certain brush species on rangeland. The lack of availability of this product will certainly affect brush management programs in Eastland County.

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HOMESTEAD HINTS
Good Ideas from the Past • by Donald J. Berg
Setting Fence Posts
From THE CULTIVATOR, 1845
Posts for fences or other purposes, set into the ground, will last double the length of time by being put into the middle of the hole. The space around the post filled with small stones instead of earth, the earth does not come in contact with the post, and air is also admitted into the hole, both of which probably tend to prevent decay. In constructing fences, the earth taken from the hole is placed directly under the line of the fence, thus forming a ridge which is a saving equal to twelve feet of boards in four lengths of fence. The stones should be raised three or four inches around the post above the surface of the ground. The posts will not be very firm at first, but after standing through one winter their firmness will be much increased, and will continue to increase for several years.
A post and rail fence constructed in this way forty-five years since, in the vicinity of Boston, is now standing, with the exception of one post, and will probably stand a dozen years more.

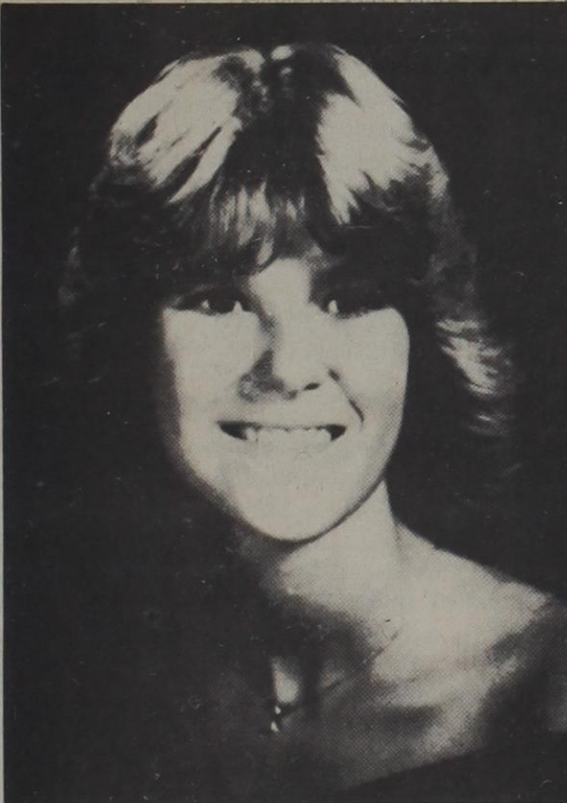

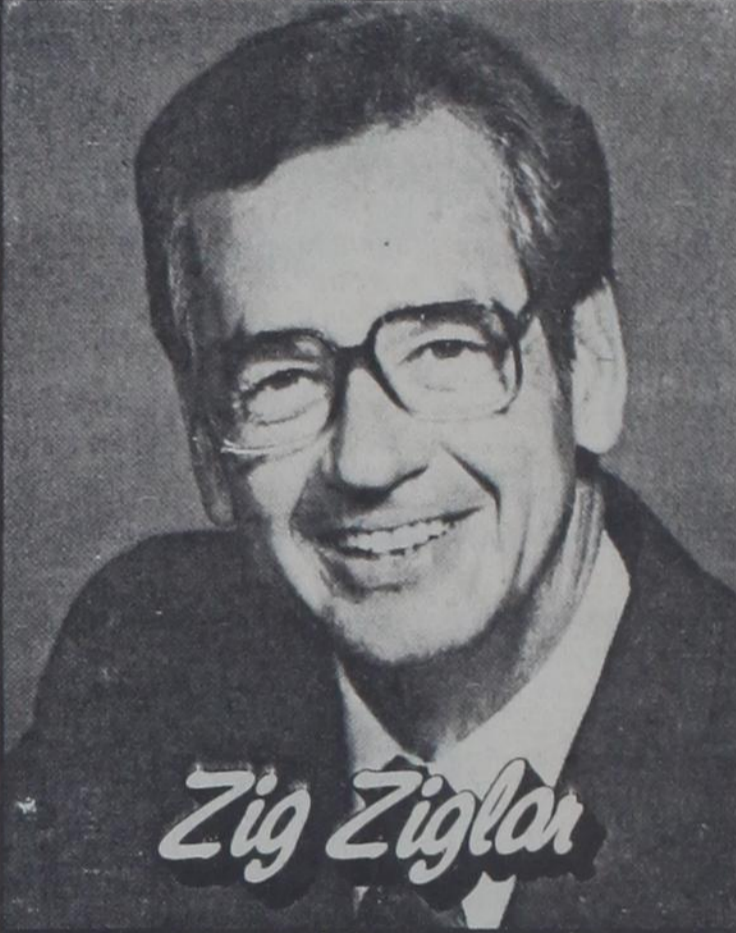

A skating rink has been moved to Rising Star and is now open for business. It is operated by Wayne and Pat Knight, both skating enthusiasts, who drive from Goldthwaite to Rising Star each evening. They hold two skating sessions, 7:30 to 9 p.m. and 9 to 10:30 p.m.

About 900 ft. of East Ross Street, plus 160 ft. of South Mayben St., are being paved by J.J. Finley Construction Co. of Eastland. The cost will be \$7.78 per linear ft. of street. A lot of cooperation between citizens and officials has made this project possible. Residents of Ross Street pledged money to support it, and the Mayor and City Council approved the work and agreed to provide the necessary traffic control during construction. The State Highway Engineer in Eastland, R.P. Haun and staff, provided technical data for the bid proposals and specifications. They will also provide consulting engineer services on the project. 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Sheriff's Budget Upped, Dispatch Budget Discussed, Financing Decisions Made In Commissioners Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners held a Called Meeting Thursday, Aug. 15, to consider revenues and expenditures. They voted to amend the Sheriff's current budget an additional \$30,000, in order to finance the Department until the fiscal year begins Oct. 1. This Department had previously been amended a total of \$24,000.

Among other recommendations was a pay raise for Justice of the Peace Luther Maxwell of Pct. 2 and continued funding of the Eastland County Dispatch, the eight rural Fire Departments, and the Eastland County Tax Appraisal District.

Commissioners present at the meeting were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1; L.T. Owen, Pct. 3; and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The meeting began with mention of a letter from Bob Bullock, in which the State Comptroller set out to define new regulations on the collecting of fees on criminal cases. County Clerk Jo Anne Johnson led out in a discussion on the collection of fees which compensate the victims of crimes.

Judge Bailey spoke briefly on the fixed costs of operating a County Government, and certain agencies which must receive funds. One of these is the Eastland County Tax Appraisal office, which is requesting \$38,344 as the County's part of its operating expenses for the upcoming year.

The Eastland County Dispatch was mentioned, and Commissioner Richard Robinson reported that Dispatcher Mercer, at the request of Cisco City Manager Mike Moore, had prepared three sample budgets, including one which he recommended. This contained a .25 cent per hour pay raise for all employees. If this plan is followed, the County's share of Dispatch funding would be \$1850 per month.

A projection for the County's portion of the Rural Fire Departments was set at \$19,200 for the next year.

New Federal requirements on elections may force Eastland County to set up a different voting system, it was announced. This may include the use of voting machines, explained County

Clerk Jo Anne Johnson. Voting places will also be required to offer access for the handicapped.

Emma Morris, County Auditor, came before the Court with estimated income and expenditures for the year 1985-86.

She said the County could not count on more than a 902 tax collection ratio, which would bring in something over \$1 million additional, she said. When she figured probable expense with this income there was only \$18,000 difference.

"That's cutting it a little too close," the Commissioners said, indicating that unexpected expenses could quickly drain the General Fund.

Sheriff Don Underwood then spoke to the Court, stating that since the last meeting he had met with Auditor Morris.

By averaging the expenses of his department for a number of previous months he concluded that \$30,000 would provide adequate funding until Oct. 1.

Originally he had stated that around \$23,000 would be sufficient, but this larger figure would give some leeway in case of unexpected expenses.

The Sheriff explained that the monthly averaging did not include the two cars purchased from the DPS, or a \$900 air conditioning bill, or a \$2,000 plumbing bill for work on the jail.

Considering the plumbing

job, which was authorized by the Commissioners, he said that he "couldn't see a bit of difference" after the job was finished. (By a company from Abilene).

L.T. Owen made the motion that the Sheriff's current operating budget be amended the \$30,000 he requested. The motion was seconded by Richard Robinson. Motion carried.

It was suggested that the money come out of "General funds - Revenue Sharing - anywhere we can find it."

The Sheriff presented his new budget for 1985-86, and its total was approx. \$385,000. He explained that much of the projected increase was in salaries, extra employees and cars.

He is requesting two more field deputies, cars for them, and one more jail guard.

One plan, which the Sheriff called "Speculation" at this time, would be to put one Deputy in Rising Star and one in Gorman.

The Sheriff discussed different aspects of jail

management, saying that he could not see much saving by cutting down on meat items and then having to feed "more milk and citrus" in their place.

He said he did not feel that \$385,000 was an excessive request, since it was only about \$90,000 above the amount needed to support the department this year.

As the morning session concluded, someone from the office recently vacated by the ASCS rushed out for a

fire extinguisher. Electrical wires had apparently shorted out in the air conditioner. Fortunately the situa-

tion was soon under control, and the County Tax Appraisal personnel could continue the suite.

The Commissioners held an informal meeting in the afternoon, discussing various matters. Sheriff Underwood outlined his views on the new Wage and Hour Laws.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioners Court will be Monday, Aug. 26 at 10 a.m.

Commissioner's Court Has Busy Session

The Eastland Commissioners Court dealt with a variety of topics during their meetings Monday, August 12.

Discussions included the county tax rate, water rights, a missing front-end loader, salaries of personnel in the Sheriff's Department, and many others.

There was mention of a suit filed by an Eastland county resident in Federal Court in Abilene against the County, alleging that the Eastland County jail does not furnish a law library for the use of the prisoners.

The matter has been referred to District Attorney Emory Walton for study. Commissioners indicated that the County would probably need to retain an attorney for the case at the county's expense of course.

Present at the morning and afternoon sessions were Richard Robinson, Commissioner Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent during the morning but present at the afternoon meeting. County Judge Scott Bailey Presided during both sessions.

The first item on the agenda was a request from Ray Richey and Co., represented by Barry White, to cross County Rd. 104 in Pct. 4 with a gas line. This is a little more than three miles north of Cisco off highway 6. The permit was granted.

Another early item on the agenda was listed as a Citizens Information Period. Mrs. Maxine Boney and Mrs. Winnie Pilgrim of Ranger came before the Court and expressed their concerns about some possible land and water use in their area.

These sisters own a ranch about 7 miles north of Ranger, near the Eastland-Sephens County line. "A gentleman from Athens," they said, "has purchased 367 acres of land on two sides of our property."

They stated they had heard-although they had not been able to verify this from the new owner-that he plans to divide the land into 5 acre homesteads and offer it for sale.

The only water available for all these people would be ground water, since the Eastland County Water District is reportedly not taking any more rural households on its lines. Digging numerous wells would deplete the supply for residents already in the area.

"We would like it on record that we are concerned," the ranch women stated. "If the owner of the possible development should appear before the Court requesting County roads or other facilities we would like to be notified so that we can also be heard."

Judge Bailey stated that the Court would take note of their concern, and study the matter.

Cindy Carlton of the Eastland County Fair Association brought a request for the use of the first floor and basement of the Courthouse during the Eastland County Fair on October 5. Exhibits would be set up in the Courthouse on Friday, October 4, and the facility would be used through Saturday evening. The Commissioners gave approval to the plan, subject to a custodian being made available for the building.

Also approved were some adjustments of the line items on the current budget of the County Extension Service. De Marquis Gordon, County Agent, explained this need.

Judge Bailey detailed a request from Tex Evan, Justice of the Peace in Pct. 3, for the use of a surplus air conditioner. After discussions of equipment left behind in the Courthouse ASCS office, Commissioners said it was more feasible for Evans to have the one repaired which he is already using.

The Eastland County Tax Appraisal Office was in the process of moving into the ASCS office. Judge Bailey mentioned several pieces of furniture from the quarters which are being moved into the District Court facility or elsewhere. The Commissioners also discussed some surplus equipment which will be advertised for sale to

the public in the near future. This will include a dump truck, a lawn mower, and other items.

Judge Bailey said that Don Blackburn, an adjuster for the insurance carried by the County, had inspected and photographed the structural damage to the Courthouse. Indications were that this damage was caused or aggravated by the May 24 explosion. A detailed report will be given to the Commissioner's Court on August 26.

Don Underwood, County Sheriff, then came before the Court to discuss the wage-and-hour law and the current pay plan for his department. He stated that in some cases there had been no reimbursement of what the individual "was short last time."

"The gross pay is no longer a factor," he was told. "The pay will depend on the hours the individual works."

The Sheriff said that his employees had agreed to go to work for a certain salary, and that he needed a copy of wage scales that have been adopted, so that he could set hours his staff will work.

He was promised a list of the hourly wage of each employee.

On another matter, the Commissioners brought up the problem of the front-end loader belonging to Pct. 2 which is allegedly being held by a Ranger man in lieu of repair bills. It was again stated that the equipment was repaired without proper bids being advertised and opened.

The Commissioners voted to file suit against the individual in order to have the loader returned to County use. An attempt will also be made to collect damages owed the County for the loss of the grader during the last 2 and one-half years.

After adjournment for lunch, the Commissioners reconvened at 1:15 p.m. Judge Scott Bailey announced the tax rate set by the Eastland County Tax Ap-

praisers Office for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 as a 20.5 cents per \$100 evaluation, a one-cent increase over this year's rate. The Commissioners unanimously adopted the new rate.

Judge Scott Bailey said the County will probably collect around \$900,000 from this source, and more than another \$1 million will have to be raised from fees and other sources in order that

next year's budget can be balanced.

Speaking to the Sheriff and the Commissioners, the Judge stated that the court needed a "Windup budget from the Sheriff-a report on whether the \$23,000 once mentioned would take care of the Department's expenditures until October 1."

"Judge, I don't know for sure," Sheriff Underwood replied. "After I spoke last

time I learned that some of the fee-sharing money was... what we were talking about." He explained that he would need to meet with the Auditor and go over figures for his Department before a definite amount could be set for the remainder of the year.

It was mentioned that funds from current operating expenses of the

Department are being pulled from the budgeted salary funds.

The question was asked: "What happens when these funds are all used up?"

The Sheriff mentioned a current bill on air-conditioning repair, and that he had not yet presented a large plumbing bill. He planned to discuss that with the company making repairs, since he could see no im-

provement after the work was done.

The Commissioners stated that some amount for the current operations of the Sheriff's Department needed to be set up before the August 26 meeting, when it was hoped a budget for the next fiscal year could be resolved.

A called meeting was set for Thursday, August 15

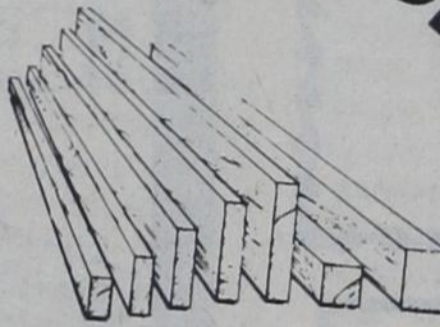

Health Care For Homebound Ill Lost In Eastland County

Health care for the homebound ill in Eastland County suffered a loss with the announcement that Eastland Manor Home Health Agency is being closed by Beverly Enterprises effective Aug. 23.

There are presently some 40 patients who are being helped through the program and as many as 1,000 since the program was begun about two and a half years ago.

The program provided regular visits to the ill, with testing, bandage changing and the many other services that can help a patient recover at home. All was done under doctors' orders.

R.N. Nancy Clark started the program "on a card table" and nurtured it until there are presently 12 on her staff providing services.

All have been terminated effective Aug. 23.

R.N. Clark and her staff are having a last get-together at the Depot Monday at 1 p.m. for lunch.

It has been one of the biggest agencies in Texas, but Beverly is closing all rural agencies and maintaining only those in the metropolises.

Records are being turned over to other service supplies, it was reported.

Director Clark and her staff issued the following letter:

"Letter To The Editor:

"Eastland Manor Home Health Agency has been closed by Beverly Enterprises, effective August 23, 1985. In a time when cut-backs are being made at the Federal levels in providing for quality healthcare of our ill and elderly citizens, this decision is regrettable, but unfortunately it can not be altered. The Nurses, Home Health Aides, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, and office staff of Eastland Manor Home Health provided quality nursing care to the clients in their homes and aided in their return to optimal health. We provided an important, integral service to our community. Therefore, we would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the citizens of Eastland County for their support; all the physicians who utilized our service for your patients and for your cooperation in completing and signing required forms necessary for the

operation of our agency; and the newspaper for publishing stories detailing the services the agency provided our community.

"We would like to especially and publicly thank our co-workers: Nancy Clark, R.N., Director, Beth McCoy, Office Manager, Sherry Henderson, office personnel, Leanna Lindsey, R.N., Cindy Clifton, R.N., Shirley Lindsay, R.N., Wanda Keller, LVN, Linda Graham, LVN, Rhonda Pipkin, LVN, Pat Harris, HHA, Betty Cater, Occupational Therapist, Carol Haire, Speech Therapist.

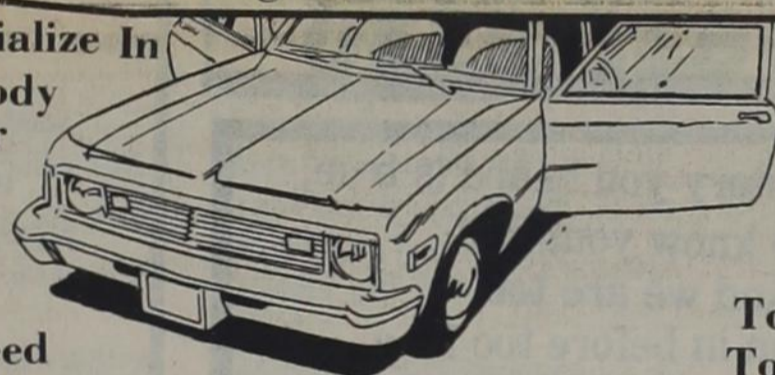

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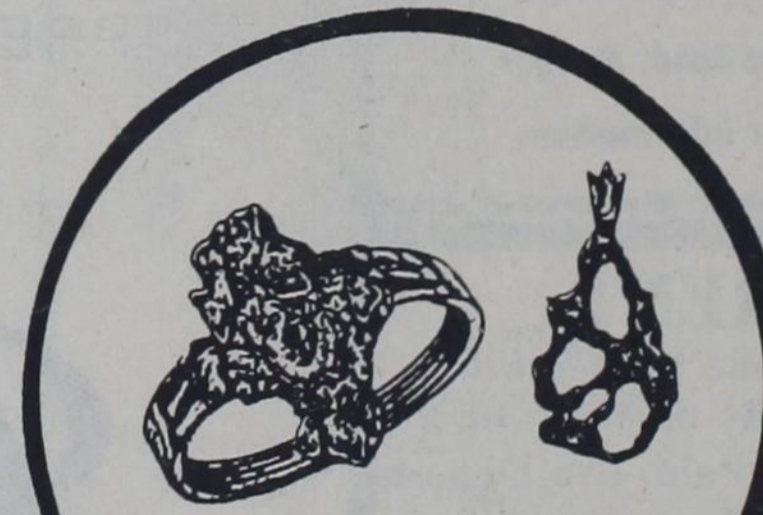

City Council Approves 20 M.P.H. On Royal Lane

The Cisco City Council approved the second reading of an ordinance here Tuesday night to establish a speed limit of 20 M.P.H. on Royal Lane from Front Street to where it dead ends.

The first reading of the ordinance was approved at the July 9th meeting. The new speed limit will go into effect as soon as signs can be posted along the street.

City Manager Mike Moore reported Thursday morning that the signs have been ordered, following the council's approval of the ordinance Tuesday night.

Unanimous approval by the council was given to a request of Bill Williams (Thrift Mart Stores) for re-routing water lines around the 1000 block of Avenue E. The lines have to be moved before Thrift Mart can proceed with its proposed expansion.

City Manager Moore suggested a manhole be added at the alley entrance and let Thrift Mart build over the sewer line. He said if there is any problem in the future with that line, the manhole can be sealed and that portion of the line abandoned.

The city could then re-route the sewer lines instead of going to that expense now. The cost for re-routing the water lines is estimated at \$4,000 maximum.

Moore also said streets around the business will be seal coated, but not until the

new water lines are installed.

A contract change order in the amount of \$2,840 with G&S Sandblasting and Painting was approved by the council. The additional money was charged for ten hours of welding at \$60 an hour, on the water tower and 56 hours of filling pits inside the tower with epoxy, at \$40 an hour.

City Manager Moore said the tower's standpipe was in such bad shape that its entire bottom half had to be completely coated with epoxy.

Both of the items, welding and epoxy, were provided for in the original contract but no price was indicated since it was unknown how much would be needed.

Final payment to G&S was approved by the council based upon the final approval of city engineers. The final payment will be in the amount of \$28,295.94, for a total contract project of \$38,340.

All members present voted for payment to G&S except Mayor Eris Ritchie. He voted against payment and said he is not satisfied with the lettering upon the tower.

The council discussed a lease agreement for a Fixed Base Operator at Cisco Municipal Airport with Mr. and Mrs. Archie Brixey of Grand Prairie. Mr. Brixey

indicated he could not agree with the contract as worded because of condition of the airport.

Mayor Ritchie recommended Mr. Brixey meet with some of the council members Wednesday morning to see if they could come

to any agreements.

City Manager Moore reported Thursday morning that he and council members Linton Batteas and Roy Dennis worked out a "handshake" agreement with Mr. Brixey. The new proposed lease agreement

will be presented to the council for consideration at their next meeting.

The council passed over an item to consider a possible contractor street paving project for 1985, since City Manager Moore said he has had no requests for such a

project. He said the city is continuing with its seal-coating projects.

The council instructed the city manager to set up a worksession with Energy Advancement, Incorporated. The company has contacted the city with a pro-

posal for a landfill alternative.

Energy Advancement, Inc. has already entered into a contract with Eastland to build and operate a solid waste disposal plant in Eastland. Cisco is being invited to enter into the contract since 50 tons of garbage a day is needed to operate the plant.

The solid waste is burned and the heat generates electricity which Energy Advancement, Inc. sells to utility companies. Such a facility would be open to the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Cost to the city is proposed at 67 cents per customer per month. Cisco would also not have to worry about landfill sites for possibly 40 years.

Members present for the council meeting were Joe Besselaar, Bill Roberts, Roy Dennis, Linton Batteas, Mayor Ritchie, City Manager Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

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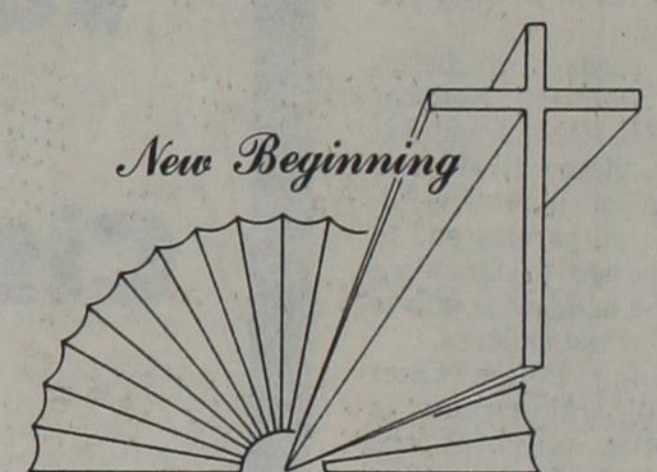

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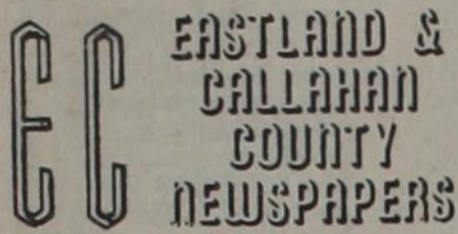

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
