A boy in New York who won a high school boys' prize for the best article on current news topics finds himself in temporary difficulty. He graduates from a commercial high school course this year, but has not enough credits to enter college next fall and must go to night school for a year. His problem is a common one. The boy comments on his situation himself:

"There are many boys and girls in the same fix I'm in. I was only 12 when I had to choose whether I would take an academic or a commercial course in high school. Then I thought I'd like to be a bookkeeper and I chose the commercial course. After I'd been in high school a while and found out how necessary it was to have an education, I began to want to go to college.

"I don't see how I could be expected to know what l wanted to do when I was only 12. Now, because I guessed wrong I will be penalized a whole year. I think colleges ought to admit students who can pass an intelligence test, even if they haven't all the required preliminary studies.'

There is much sense in the lad's complaint. Perhaps the college entrance requirements need to be modified or the high school course made more inclusive. But certainly no boy or girl at 12 years should be made to choose his life occupation and be set to preparing for it without the aid and advice of some very wise, broadminded, foresighted and understanding adult.

JOHN D'S IDEA OF THRIFT IS TO GIVE DIMES

NEW YORK, July 21 .- John D. Rockefeller, Sr., is known to children in a dozen different states as the "richest man in the world who has pockets full of dimes." Friends of the oil king make it plain that he does not consider giving away dimes as charity. Well-organized boards yearly dispense millions of dollars of his fortune wisely and well. The dime gifts, it is explained, are to encourage the habit of thrift. Eager faces of boys and girls peer through the bars of gate No. 14 of Rockefeller's Pocantico estate when the oil magnate is at

When Rockefeller goes out for his daily game of golf the dime distributions commence. He gives them to all the servants and working men on the place; a nickel or dime for each, and for each member of his family. One Italian gardner with a family of eleven hits the millionaire very hard each trip, but the aged financier never

Whenever anyone has saved enough dimes or nickels, Rockefeller will exchange them personally for new \$1 or \$5 bills. This little banking business which he does is perhaps the only one of his many interests which he still looks out for personally.

Not only do children receive the coins, but the older persons as well. He gives them to policemen, photographers, reporters and anyone else he happens to meet.

Rockefeller does not toss the dimes carelessly or contemptously at the objects of his benefactions He presses it into the waiting palm with precise emphasis, accompanied by a direct and almost questioning

It seems to say: "Out of dimes like this I establish the nucleus of a great fortune. Will you save it or will you send it thoughtlessly?" Some children, perhaps, encouraged by their parents, sneer at the rich man for giving away coins of small denomination, but most of them take the gifts in the spirit

"The attitude of unmarried bishops on the subject is insolent and I will make it impossible for them to say the things they say. Their unnatural and unhealthy attitude toward sex shall be swept away."

Dr. Stopes did not disclose her plan of camaign against the bishops and their views, but she was very certain in her statements that she believes public opinion will eventually turn against the views which are now being fostered by "the tradition of organized Christianity."

"Doctors can't agree on anything, and that is why they can't agree on birth control. They are unconciously biased by the traditions all around them.

"One doctor told me to feed my baby every two hours. Another told me to feed the baby every three hours, and still another every four hours. Finally I decided to feed the baby according to its own needs, and not according to the traditions of doctors. Is it any wonder that the doctors can't agree about birth control when they can't agree about simple theories of their

"Birth control has had a tremendous impetus during the past few years, and it is going forward in leaps and bounds. I have no fears but that we shall be able to break down the tradition of organized Christianity."





Cleaning Spark Plugs

Few car owners "enjoy" disassembling spark plugs and laboriously removing carbon particles with a knife and scraper. A good method of doing this is as follows; Immerse the plugs in a fruit jar, partly filled with muriatic acid; the length of the bath may be from 10 minutes to an hour, depending on the strength of the acid and the condition of the plugs.

Afterward, wash the plugs in water. Heat treatment is another good method of cleaning spark plugs. The plug is taken apart and the porcelains are placed in a hot lye bath, a saturated solution being used. The shells are placed in a fire, heated almost re and are then plunged in cold water

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
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
