First Lions Benefit Bowl Win Since 1980

Wranglers Break Four Year Losing Streak Saturday

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College broke a four-year losing streak in Breckenridge Saturday night, September 28, when they defeated the Ranger Junior College Rangers by the score of 17-to-7 in the 8th

Annual Area Lions Clubs Benefit Bowl. The yearly event is sponsored by the Lions Clubs of Albany, Breckenridge, Cisco, Clyde, Eastland, Gordon, and Ranger. CJC received the game

trophy following the Saturday night battle for the first time since 1980. Cisco scored once in the first quarter, as well as a touchdown and a field goal in the second quarter to lead the game at half-time with a 17-to-0

score. RJC came back in the second half and scored in the third quarter. Neither team was able to score after that, leaving the final score at 17-to-7. Cisco Junior College

coaches said the CJC defense was "just super all night." They held Ranger to only 13 yards rushing and 157 yards passing for a game total of 170 yards. The Cisco offense managed 191 yards rushing and 140 yards passing for a total offense of 331 yards.

David Smith, sophomore running back from Dallas-Adams, led the CJC offense with 24 carries for 124 yards and one touchdown. He was followed by James Dixon, freshman running back from Vernon, with 7 carries for 57 yards.

Mark Pilling, freshman quarterback from Miami, Florida, led the passing game with 8 completions out of 13 attempts for 79 yards and one touchdown. He was followed by Neal Kemper, sophomore quarterback from Groveton, who completed 4 of 6 attempts for 61 yards.

Darryl Grant, freshman from Miami, Florida, led receptions with 4 passes caught for 51 yards. The Wranglers received the opening kick-off in Saturday night's game and proceeded to march downfield, making 86 yards in 15 plays.

On the ensuing kick-off, Cisco's Eddie Washington recovered a Ranger fumble at the 12-yard line. Ranger's defense stiffened and pushed Cisco back to the 21, following an eight-yard loss on a quarterback sack by Ranger's Monty Sartain, Julius Smith, and Blanford Paul.

CJC Hernandez then tried a 37-yard field goal which was wide leaving the score at 7-to-0 with 4:20 left in the first quarter. Late in the second quarter of play, Cisco started a drive on their own 44-yard line and five plays later, David Smith scored on a three-yard run. The extra point kick by Hernandez was good, making the score 14-to-0 with 2:11 left in the second quarter.

Two plays later, Cisco's Wayne Hutchinson intercepted a Ranger pass from quarterback James Roberts at Ranger's 33. Four more plays and Cisco's Hernandez connected on a 42-yard field goal to give Cisco a 17-to-0 half-time lead, with 59 seconds left to play. Ranger tried to put some points on the scoreboard on their next possession before half-time with a field goal attempt of their own. The 35-yard attempt by Danny Saenz was no good leaving only 2 seconds before the half.

In the second half, Ranger's second possession of the ball, RJC started a drive on Cisco's 48-yard line. Two plays later, quarterback Mike Parker hit Haskell Buff for a 27-yard touchdown pass-play. The extra point kick was good, making the score 17-to-7, with 10:27 left in the third quarter of play.

On Cisco's next possession of the ball they started on their own 40-yard line and drove to Ranger's one in nine plays. The Ranger defense held CJC out of the end zone on two separate tries from the one-yard line.

For the remainder of the game, neither team was able to get inside the other's 20-yard line.

Jr. Varsity & Jr. High Teams Host Ranger

CHS Loboes Will Travel To Ranger For Contest

The Cisco High School Lobo Varsity will be traveling to Ranger this week where they will be looking for their first District 11-AA victory when they take on the Bulldogs in their second district game of the season. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m. Cisco High School's Junior Varsity and Junior High School teams will be hosting Ranger here Thursday evening. The 7th and 8th grade teams will combine together to take on Ranger's team, since Ranger does not have enough players for two separate teams.

The Junior Varsity will follow the Junior High game. The Junior High game will begin at 5 p.m. The Lobo Varsity is 0-1 in district play, following their 46-to-0 defeat by the Coleman Bluecats last Friday in Cisco's Chesley Field. The Loboes are 1-3 for the season. Ranger is 1-0 in district play after defeating Baird 21-to-0 last Friday. The Bulldogs are 3-1 for the season having best Gorman, Cross Plains, and Baird, while losing their only game to Early by the score of 28-to-14.

The Ranger team will be more Cisco's "size and speed," according to Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker. He said the Cisco group will be ready to play and will be going to Ranger for a victory. Cisco desperately needs this win to "get back on the right track," following its last two big losses to bigger and higher-ranked teams. The Loboes are in the same situation they were last year at this time, according to Coach Walker. They have won only one game and lost three and "our backs are against the wall."

The Cisco team should be healthy this week, with all of the players back in uniform. Roy Boykin and James Berry were both expected to play this week after missing the Coleman game. Steve Abbott still is suffering from a shoulder injury and may be moved to wingback or halfback where he will not get hit so much, according to Walker. Coach Walker said the Loboes did not play well in last week's game against Coleman. Cisco allowed Coleman to gain 228 yards rushing on 30 carries and complete 114 yards passing for a total of 372 yards. Cisco only gained 95 yards on 47 carries and 52 yards passing for a game total of 147 yards. Coleman scored twice in the first quarter, three times in the second quarter, once in the third quarter, and once in the final quarter. Cisco never got inside the 20-yard line of the Bluecats. Coleman's first score was on a 19-yard run by Darrell Warrick. The extra point kick by Johnny Jurado was good for a 7-to-0 score with 8:35 left in the first quarter. The drive started out on Cisco's 32-yard line when Coleman's Edward Morales intercepted a Lobo pass. Near the end of the first quarter, Coleman started a drive on Cisco's 47-yard line and two plays later, quarterback Edward Morales started running with the ball and then pitched it to Warrick who scored. The extra point kick by Jurado was no good, making the score 13-to-0 with 53 seconds left in the quarter.

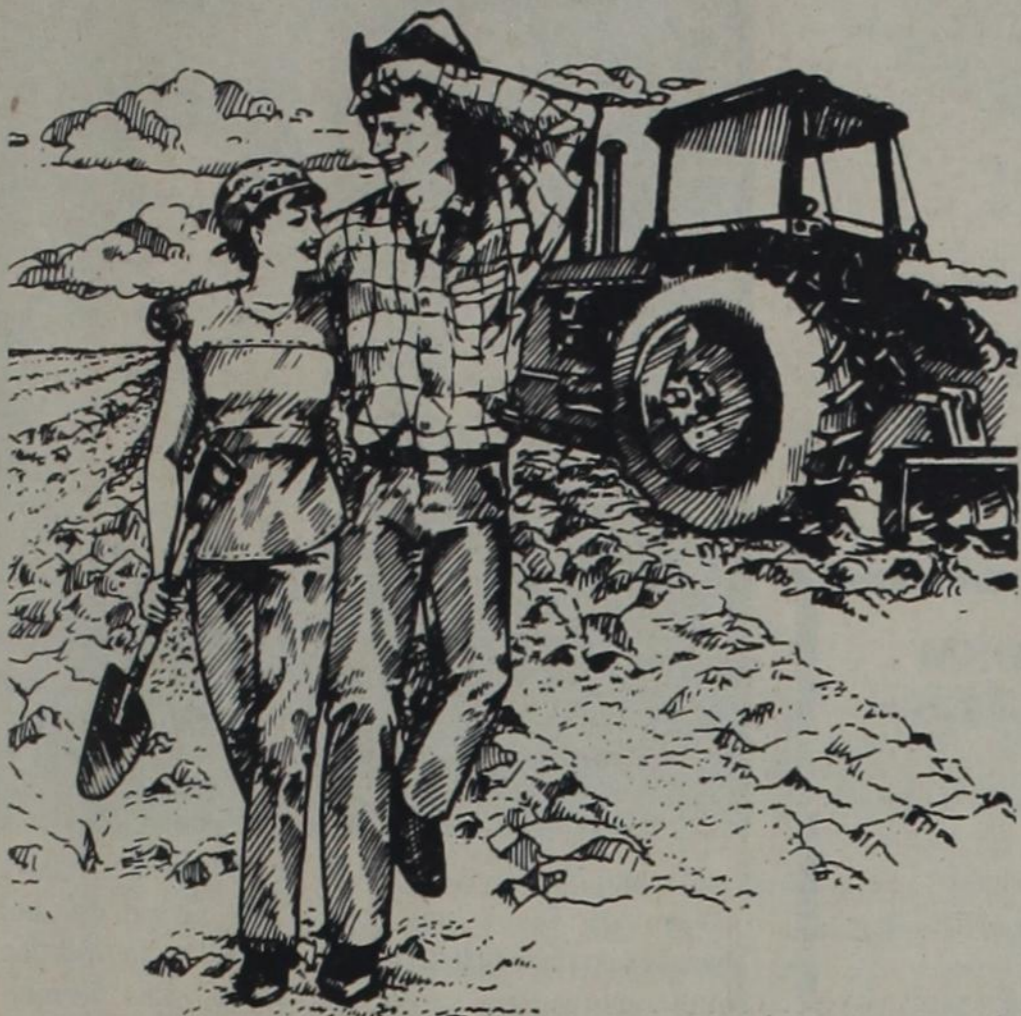

CofC Manager Attends Industrial Convention

Chamber of Commerce manager, Don Shepard, attended the Texas Industrial Development Commission Convention in Corpus Christi and wishes to share information from the convention. The theme of the convention was "Maintaining the Cutting Edge."

Texas in 1982 ranked 13 in the nation as a desirable state to locate an industry. At that time Texas labor produced \$1.00 worth of goods for .98, it had desirable workers compensation rates and reasonable tax rate which caused 6,000 industries to relocate in Texas. In 1983 4,000 and 1984 2,000 industries located here.

Texas dropped to 16th position in the national ranking in 1984 for the following reasons: the production cost jumped to \$1.07 for \$1.00 of goods produced, lack of water plan to sustain growing population for a 20 year period and lack of educational level desired for the new high tech industry. Other factors which influenced the Texas decline are percentage of people 25 or over who have high school diplomas ranked Texas 7th from the bottom, 37% increase in workers compensation insurance, 75% increase in lost time due to strike, injury, etc., lack of legislative crime control, and traffic congestion.

Several steps were taken to correct these problems by the Texas Legislature which made sweeping reform in public school education to meet high school requirements and proposed a water plan which is before you to be voted on in November. Everyone is encouraged to vote on this important water issue. Other

problem areas are under study by various legislative committees and departments of the state to help Texas maintain the cutting edge which will provide Texas with a healthy economy in the decades to come.

Local To Participate In Drum Corps International World Championship

ATTENTION: Drum Corps fans - friends of Shawn Alsop - and music lovers of all ages

Highlights of the 1985 Drum Corps International World Champions will be broadcast this Sunday, October 6, at 3 p.m., on KERA-TV, Channel 13. (Cable Channel 13). The contest took place August 12-17 in Madison, Wisconsin, and consisted of the competition at several levels-Prelims, Quarter Finals, Semi-Finals, and Finals.

Approximately 40 drum corps from the US and Canada took part in the Open Class eliminations which narrowed the field down to the Final 12. The Troopers, of which Shawn is a member, placed 9th—their best finish in a number of years. They had narrowly missed making finals since 1981 when they placed 12th.

The two hour special will feature highlights of the Top 12 Corps on the final night of competition, which was held at Camp Randall Stadium on the University of Wisconsin campus before a sellout audience of more than 38,000. Musical selections range from familiar Walt Disney and other TV/movie themes to classical concertos and a salute to Elmer Berstein.

Since complicated rating systems by a team of judges determine the order of final placement, most corps design intricate sets that combine marching and playing with the pageantry of numerous props—such as flags, streamers, colored cymbals, rifles, signs, banners, etc. They develop the show around a theme that is often highlighted by the drum solo segment and finale.

Many hours of disciplined practice and almost nightly contests throughout the summer produced the spectacle that will be broadcast. The viewer will be entertained and enlightened and maybe will begin to understand why thousands of young persons, aged 12-21, give up their summer vacations to spend countless hours riding on buses, sleeping on gym floors, and practicing 10-12 hours a day.

The No. 1 Snodgrass-Lilley, a 3,990-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Eastland County's Theo-Jireh Field. Hutch Petroleum of Borger is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 240-acre lease one-half mile southeast of Sabanno in the James Murphy Survey, A-381.

Encouraging Businesses Has Been Emphasized

The following article is reprinted from the National Federation Of Independent Business Research and Education Foundation and was written by President, John Sloan, Jr.

The importance of encouraging entrepreneurial business as a means of job creation has been emphasized by three separate sources recently, all of them worth noting.

Secretary of Commerce Malcolm Baldrige, speaking to a Conference on Employment and Technology in Venice, Italy, compared the climates for job producing small companies in Europe and the United States. "Among the most important of the European structural

rigidities are the barriers preventing new companies from being formed," Baldrige said.

He reported that last year 600,000 new U.S. companies were formed, double the number created a decade before. He said that small companies employing fewer than 50 people accounted for two thirds of all recent U.S. job growth, while companies with fewer than 100 employees have made up most of the rest.

Baldrige cited the lowering of barriers via deregulation as one means of encouraging the entrepreneurial risk and reward system. He said that, helped by deregulation, 23,000 new firms have been

formed over the past four years in the trucking industry.

Another barrier set to tumble is the present tax code. Columnist Warren T. Brookes (Heritage Syndicate) wrote Aug. 4 that President Reagan's tax reform plan "could be very pro-growth" because it removes big-business bias from the system and encourages productive, smaller firms.

Brookes says that the effect of the president's plan is to lower both the marginal and effective tax rates of those most likely to make the economy grow. He says, "The states with the fastest job and economic growth were not only those states with the most rapid growth in new business (i.e., small business) formations, but the states with the least dependence on large corporate enterprises and the least bureaucratized state-sponsored social services."

Whether the barrier is inequitable tax policy or excessive government involvement, independent business will respond with vigor when those barriers are lowered.

Author John Naisbitt agrees. Citing the full court press put on by 48 states to snag the General Motors Saturn plant. Naisbitt says that in the future, cities and states can better spend their time and energies "creating a climate nourishing to the entrepreneurs whose small companies generate almost all the new jobs in this country: a record 4,000,000 last year."

Local Man Is Arrested For Burglary Here

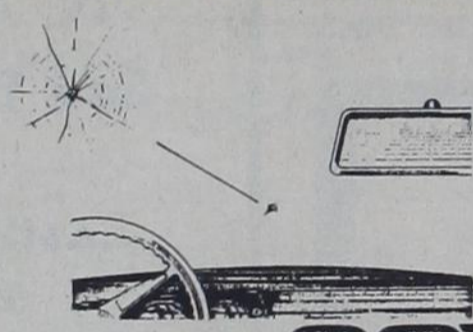

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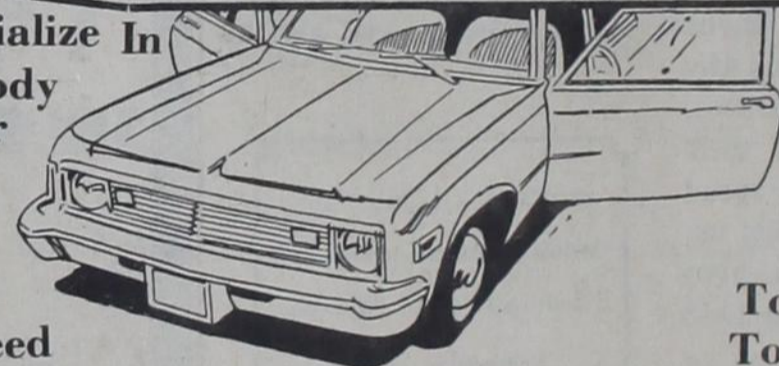

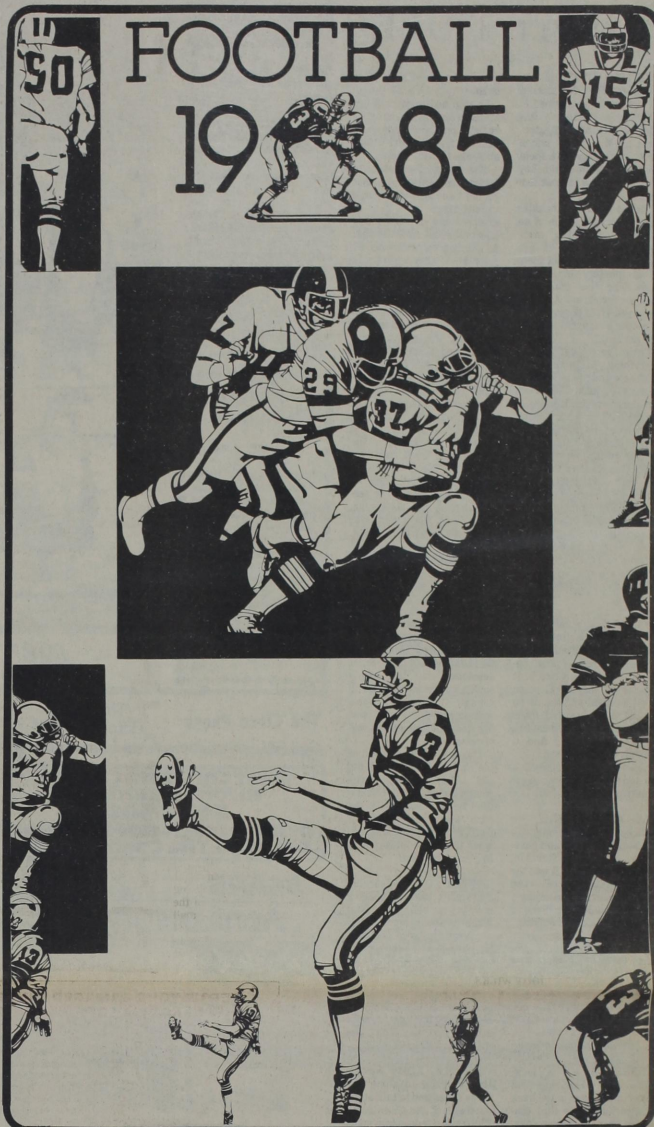

The Webb's two small children couldn't remember ever seeing their dad without a beard and they didn't like it for a few days.

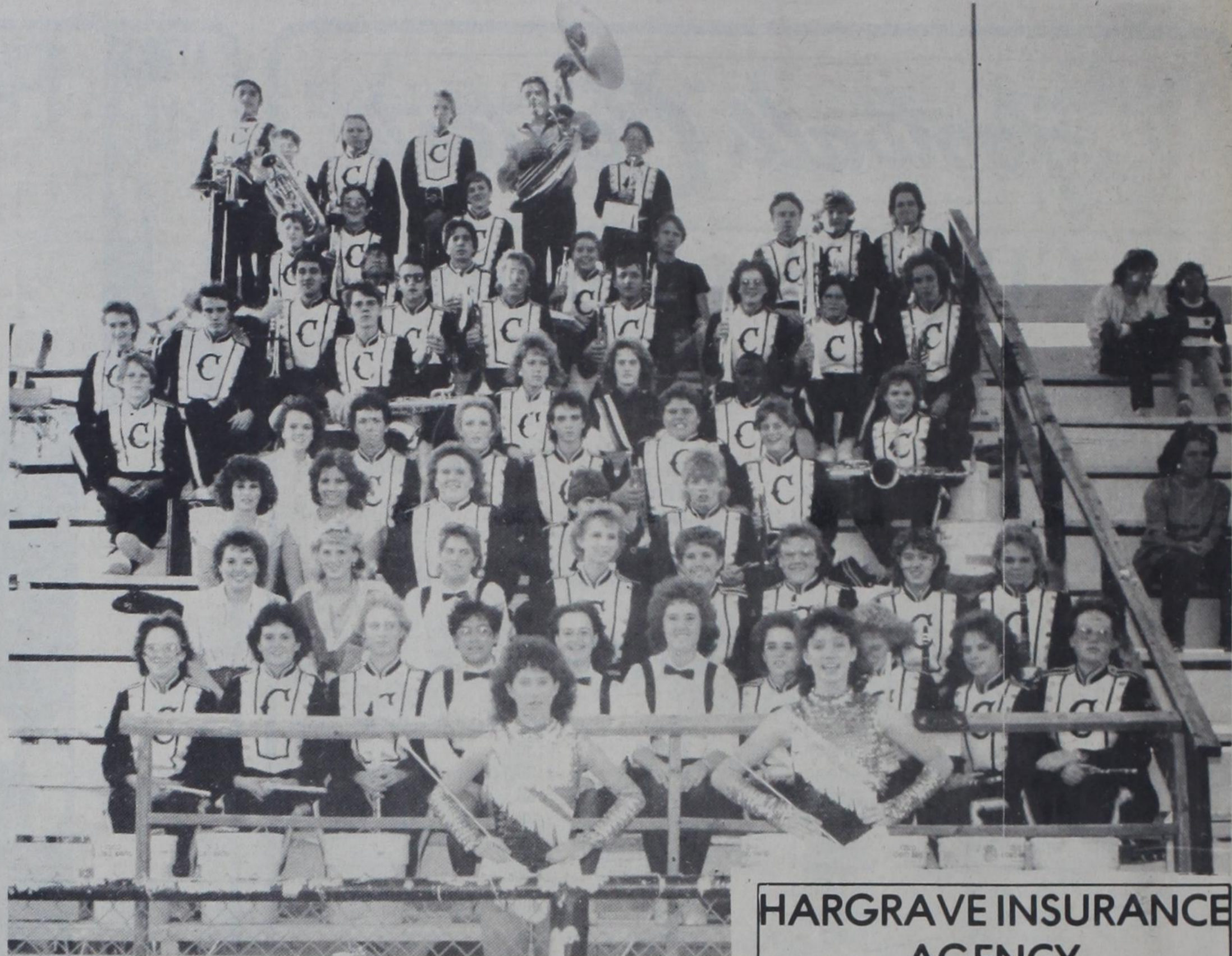

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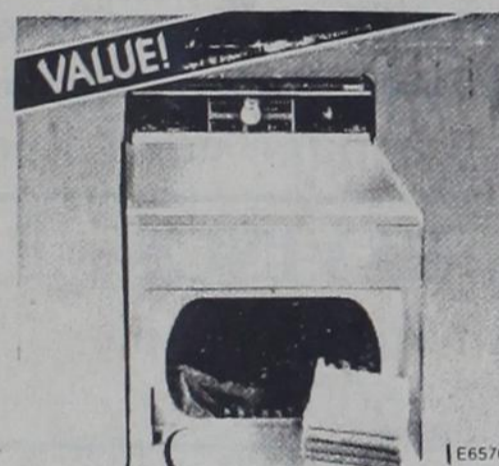
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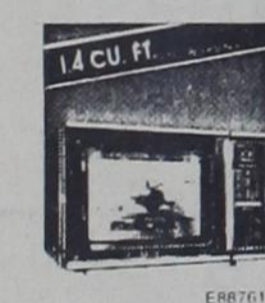

And the daughter goeth on a journey. And the editor throweth himself on the story of the farewell party. It

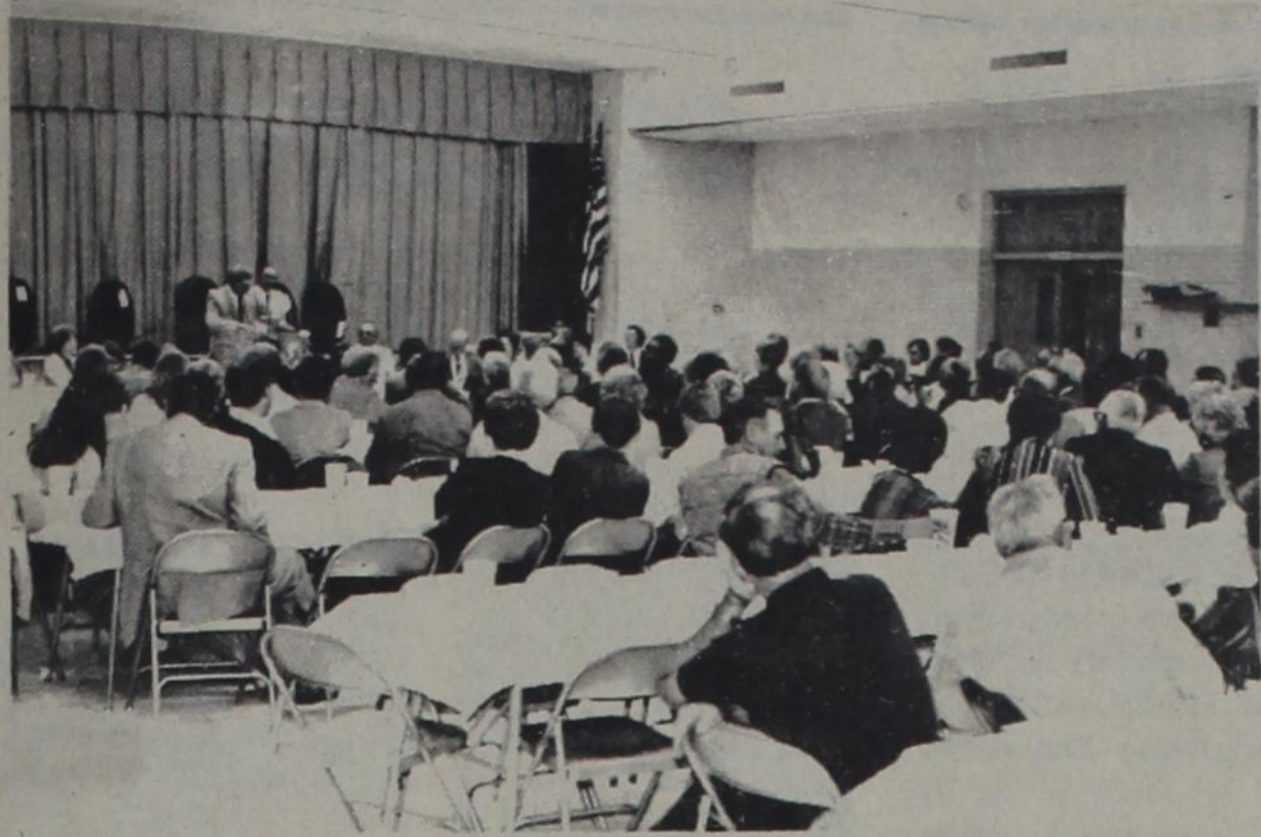
runneth a column solid. And the fair one remembereth him from afar with a picture postal card that costeth six for a jitney.

Eastland County Farm Bureau Holds County Convention Monday Night

Around 250 Eastland County Farm Bureau members and officers held their annual County Convention in Siebert Elementary School Cafeteria Monday night, Sept. 30 at 7 p.m. A fish fry was enjoyed by all, followed by a business meeting.

Ernest Reich, of Cisco, County Farm Bureau President led out at the meeting, introducing various officials. Guest speaker for the event was Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True of Plainview.

"We can't depend on Austin and Washington to solve our problems," stated the Farm Bureau President, in his speech. "The answer lies with us."

He called on members to make their views on agriculture known to representatives on a local, state and national level.

Referring to the size of the Eastland County meetings as "Inspiration", True praised the help he had received

from various Eastland County officials. He described State Director Roy Johnson of Desdemona as "A worker", and Eastland County Farm Bureau President Ernest Reich as "Very capable - a good leade."

He also told of the value of the officer's wives to the Farm Bureau work, saying that "It takes teamwork". He introduced Mrs. True to the audience, saying that he couldn't have carried out his work as State President without a supportive wife.

True, noting that Texas has the largest Farm Bureau membership of any state in the nation, told of the organization's work in various areas. These included Youth Citizenship Seminars, an Insurance Program geared to the needs of agriculture, a plan for purchasing some agricultural needs, fourteen commodity organizations, and a sixteen-man committee on water resources from throughout

agriculture, both on land taxation and loss of exemptions."

True, who has made a number of trips to Washington D.C. to consult on various pieces of legislation, said: "I've never seen as much confusion and indecision on farm legislation as there is in Washington right now."

He indicated there was so much confusion, in fact, that he expected the current Farm Bill before Congress to be treated about like the recent extensions on Dairy Production and Sugar. Congress will dispose of this by voting to continue things as they are now, without going into it.

The State Leader also expects adequate funding for a (modified) Farm Credit System.

He told of the problems of farmers in the midwest, calling them "more severe than in Texas." Declining land values are adding to the woes there.

He offered no quick solution to agricultural difficulties, but said he did believe things would begin to get better.

"Someone is going to speak for agriculture," True said, "so it might as well be us." He called on members to have faith in God, faith in agriculture and faith in themselves.

At this time President True turned the program over to County President Reich for the business meeting.

County Farm Bureau members were told of 5 resolutions that the Farm Bureau should support.

These are: (1) Repeal of the seat-belt law. The Farm Bureau believes everyone should use their seat belts, but it should be of their own choice. (2) Law giving voting rights to land owners (only) on any new taxation involving them. (3) A law giving the power to remove county officials who are disabled mentally or physically. (4) A law repealing the Indigent Care provision enacted by the 69th State Legislature. and (5) support the balancing of the federal budget, reducing the national deficit and to support the Line Item Veto Concept for passing appropriation bills.

Each resolution was read and an oral vote was taken on each. All five were passed by the membership of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

New directors for the Eastland County Farm Bureau were elected during the meeting. Those elected were: J.C. Clearman, John Kidd, Grant Lewis, Cecil Self and D.B. Warren all in-

cumbents of the offices. New directors elected were: Billy Walton and Leo Williams. The first directors meeting to be held will be Monday, October 7 at the Eastland County Farm Bureau office.

During the tallying of the votes, door prizes were given away. Names were drawn from those members who had called in to say they would attend the convention. Several items were presented ranging from Farm Bureau caps to a case of oil and auto services.

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Fishing Outdoors

Thursday, Oct. 3rd the Eastland County Bass Club shall be holding their monthly meeting at 7:30 p.m. and this month shall hold a special surprise for all members who attend.

Don't forget to bring those big bass of the month weight slips. Also as usual we shall be holding a drawing for valuable door prizes, only for members present. So lets all plan to make this meeting.

One major item which shall be discussed is, preparation for our 1985 awards ceremony.

Area lakes are showing some life. Brownwood, catfish excellent to 38 pounds on live perch and cut shad. Bass slow to 2 pounds on worms and spinners. Hybrid stripers slow, crappie good. Leon gass good, crappie fair, catfish good. Proctor bass good to 5 pounds on jigs, crappie excellent, catfish good. Spence, strippers fair, crappie excellent, bass fair to 4 pounds, catfish good.

Tournament fishing is rapidly replacing all other sports as No. 1 in Texas. And just as any other, fishing requires many hours of preparation.

Tackle: Prior to competition anglers will spend hours taking baits and sharpening hooks, straightening shirts on spinner baits, touching up paint on crankbaits and jig heads. Rod and reel maintenance is always a must. There's nothing more

upsetting than to have one or more reels foul up during a tournament. Its always a good idea to carry along a spare in your boat. Reels should be cleaned periodically and worn parts replaced and check drag settings.

Boat check: Batteries should be charged and acid levels checked on a schedule of 2 charges. Spark plugs can be pulled approximately every 30 hours of use and visually inspected. Of course a boat is of little use if your trailer breaks down while in route. Tire pressure lighting, and wheel bearings should be checked before making each trip away from home.

But this is only the surface. A well planned trip may also include 8 to 24 hours of pre-fishing on the tournament lake. And also many hours on a local lake simply working on preparation, timing, and hook set.

There is also some time which goes into map study. Searching areas which may produce the best for the weather conditions which have been prevalent. Many more small but important items into play for preparation of a tournament. So you can see, fishing can be a somewhat grueling hobby, if you go for the gold.

Good luck and good fishing. Don't let old man winter take a nip out of your next trip, the little fishes still have to eat sometime.

Giant vegetables have captured the imagination ever since Jack climbed the magic beanstalk and Cinderella was whisked off to the Prince's ball in a giant-pumpkin coach.

But modern garden seed developers have taken giants out of the realm of the imagination and into the world of the real garden. So if you've always considered growing giant beans and great pumpkins as something requiring a touch of magic, take heart. You can grow the giants, too, with just a few simple secrets.

First, start with the right selection. It is possible to design a garden that is sure to earn you a reputation as a "giant among gardeners."

If you plant seeds for ordinary-size vegetables, no matter how much fertilizer and water and sunlight and care you provide, you'll still have ordinary-size vegetables. But if you plant seed for giants and provide all those things, you'd better have a lot of storage room. Although there is no evidence that Cinderella's pumpkin was grown from ATLANTIC GIANT seed, the variety does produce pumpkins large enough to hold a full-size person. Developed by Howard Dill, the variety has reached 493 pounds - a world's record. The vines can grow to 90 feet and the pumpkins gain up to 15 pounds a day during the summer growing season. By autumn, ATLANTIC GIANTS can grow so large that it takes eight men to lift them and a commercial

scale for the weigh-in.

If that sounds a little large for your garden of giants, GIANT SHOW KING white squash can produce fruits that are considerably smaller - a mere 300 pounds. COBB GEM watermelons produce crisp, sweet 130 pounders. BUSHEL GOURDS come off the vines at 100 pounds and BIG DADDY muskmelons tip the scale at 14 pounds.

Even if you don't have room for these giant sprawlers, don't despair. You can train a YARD LONG cucumber on your fence or plant a row of MAMMOTH SUNFLOWERS behind the garage. But don't be surprised if they peek up over the roof's edge and rest 20-inch flowers heads on the eaves.

If your garden grows along more traditional lines-

radishes, tomatoes, cabbage and beans-there are giants for you as well. SAKURA-JIMA MAMMOTH WHITE GLOBE radishes weigh up to 15 pounds and the red PARAT GERMAN GIATN produces baseball-size globe radishes that might need to be sliced for the relish tray, but will be as tasty as their smaller cousins.

THE BEEF, a hybrid tomato introduced in 1985, and the HYBRID GIANT BRAGGER tomato both produce slices too large not to hang over the edges of the hamburger buns. ZWANN JUMBO cabbage average from 20 to 25 pounds - but a 35 pounder is not unusual if you give them the proper care. The JUMBO POD bean will produce foot-long, inch-wide pods with a flavor that is too good not to have had a little magic in the seed packet. Once you've chosen your giants, you need to tailor your growing practices to suit their big appetites. Vegetables are mostly water, and they can not at-

tain their optimum size if they are stressed by lack of moisture. Give them plenty of water, sufficient fertilizer, protection from harmful insects and disease and shelter from the wind; keep them weed free (mulches help), and you can easily grow prize winners for the county or state fair.

BRUCellosis VACCINATIONS Program changes after November 1, 1985

Most cattle producers realize brucellosis is a disease that is currently being eradicated (hopefully) through the efforts of the Texas Animal Health Commission. This disease causes abortions in cattle and undulant fever in humans is extremely disastrous to those herds and persons involved.

Veterinarians in private practice are strongly involved in the eradication effort through vaccinating heifer calves for producers. This vaccination is at no expense to the cattle owner. The vaccine must be administered under the direct supervision of an accredited veterinarian. This is to insure proper handling of a fragile vaccine, and that good records are kept. Vaccination is an essential portion of the brucellosis control program.

Heifers must be over 4 months and less than 13 months of age. Best results are obtained if heifers are 4 to 6 months of age. Contact your veterinarian if you would like to have your calves vaccinated.

Because of budgeted cuts in the Texas Animal Health Commission this program will no longer be totally funded after November 1, 1985. This means that after November 1, your veterinarian will charge a small fee to vaccinate your calves.

Even at a nominal fee calfhood brucellosis vaccinations pay a premium to producers that have it done. Vaccinated calves move freely in commerce, are worth more money and are protected against brucellosis.
