





### Soil Conservation **District News**

Now that spring is here our attention is again turned to the seeding of perennial grasses. Many questions are being asked about Blue Panic as an adapted grass. Blue Panic is a deeprooted, perennial bunch grass that forms large tough crowns. It may reach a height of seven feet under best growing conditions. Branching from the joints is common if the main stem is cut off or grazed off by livestock. This grass was introduced from Australia and is excellent for hay and grazing.

For best growth Blue Panic must be provided with plenty of plant food nutrients by planting on fertile soil or by applying fertilizer at time of planting. This grass is adapted to both light and heavy soils and is very drought resistent. It can easily withstand the extremes in temped Mrs. J. T. Boren of Abilene erature experienced in this local-




