RAIN-MAKING IN SOUTH AFRICA

South Africa is said to be going dry-not alcoholically, but in the matter of rainfall. The Zamesi river, through in suburban communities. its southern tributaries, has long been tapping three large lakes which have been the region's chief aid in producing necessary moisture and rainfall. As these smaller rivers have cut deeper channels by erosion they have drained more water out of the lakes until at the present time two of them are practically empty. And as this happens the rainfall is decreased and a slow process of desiccation goes on. This has continued for many years, of course. but it has only recently begun to appear menacing.

CONFUSING TRAFFIC LAWS

A newspaper writer who has been looking into the subject of laws and law-breaking finds special room for comment on traffic legislation. The traffic rules seem to be beyond computation, and the infractions are nearly so. He says that if there are as many arrests for the breaking of traffic laws throughout the country as there are in Washington and Baltimore, there are about 5,000,000 Americans arrested for traffic offenses in the course of a year, and the number of offenders who escape must be more than that.

Nobody can possibly obey all the traffic laws. Even if one masters and observes all the traffic rules in his own town, he is lost when he leaves home. The tourist is in a perpetual state of doubt.

"In some towns, for example," remarks the investigator, " a motorist may be arrested if he dims his lights on John F. Patterson of this city. some streets and doesn't dim them on others. Going in front of a crossing policeman at a left turn is required in one town and in the next is cause for summons." There are endless differences as to speed, parking, signals, manner of entering a main thoroughfare, etc.

Obviously the traffic laws ought to be reduced and simplified and made as nearly uniform as possible.



There is talk of making over the interior of the White House, changing it back to the colonial mansion that it was originally. At present it has much the effect of such a mansion externally, but the interior has been modified at various times in harmony with European rather than American styles.

As it stands now, the interior effect is largely that of the French empire. Settings of that type were introduced during the Roosevelt administration and have been retained ever since. The present proposal, submitted by a committee of architects and decorators authorized by congress, would make the entire interior reflect the colonial period, with furniture, rugs, hangings and colors representing the best American taste of the eighteenth century.

It seems altogether appropriate that the White House should be distinctively American, outside and inside, and should suggest the great period in which the nation was born.

AIR AND WATER SERVICE

An innovation in the London-Paris air service was tried out recently with success. A French plane, carrying passengers, descended on the Thames near Fulham instead of going on to its airdome. It came down smoothly to the surface of the water and reached its mooring buoy under its own power. Later it took off again from the Thames and made its descent at Paris on the Seine river. It is simple enough to build and equip planes for either water or field landings.


The elimination of the airdomes and landing fields at both ends of the channel trip is said to save a good deal of expense and an hour's time. The first trial was so satisfactory that the water landing will be used in regular service soon.

Airdomes probably have their uses in stormy weathers or when repairs are needed. The new regime referred to is of chief interest perhaps because it indicates the tendency in air service to branch out and to employ every means to insure speed, safety, effectiveness and comfort at as reasonable a cost as possible.

THE HEALTHFUL CITY

George E. Vincent, president of the Rockefeller Foundation, corroborates the view expressed by other medical scientists that, contrary to tradition and current belief, the city is a more healthful place than the country. That is, the average urban community is more healthful than the average rural community. Statistics prove it. There is more sickness and more mortality among country folk than the city folk.

Is the benefit of a natural environment therefore a delusion? Is there no real merit in space, air, sunshine and green fields? This is not the lesson taught. Other things being equal, human beings enjoy better health in the country than in the city. The difference is in the extent to which human beings help nature. The city person, living in a less wholesome environment, has more of what President Vincent calls "scientific protection."
