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MURDERERS, RICH AND POOR

There are nineteen men in Sing Sing prison under sentence of death. Clarence Darrow, the noted Chicago lawyer, says he will guarantee that "every one of those men awaiting death is there because he was without a good lawyer."

This hardly comes with good grace from the hired lawyer who used his talents to keep that precious pair, Loeb and Leopold, from the death house.

There is something essentially unjust and undemocratic in the picture drawn, of poor murderers awaiting execution and rich murderers at large, or alive in prison and buoyed up by hope of liberty.

In the years that are gone the writer voted for William Jennings Bryan for president on numerous occasions, and still has a tender feeling for this talented American, despite his many political idiosyncrasies.

THE LOWER COST OF LIVING

The cost of living in the United States has gone down a little further. Federal Reserve Board figures show that it averages 55 per cent above the pre-war level.

No wonder Italians want to come to America. For the big majority of Americans, this 55 per cent increase may be discounted, because income has risen as much as expenses.

THE ELECTION IN ENGLAND

The result of the British election is hard for Americans to understand. On the whole, it may be of no great importance or interest to Americans.

Yet, in one respect, at least, the average American must be disappointed in the remarkable victory of the Tories and the swing back to extreme conservatism.

Premier MacDonald's Labor government, whatever its defects may have been at home or in the dealings with Soviet Russia, proved itself on the whole enlightened and progressive with regard to international affairs.

If the Tories have learned this lesson, it will be well for Britain and well for her neighbors, across the channel and across the Atlantic.

The football game between Cisco and Ranger tomorrow promises to be hard-fought throughout, though Cisco should win by at least 14 to 0—if the local boys start off with the vim they are capable of unleashing.

LESSON FOR THE FARMER

Every right thinking person rejoices in the fact that the farmers are getting higher prices for their products this year and that their condition promises to be much improved as a result.

What has caused the change of the past few months. Not legislation, nor the adoption of fads or isms—it is simply the inevitable working of the old law of supply and demand.

But the farmer must learn the lesson that politicians do not make good times. He must study to produce his crops at lower cost, by adopting modern methods of farm

management. He must not plunge on one crop just because the price was high the previous year.

LIFE POLICY ANCIENT DATE IS JUST PAID

ITHACA, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Believed to be the last life insurance policy containing a clause forbidding the holder to fight a duel, a policy issued by the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance company in 1845 to Orange P. Hyde, of this city, today has been paid to his widow, following his death.

Provided always that in case the said Orange P. Hyde shall—without consent of this company previously obtained in writing—pass beyond the settled limits of the United States (except into the settled limits of Canada, Nova Scotia or New Brunswick); or visit between the first day of July and the first day of November, the states of Arkansas, Louisiana or Texas, or the state which lies south of the southern line of North Carolina or Tennessee; or enter as mariner, engineer, fireman, conductor or laborer, in any capacity, upon service on any sea, sound, inlet, lake, river or railroad, or into any military or naval service whatsoever (the militia not in active service excepted); or in consequence of injury by his own hand or in consequence of a duel, or by reason of incompetence from the use of intoxicating liquors, or by the hand of justice, or known violation of any law of these United States, or any other country which he may be permitted under this policy to visit or reside in—this policy shall be void, null and of no effect.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Fatigue tests for eighteen heavy limestone beams, testing their durability and resistance against heavy loads, are in progress at the United States bureau of standards.

For more than sixteen months the beams, twenty-eight inches be-

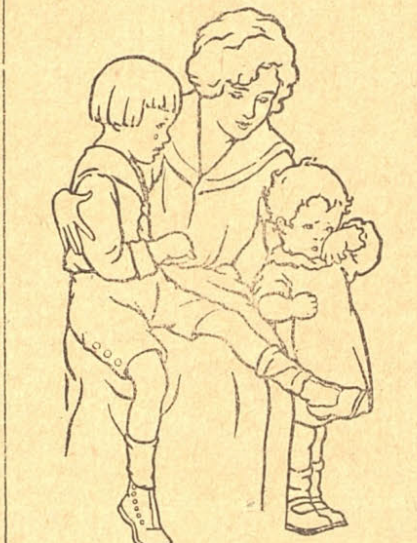
tween supports, four inches wide and one and one-half inches thick, have been subjected to a load equal to two-thirds of that required to break them.

None of the beams have broken, but the average bending is .002 inches.

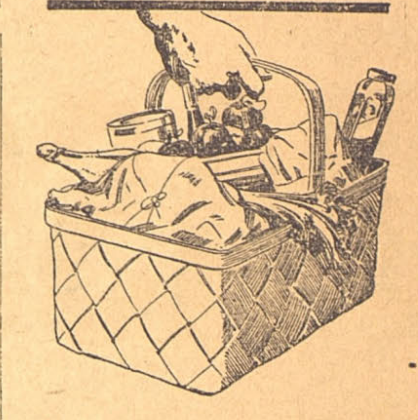

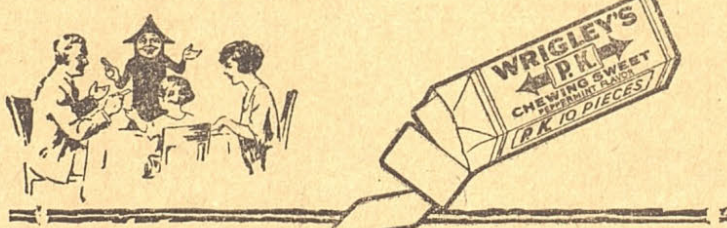

POULTRY PEOPLE OF STEPHENS CO. ELECT OFFICERS

It was revealed that there are close to 50,000 chickens in Stephens county and that approximately half of this number are pure-bred stock now. There are 125 members in the association who are raising pure-bred poultry and the work of

the association the past year has done much toward making marketing conditions for these poultrymen's products as successful as it is. The annual income from poultry here now is many thousand dollars. The poultry growers of this county just recently entered the Bankhead Poultry Producers association for marketing purposes, and now have an arrangement whereby eggs and poultry can be marketed in carlots and thereby bring the top price and stabilize the industry to a large extent. Other interesting developments of the past year were enumerated, including the annual poultry show which was declared by visiting poultrymen to be one of the best held in the state.

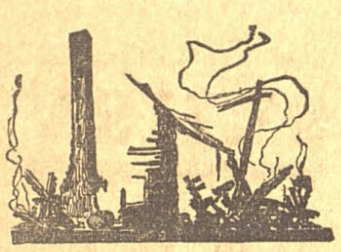

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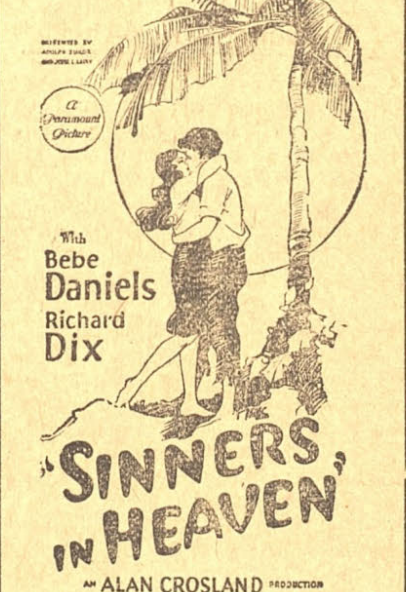
