Yet, in one respect, at least, the average American must be disappointed in the remarkable victory of the Tories and the swing back to extreme conservatism. That is in the possible effect on European reconstruction. Premier MacDonald's Labor government, whatever

its defects may have been at home or in the dealings with Soviet Russia, proved itself on the whole enlightened and progressive with regard to international affairs. It brought Great Britain into better relations with France and enabled those two leading countries of Europe to work together again, after several years of growing alienation. It upheld the plan of the international experts' committee of which Mr. Dawes was chairman, and to it goes much of the credit for that plan's success. It realized that whether the Allies like Germany or not, they have to live alongside of that country and get along with her somehow or other, and also that they, themselves, stand to benefit more from a prosperous Germany than a dead Germany.

If the Tories have learned this lesson, it will be well for Britain and well for her neighbors, across the channel and across the Atlantic. But all history shows how slowly Tories learn. 、 意識 打聽打罪



### LESSON FOR THE FARMER

Every right thinking person rejoices in the fact that the farmers are getting higher prices for their products this year and that their condition promises to be much improved as a result.

What has caused the change of the past few months. Not legislation, nor the adoption of fads or isms—it is simply the inevitable working of the old law of supply and demand. When farmers produce more of a given crop than the world needs, the price will be low. When a given crop is short, the price will be high. All other causes are insignificant compared to these. It cannot be denied that there are other influences which have some effect, such as a just system of farm credits, fair transportation rates, cooperative marketing in an orderly manner and so on.

But the farmer must learn the lesson that politicians do not make good times. He must study to produce his crops at lower cost, by adopting modern methods of farm






