# **MOORE'S CROSS CUT WELL GOOD** FOR 480 BARRELS

CROSS PLAINS, April 8 .- Great excitement has been occasioned by the sudden discovery of what is so far the largest producer yet found in the Cross Cut field. This well is the property of C. O. Moore and E. R. Wilson, and is located on the Gafford tract, east of Cross Cut. The amount of production was unexpected, although there had been some showing of oil. The pay had scarcely been touched at a depth of 1,240 feet when the oil began to flow, gushing twelve feet above the crown block. Production in the beginning was pinched by the use of 2inch flow lines to only twelve barrels per hour, but a change of pipe to 4-inch late Saturday afternoon brought an immediate response of flow to 15 barrels per hour, which is being followed by gradual increase as the well drills itself in, and a gauge taken late Sunday registered 20 barrels per hour. And a later report credits the well with a production of 480 barrels for the 24-hour period ending at noon Monday. Full completion of the well may not be made for several days, the owners expressing a reluctance to open the well for further drilling so long as the flow continues to increase naturally. This pay, like all the other from a pure sand and records of the older, through smaller producers of this district, shows that production declines very slow, most wells holding very close to the initial production figures for several months after completion.

The well is located about two miles east of Cross Cut. and lies to the north of the old Cross Cut pool, and is separated from the nearest producer in the east extension of the field by a quarter of a mile of condemned land. Only two small wells of 60 or 70 barrels have been drilled in this vicinity.

A great renewal of aitivities has resulted and there is much demand for leases and contracts in and about Cross Cut. The New Era Oil & Gas Co., and Calbro Oil Co. are reported to have sold their 40-acre W. A. Prater lease with two small producers, to Root Rhodes et al., for the consideration approximately \$60,000.

## **BROADCASTING CONGRESS**

Premier Baldwin is taking up the question of broadcasting the proceedings of the British Parliament. He Fill Your Prescription wants a committee of each branch to consider the matter. If reports are favorable, the legislative business of the British Empire will be transacted in full hearing of the British public, and as much more of the world as cares to listen, instead of by a mere handful of auditors.

This would be a momentous innovation for England, in the direction of greater democracy. Mystery and aloofness would be stripped from government. The people would realize more clearly than ever, that they rule. The mere knowledge that they were listening would make the lawmakers defer more to them, as well as give citizens a livelier interest in the proceedings.

The same thing has been proposed for our congress, but nothing has been done about it yet except to arrange for broadcasting special events. There is no apparent reason why our lawmakers should not broadcast their regular sessions, whether the British do or not. It will probably come sooner or later.
