Denton Finds That Municipal Plant Pays

A reduction in the city tax rate of twelve and a half per cent-from \$2.00 to \$1.75 on the \$100 valuation, was ordered by June, the reduction being made possible by profits of the municipal light plant and water works. Plant profits will be used to supplement the city's general fund, for which only a small tax was levied.

The \$2.00 tax rate includes school taxes also. It is estimated that at least \$25,000 or \$30,000 a year will be required of the water and light fund under the new tax rate, but officials are confident that the plant will have a surplus of more than that amount. In addition to this liability, the Denton plant is setting aside a minimum of \$2,000 each month in a permanent improvement

Much credit for the low tax rate under which Denton has operated in the past is due the light and water fund, which has transferred large sums each year to other departments. The new tax rate was levied on a total rendition of the same as last year.

The Denton plant is free of indebtedness, having been paid for out of plant earnings with the exception of a \$25,000 bond issue voted for its purchase in

As a result of operating its light and water plant successfully, Denton provides free sewer service for its citizens, paying the expense of sewer maintenance and extensions out of water and light profits.
