Commissioners Okay Renovation

Art. 2350o. Allowance for travelling expenses and automobile depreciation.

Section 1. In any county in this State having a population of not more than twenty-one thousand, five hundred (21,500), according to the last preceding or any future Federal Census, the Commissioners Court is hereby authorized to allow each member of such Commissioners Court the sum of not exceeding Seventy-five Dollars (\$75) per month for traveling expenses and depreciation on his automobile while on official business & Co. of Richardson to handle within the county. Each member of such Commissioners Court shall pay all expenses in the operation of such automobile and keep same in repair free of any other charge to the county.

Sec. 2. (Pertains to counties with populations over Butler of Rising Star.

Sec. 3. (Pertains to counties with populations over 124,000).

Sec. 4 (Pertains to counties with populations over to commence Jan. 1, 1965, 600,000.)

Sec. 5. The term "members of the Commissioners Court" when used herein means the County Commissioners and the County Judge.

Sec. 6. The provisions of this bill shall apply only to those counties not furnishing an automobile, truck, or by other means providing for the traveling expenses of its commissioners, while on official business within the county.






