





### Cisco Baptists Are Getting Up Steam Preparatory to the Erection of Ideal Church Home—Actual Work This Fall

#### THE BODY OF LLOYD PRICE BURIED HERE

It was a sad home coming of Mrs. Eunice Price on the occasion of her return Wednesday when she accompanied the body of her 15-year-old son, Lloyd Harold Price, to his native city for burial, whose lifeless body was found hanging to the windshield brace of an automobile in his mother's garage Tuesday morning. Accompanying the mother on this sad occasion were Gwendolyn and Nellie, and Victor Price, bereaved sisters and brother of the dead boy. Mrs. Price stated that Monday night Lloyd dressed and told her he was going to take a walk. He stated he did not seem to take an interest in anything. "It is my custom to remain up until their return when my children are out," Mrs. Price stated, "but I must have fallen asleep, as I did not hear him come in, and did not know that he failed to occupy his bed. His lifeless body was found by his sister about five o'clock when she went into the garage Tuesday morning, the condition of the body indicating that death had occurred several hours before he was discovered." She stated that the report telegraphed from Fort Worth that she has chastised the young man was an error, and but for an acute case of despondency she knew no reason for Lloyd taking his own life.

The funeral was held at Oakwood cemetery immediately after the arrival here of the 2:20 westbound Texas & Pacific train, Rev. J. S. Vaughan conducting the funeral, which was largely attended by relatives and friends of the family.

#### BAD CHECK MEN BEING GATHERED IN BY OFFICERS

EASTLAND, July 10.—A telegram from the sheriff's office at Dallas to the Satterwhite Hardware Co., here stated that the man believed to have passed a forged check for \$96 in the store about two months ago was under arrest and in the Dallas jail.

J. W. Murray was the name written on the forged instrument. The check was passed at the store about two months ago. It was drawn on the Texas Pipe Line Co., and was supposed to represent wages paid to Murray by that company.

Murray entered the store and stated that he wished to purchase a refrigerator. He selected a model costing about \$30 and requested that the article be sent the following Monday to a certain address in the city and tendered the check in payment. The check was accepted, though only \$25 in change was returned to the bearer, the store promising to pay the remainder the next Monday when more change would be available.

Some suspicion was created in the store later and a man was sent to the address given to investigate. They were found to be false and the refrigerator was not sent to the house. Murray had, of course, skipped the country and officers were informed of the forgery. A communication with the Texas Pipe Line Co. office at Dallas revealed the fact that no check had been issued a man by the name of J. W. Murray. It was later learned that Murray had been operating throughout Texas, between Houston and Dallas and in the west.

#### BERTHA ISHOP'S CASE CALLED IN 91ST DIS. COURT

The case of Bertha Ishop, negress, charged with the murder of her common law husband, Robert Lee Fakes, an Eastland negro, was called in the 91st district court at Eastland Thursday. A special venire of 125 had been summoned from which to select the jury. County Attorney Barnes, who is assisted in the prosecution by his assistant, Gilvie Hubbard, states the state will ask for the death penalty. The defendant is represented by Milton Lawrence of Eastland, and Victor Shurtliff of Breckenridge.

Fakes was killed on the night of June 9 while in company with Daisy Wemack, a Cisco negro woman, who was shot three times through the neck. The tragedy occurred at a negro dance in Eastland. Daisy has so far recovered from her wounds that she will be able to attend the trial as a material witness to the tragedy.

#### DENVER OIL MEN LATE ARRIVALS IN THIS FIELD

A. C. Smith and R. M. Aitken of Denver, are the latest additions to the oil fraternity to locate in Cisco. They are seeking a furnished house, as Mr. Smith stated there would be five men in their party, all attracted here by the possibilities of the shallow fields surrounding Cisco. They want a furnished house of seven or eight rooms.

"We are new men in this field," said Mr. Smith, "though Mr. Aitken has some holdings in the Wichita fields. At the present time we cannot give any plans for the future, but we are looking for something to be had in oil properties near Cisco. We are pleased with Cisco, and feel that if we are successful in getting what we want in this field will make Cisco permanent headquarters. We are independent, and will operate independently in what development we do," concluded Mr. Smith.

#### BRECKENRIDGE POULTRY FARM ADDS 500 HENS

BRECKENRIDGE, July 10.—Approximately 500 fine birds were added to the Model Poultry farm flocks today, and 2,000 more will arrive next week from Bowie, L. P. Guice, manager of the farm, reported. Of the birds bought from A. H. Davis of Ivan, 250 are Rhode Island Reds, and 247 are pure bred White Leghorns.

Two thousand imperial White Leghorns of the finest blood lines have been ordered from the Johnson farms at Bowie, Texas, and should arrive this week. These birds will be used as a source of quality hatching eggs and young chicks will be offered for sale by the Model Farm.

#### BRECKENRIDGE GOLFERS TO PLAY AT EASTLAND

BRECKENRIDGE, July 10.—Breckenridge golfers will invade Eastland Sunday in the first game of the final matches to be played in the Oil Belt Golf association tournament. Breckenridge and Eastland golf teams stand tied for first place in the tournament and will play two games, one at Eastland and one at Breckenridge, to determine the winner of this year's cup. Last year's golf trophy was won from Breckenridge by Weatherford.

BRYAN, July 10.—E. W. Kinard, student in the A. & M. College summer cotton school here, died early Thursday from injuries received when he fell from a freight car late yesterday afternoon. Suffering from the loss of an arm by the wheels of the car passing over it when he fell, he leaped to his feet carrying the severed arm in his hand, ran screaming from the scene. He was rushed to a hospital where he was given surgical and medical attention at once, but death ended his sufferings this morning. He is the second student that has been killed by riding freight trains in the past two months. The remains were shipped to his home in Dallas, where the funeral will be held today.

#### HARDEMAN FARMERS TURNING TO DAIRYING

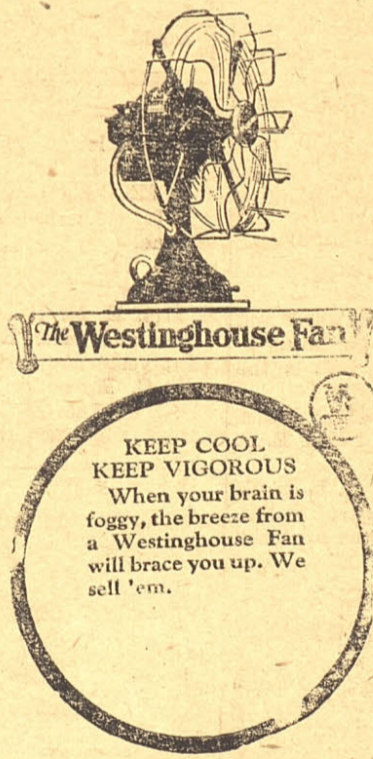



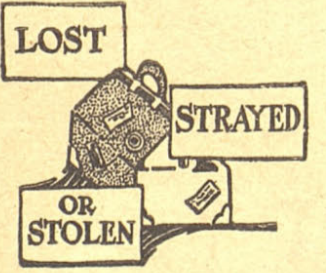
