

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
Survey of Current Business

Dr. H. Gordon Hayes, chief of the division of economic research of the department of commerce, is responsible for a series of business articles of particular interest which il-lustrate the extent and nature of the gains that have been made since the approximate low point of the depression which coincided with the financial crashes of 1933. Standing out clearly is the improvement, writes Dr. Hayes, that has occurred since 1935 in continuation of the very substantial gains made in 1934. Furthermore, he asserts that it is further evident that despite this improvement, the current position is considerably lower than in 1929, the last year of relatively full employment. His comparison is even less favorable on a per capita basis, as the increase in population since early 1929 has amounted to some 6,000,000 or 5 per cent.

To summarize some of the important changes, he says, it may be noted that farm income in the first four months of 1935 was 61 per cent above that for the same period of 1933, and 12 per cent in excess of that for early 1934. Industrial production was up 41 and 7 per cent respectively, while the increases in employment, retail sales and foreign trade have also been substantial. Gains in such individual lines as automobiles, electric refrigerators and rayon have been especially large, and it is interesting to note that a number of commodities are being manufactured and sold in greater quantities than in 1929.

Of the 24 commodities listed in the section generally relating to production and consumption, the following products are in this category; wool, rayon, shes, cigarets, electric power, gasoline and alcoholic beverages. He reminds the reader that with this comprehensive list of quantitative changes that have occurred. One change that is immediately apparent is the lessening of the many strains on our economic structure which were such a potent influence in extending the downward spiral of the depression. This alleviation of stress is especially apparent in the price data, declares Dr. Hayes, the rapid increase in prices of farm products and raw materials tending to bring about a much better balanced price relationship which in turn has facilitated the exchange of goods. His verdict is that many maladjustments still exist but their representative influences have been much lessened. IBEX, KNOWN ONLY TO AFRICA,



Hardwood, public relaions man for the commission, has pictured the Texas relief situation and what has been done in the past The back cover of the volume has an eye-catching presentation of the Texas map. It looks like one many fancy quilts that industrious housewives used to make out of many colored patches. Closer inspection shows that cerain "patches" designate that certain percentage of the county opulation is on relief. Black atches, designating more than 30 er cent, are few.

A circle representing a relief dolar is shown on one of the interestng charts. Sectors show just how nuch of the dollar was used for 52 Unoccupied each purpose.

Direct relief took 23.55 cents of the dollar; work relief, 32.24 cents and rural rehabilitation, 20.43 cents.

Special programs, including emer gency education, college student aid and transient relief, consumed 4.8 cents; administration, 9.44 cents, project supervision, 7.2 cents, and rocessing commodities, 2.34 cents

Most interesting of the tables is a list of the tons, pounds, bushels, gallons and yards making up the more than \$7,500,000 worth of supplies disributed in addition to money relief. Texas is a southern-tier state, but 91 tons of coal were distributed Some other items: 16,265,746 pounds f smoked pork; 10,925,824 pounds of flour: 7,400,000 pounds of pota-toes: 36,000 gallons of syrup; 1,168,-816 yards of toweling.



Comanches Raiders of older and more primitive peo-"The Comanche of historic times was a barbarian, powerful and as flashingly picturesque as the Tartar and the Arab. Under his red banner he whirled into Mexico, raiding the ranches, referring to the proud Spanish ranch-owners as his herdsmen. Under his flaunting square of vermillion-tinted leather he robbed the pack-trains moving toward the French trading posts. Following his plume-tipped lance, he set the Mexican garrisons by the ears when they raised the tri-color; and he fought pioneer, Ranger, and Federal soldier as they moved against him under the Lone Star and the Stars and Stripes. Taking advantage of the Anglo-American rift that raised the Confederate Stars and Bars, he cut to pieces the Tonkewa ally of the Texas settler, and whirled to the Gulf. All in all, he retarded advancement of the white frontier for forty years following San Jacinto. "Nor was it in fair fight that the blood-tinged barbarian banner lost its sovereign sway over the buffalo lands. The slaughter of the humped herds through cold iron-the invention of the power rifle-staryed the hosts that bore the sun shield on the plains. "Neither was it in man-to-man combat that the sun standard




