

H., Dec . 12 .- The ecision of Prince Jonah Kuhio (Cupid) Kalanianole against being a candidate gain for the position of Hawaiian delgate to congress, after 20 years' conecutive service, will bring to an endn so far as main land activities are conerned—a career unique in the annals of merican politics.

Prince of the royal blood of Hawaii, ducated abroad, attendant at the native nonarchs' court, a political prisoner, prisoner for one year following the at-Liliuokalani after the Republic of Hawaii had been declared, and delegate rom the islands to congress for 10 suc essive terms, the genial prince, who as long been a picturesque figure at Washington has decided to forsake the glamor of life at the national capital 'in order that I may best serve my own beople,' by serving on the Hawaiian Homes commission, established by conress in an effort to rehabiltate the dyng Hawaiian race

The life of the prince has been replete with incidents that breathe of the ronance that tinges the shores of his native isles. He was born in 1872 at Kapaa, island of Kauai. His father was he High Chief David Kahalepouli Piicoi, a descendant of the King of Kaurchs to be overcome by Kamehameha the Great, who consolidated the islands nto the kingdom of Hawaii and became ts first ruler. Prince Kuhio's mother vas the Princess Kinoiki Kehaulike sister of Queen Kapiolani, the consort of King Kalakaua. Kuhio's elder bro her was the Prince David Kawanana

toa, who died in San Francisco in 1908 Kubio and his brother were brought up in the court of King Kalakaua, the merry monarch" of Hawaii. Kuhio atnded school here and at St. Matthew's college at San Mateo, Cal. Later he was a student at the Royal Agricultural chool in England and also took a course Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Crosby and at a business college in the United

> Later he spent a year in Japan as the uest of the Japanese government. King Kalakau was credited with a secret de sire that Kuhio might marry a prin-cess of Japan, which would strengthen the position of the Hawaiian monarch The desire, if held, came to naught

While in prison he was secretly engaged to Elizabeth Kakanu Kaleiwohi Kaauwai, the present princess, who vis ited him in prison every day and brought him food. About a year afte his release, they were married and tour ed the world for two years.

Now, with his 20 years of service in congress behind him, with the first Ha waiian settlest about to take up home teads in accordance with the rehabil tation act, the prince is living quietly with the princess in his home upon th site of Queen Liliuokalani's former beach castle, by the sea at Waiiki, with the ocean surf booming against the shore scarcely 10 yards from his win


