



CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 14 .- A bomb today blew J. A. Barnes, prominent real estate dealer, to pieces, Neff for His Pro Stand mangled Jesse, his son, 12 years old, who died twenty minutes later, wreck-ed the Barnes' dwelling and blew to

bits every window in residences for the distance of a block. Mrs. Barnes was cut by flying glass.

The bomb was in a box about ten inches long and five or six inches wide. It was sent by express from San Antonio. The bomb was contained in a wooden box marked "J. A. Barnes, Corpus Christi, Tex.," and "magazines." It was marked "personal.

Police officials received word this evening from San Antonio authorities that a Mexican boy named Juan Morales, a newsboy, had been arrested in connection with the explosion. Morales, it was said, told officers that the package was given to him by a "crippled white man."

The package arrived in Corpus Christi last night over the S. A. U. and G. railroad and was delivered about 10:30 o'clock this morning, Jesse, the son, asked his mother for ermission to open the package, but rs. Barnes refused.

Mr. Barnes, who had been serving jury, returned to his home at out 12 o'clock and took the box out a back porch to open it. It is beved that the explosion occurred as e lifted the lid, which was tightly fastened with heavy nails.

Mr. Barnes was thrown ten feet from the point where he was standing, and hurled against the side of the house, the force of the impact crushing the heavy timbers of which the wall was constructed. Both of his legs were blown off, one of his arms was severed, and the other arm was mangled. In addition several holes were made in his chest, apparently by debris.





Twenty-three years ago it was prevalent in a still wider area, including New Orleans, Cuba and practically all the West Indies.

When it was found that only one out of 800 varieties of mosquito carried the disease, and that human beings became infected only through the transmission of the germ by this one kind of mosquito, the way to get rid of the disease was plain. The most interesting recent statement of the opposition argument comes from the Ex-Servicemen's Anti-Bonus League, which is now about a year old. It believes that a majority of World War veterans are opposed to a federal bonus for ablebodied ex-service men. The slogan of this organization, said to be organized in twenty-one states, is: "For the disabled, everything; for the able-bodied, nothing." Recalling "that able-bodied veterans of the Civil War waited over forty years for their first service pension," a spokesman for the League says, as quoted in a San Francisco dispatch to the Boston Christian Science Monitor:

"By comparison it seems a disgraceful display of inordinate greed and lack of patriotism that ablebodied citizens who served in the World War-a majority of whom never even reached the front-should be clamoring for service pension before the ink is hardly dry on their m discharge papers and while they are yet in the years of their strong young manhood.

The cost of the bonus is emphasized in a statement recently issued by the National Industrial Conference board. This organization uses official government figures to show that the cost of the bonus would probably be \$3.845,659,481. A little less than a third of these would have to be met by taxation or loans in the next twenty years, the balance being payable after 1943. This according to the board's figures, would add to the debt of the United States twenty years hence a sum equivalent to from \$102 to \$142 on each family in the country. Then there would be the disturbing effects on business of the increased tax burden and the inflation of credit by the necessary issuance of government bonds. "This inflation would not only be reflected in increased price levels but also would tend to depress the price of government bonds, and thus entail hard-ships to investors." As the National Industrial Conference Board concludes:
