NEW YORK, July 23.—The maternal instinct overrides the promptings of jealousy in the heart of Mrs. Kate Granetelli, whose husband, Frank, in company with Mrs. Alma Lotus, attempted suicide. Alma Lotus will live. The life of Frank Granetelli hangs in the balance, but the mind of the wronged wife is "made up."

"Will I forgive him?" she asked, her pale face drawn with suffering, her dark eyes sadder than her twenty-four years should warrant.

"I suppose I will forgive Frank if he wants to come back to me. My reasons? Here they are—two of them."

About her knees clustered two of the little family of three, Benedict, four and Jasper, two and one-half. Baby Rose, three months old, was being wrapped up to be taken to the home of relatives.

"Think of what I have gone through," sighed Mrs. Granetelli. "A month before little Rose was born my husband met this woman. He got crazy, I guess. I didn't know any thing about her, though, till Decoration Day, when Frank's guilty conscience gave him away."

"A woman who knows us both had seen him with this Lotus woman. He imagined she had told me. But she hadn't. He came to me and said: 'So,

you know about that woman, who is a friend of mine?"

"I told him I didn't—and then he had to tell the rest of it. He said she was just a woman he had met on the street—that he didn't really care for her at all."

"All the time he would come in late—two, three, even four in the mornings. He would try to tell me he had been at shows or out with men."

"After the baby was born, when he would come in late, the noise would wake her up—after all my trouble getting the poor little thing to sleep. I told him I could not stand it—the wild life he was leading; that he would have to go for good. Finally, on June 12, he did leave. Since that time I have been a great deal with his mother."

"I couldn't bear it alone here in our nice little apartment. The children thought their father was dead. Benedict would say: 'Tell me mamma, is papa dead?' I couldn't say a thing, so I let him think so. He's lucky not to know what has happened."

"Things got so bad I had to take Frank into the Court of Domestic Relations, and there I got an order that he should pay me \$15 a week. He got \$50 a week when he worked. But that was not supposed to begin until July 15. Now he takes poison to end his life!"

"He worked in the insurance business. He had a policy for \$2,000 on his own life, but let it run out. If he dies what will become of us all? We can't live forever as my family or his people."

"If I had no children, or even one child, I would say this was the end. But I must think of them. I cannot help forgiving what he has done when I see them about me asking for 'papa.'"

"Would I forgive that woman?" I would scratch her eyes out. But no, I wouldn't. I wouldn't lower myself to fight with a woman who would rob children of their father."

"I hear today she is getting better."

Why did he have to take more poison than she did?"

A sympathetic neighbor had come in to offer assistance to the little family. The five-room apartment was well furnished and well cared for and Mrs. Granetelli had managed, in spite of her troubles, to make herself quite presentable. She is a pleasant looking young woman, a decided brunette type.

"Why should her husband be looking at another woman?" asked the neighbor. "She is so good and kind. I guess men don't care for such things any more."

"It was such a crazy thing to do." The young wife was still musing over the attempted suicide of her husband and Mrs. Lotus. "He must be crazy."

"Well what is the matter with you?" questioned the neighbor—not too consolingly. "Don't you know these people when they are what they call 'in love' are really crazy?"

COTTON SEED BUYERS TRY TO FORCE UP THE PRICE OF SEED

AUSTIN, July 23.—Efforts of cotton seed buyers to force farmers to sell their seed for \$25 a ton or less have been discovered by the State Department of Agriculture, which is receiving reports from South Texas points where cotton picking is already in progress. The State Department of Agriculture in a statement concerning this matter, said:

"While crude domestic oil, owing to heavy importation of foreign oils, is somewhat lower than last year, the difference does not begin to justify the attempt to start the market so low."

"Cottonseed should be worth, on a comparative basis with the price of other feedstuffs, at least \$50 a ton merely for feeding purposes. Of course, buyers do not expect reasonably to secure much cottonseed at such prices as \$25 per ton, but being aware that so few farmers are fixed for cottonseed storage they know from past experience that they will get some seed at the outset for whatever price may be offered."

Orphan By Parcel Post.

Dear Mr. O'Flaherty—I have completed a tour through a portion of Central West Texas and I noted the wonderful opportunities for agricultural development.

Of course I noted with great satisfaction the industrial development going on as a result of the discovery of oil. But we should not overlook the fact that agriculture and stock raising are the permanent assets of this marvelous section.

The land is a permanent heritage and the community which neglects its development is overlooking opportunities for bringing to it permanent prosperity. It matters not what is done in an industrial way, it is suicidal to neglect a country's agriculture. It is an economic truth that there can be no lasting prosperity in the midst of a famishing agriculture.

I want to witness an agricultural awakening in all Texas, for upon it depends the permanent prosperity of the state. Our business men should not slightly consider this question. And while inaugurating an industrial program for the future of this great section join to it an agricultural program, for when you neglect your agricultural possibilities you clog the wheels of real progress.

The establishment of the orchard and garden should be part of the program

of agricultural development. Your soils are splendidly adapted to the cultivation of many of the luscious fruits and should be utilized in their cultivation. Your rich valleys are suited to the pecan and great groves should be planted to bless and enrich the country.

There is no section of our great commonwealth where the breeding of pure bred livestock can be made more profitable, and I want to see every farm a stock farm as well as a crop farm.

Let not the business man neglect to foster and encourage the man who turns the sod and opens the furrow.

If elected to the high office I am seeking—commissioner of agriculture—I shall employ the most efficient men available to assist in stimulating and giving a new impetus to our agricultural affairs and to point the way to better farm methods and practices.

I shall also promote a better and more efficient marketing system to enable the producers to dispose of their surplus product at remunerative prices. A system of agricultural development which overlooks this overlooked opportunity for service.

PRIMARY ELECTIONS.

Tomorrow primary elections will be held throughout Texas for the nomination of candidates for representatives in congress from the eighteen districts of the state, a governor and heads of all state departments, members of the legislature, judges of the various courts and county and precinct officers.

But little attention has been given to the campaign for any office other than that of governor and one or two contestants for representative in congress. Until within the last few days, candidates have complained of a want of interest on the part of the voters.

Texas has long been "politically ridden to death." While there has been much dissatisfaction with all administrations for several years, the people appear to express their grievances by talking, but on election day fail to go to the polls and cast a ballot in an

effort to correct the wrongs of which they complain.

If the affairs of the state are badly administered, the remedy rests with the voters. If they neglect a patent duty, take no interest in politics, fail to vote, they should not be heard to cry out against the results of an election which they, by exercising their right of franchise, might have prevented.

The ward politician, the secker after petty place under any and all administrations, never fail to vote. Their vote is their only stock in trade. This being the case and with the good citizen, the business man, through neglect or indifference, failing to go to the polls, leaves the selection of the men to administer the affairs of government to the class most poorly fitted so to do.

Property holders complain of the burden of taxation, yet will not take the trouble to go to the polls and aid in electing to office men who will make an honest effort to reduce taxation and see that government is economically administered.

The right of franchise is a privilege and at the same time a duty. Every good citizen owes it to himself and to his neighbor to exercise this right in an effort to secure good government.

If a large vote is polled in Texas tomorrow, it will be largely owing to the vigorous campaign made by the candidates for the gubernatorial nomination and that of some candidates for congress, yet there are many other offices of rare importance, members of the legislature, for instance, which have been almost ignored.

It is to be hoped, however, that every citizen having the right to vote will exercise that right to-

morrow. With a full and free expression of all the voters, better results are obtained and there is less complaint following the elections.

GROWTH OF TEXAS.

From compilation of census figures for Texas, indications are that when the final report is made it will be shown that this state has a population of more than 2,000,000.

It is apparent that the state will show a greater percentage of growth from 1910 to 1920 than either of the two preceding decades.

While there has been such a rush of people to the centers of population and while there has been a decrease in country population throughout most of the states, or at least most counties doing little more than standing still, Texas will show a healthy rural increase in nearly every county in the state. In a few counties there will be shown a small decrease, but this is in counties of small population.

This being the case in Texas, the wonderful increase in many leading cities of the state is not chargeable to the abandonment of the farm, but is evidence of the vast development of the commercial and manufacturing interests of the state.

Review this and think how small the development of Texas, when compared with the possibilities. When the census report reaches that part where is told the increase of property values, that is where will be met a greater surprise than that caused by the statement of the increase in the population of the state.

THE WORLD'S HOPE GETTING SLENDER.

The fair hopes for the regeneration of the world that had centered in the third party convention at Chicago seem all but blasted, in fact, the world may be thrown back entirely on its own resources unless the prospect brightens soon.

And the obstacle that has obtruded itself between us and Utopia is such an insignificant one, too. It is merely that the world regenerators cannot agree among themselves on how the regeneration business is to be done. Nothing more than that.

It seemed so simple at the start. All that was necessary was that the Committee of Forty-eight, representing forty-

eight different nations, should hook up with the Labor party, composed of only a few groups, and that these units when comfortably agreed should amalgamate with such Socialist groups as have broken away from the Socialist and Socialist-Labor parties, and then draw in the Single Taxers, after which there would be nothing to do to complete the organization but to fuse with the Irish, the Plumb Plan League, and such other groups as came away mad from the Republican and Democratic conventions. When these little details should have been accomplished all in the world the new party had to do was to write a platform satisfactory to Senator La Follette.

Will it be believed that the regenerators have failed to do it? Surprising, but true. What's the matter with men when they just won't think alike, not even when taken by the ears and shaken soundly? And how are they going to be made over and run into the proper molds when they obstinately grab their hats and go and hold another convention of their own, as these Single Taxers have done? It's most discouraging. Sometimes it almost seems as though the world would have to be allowed to go to smash its own way.

There was indeed a lingering hope up to the minute Mr. La Follette was heard from. But he has spiked that now. After the convention had been strained through the various sieves down to the point where the residue could agree on a platform, the prospective candidate sends word that he doesn't agree. This is the most remarkable phenomenon of all—Mr. La Follette doesn't agree. Good heavens, and now an understudy has been chosen maybe the voters won't agree! Things never looked tougher for the world. And what makes the regenerators want to cry is that the world doesn't seem to care a hang how tough things get.—Kansas City Star.

CISCO ALIVE TO OPPORTUNITY

The Cisco chamber of commerce is evidently composed of some very live wires imbued with some very practical ideas in the matter of city building. The Cisco chamber of commerce takes it for granted that one of the liveliest questions in the mind of every patriotic and progressive citizen is the proper educational facilities for the rising generation, and claiming to have educational advantages of no mean order, this organization has just sent out 10,000 circulars to citizens of Eastland, Callahan, Stephens and Shackelford counties, call-

ing their attention to the educational facilities existing in that town, and this action has already influenced about 100 families to locate in Cisco, according to the claim of the Cisco paper.

The point the Daily Oil Belt News desires to make in this connection is why was not something of this kind done for Eastland? This city has every possible advantage that could possibly be claimed by Cisco, with many others added, one of which is that being the county seat and the center of the greatest oil field in Texas, there is no question about Eastland making the real city of this portion of Texas.

But Eastland is apparently making no effort for the dissemination of information or publicity of this kind, although we have a chamber of commerce of 1,200 members, with an expense budget of \$50,000 per annum. Are we waiting for these things to come to us of their own accord? Or, are we indifferent to such development? We give some excerpts from the Cisco circular that seems to be doing the desired work:

"The city of Cisco desires to call attention to the advantages of Cisco as a residence city, and especially its educational advantages.

The public schools have been given special attention the last few years and have now reached a high degree of efficiency.

"Our equipment consists of one large high school building and two splendid new ward buildings. Each is adequately heated with steam, and in the very best sanitary condition. Every desk has been chemically sterilized. Arrangements have been made to protect against any possible shortage of gas.

A bond election for \$250,000 has been ordered for July 24, for a new high school, with every prospect of being carried.

NEW TYPE OF WAR INSANITY IS SEEN IN HERO OF WAR WHO MURDERED WIFE



Wanderer Affected Same as From Shell Shock, But Abnormal Mental State Gave No Sign of Existence Through Physical Being — Theory.

NEW YORK, July 23.—A war hero, Lieutenant Carl Wanderer, of Chicago, has killed his wife because, he says, he wanted to return to army life, because he hated her for the reason that she was to become a mother.

"I loathed married life," he said, after confessing to the crime. "I wanted to get back into the army. I grew to love the army life while serving in France. It's free and easy. It's the life for me."

Wanderer planned and staged a hold-up, with the aid of a ragged tramp whom he hired to play "robber." It is believed Wanderer also killed this man to silence him.

During the war men were taught to fight and kill. Human life was held cheap. If anything got in a soldier's way—an enemy or disobedient underling—his life wasn't worth much.

Such a view of life and death cannot always be quickly set aside upon returning to civilian life.

A man with so little fear of the taking of life is as much a victim of war insanity as any poor, stunned shell-shock patient. But the man whose equilibrium has been shaken by battle, or the sights of war, carries the label of his condition in shakily limbs, queer speech or lack of speech, hypersensitiveness and loss of memory.

Wanderer's abnormal mental state gave no sign of its existence through his physical being.

Not until such a distorted mind wills the destruction of another person does the mental twist announce itself.

Wanderer's crime was no careless flame of anger against the woman who was to be his child's mother. His hate had been smoldering for a long time.

Since he had won the D. S. C. for bravery and the Croix de Guerre, and fought in the Seventeenth machine gun battalion, one might imagine he would, if about to commit murder, plan the deed in some courageous style.

But he resorted to the "frame-up," the means that is taken by the underhanded, the sneak and the coward.

The victim of a "frame-up" never has a chance to fight back, to answer a charge or to call for help. The cards are marked against him.

Whiskey helped along this ignominious crime a little. Wanderer claims now to have been drinking heavily, but admits his hate was born of sober moods. He met a strange man on Madison street in Chicago, entered into conversation with him, bought him drinks and offered him money if he would fake a robbery.

The stranger was reluctant, but more whiskey changed his mind. Wanderer had money enough to pay the accomplice, for he had drawn out or got his wife to draw out of the bank \$1,500 she had there in her own name.

Meeting the stranger that day was mere chance, but such an opportunity waits for anyone looking for it.

"It seemed as if fate was playing into my hand," Wanderer says now.

"You won't need to be afraid," said the hero of the World War to the tramp. "I am a good shot and won't be apt to show r—"

The fearless machine gunner confided

in the chance acquaintance how much he hated his wife and the expected child, and of how difficult it was for a man to make a living in these days.

In his confession to the police Wanderer has gone over the details of the shooting and told how he petted his wife and took her out to a moving picture theater, carefully planning the hour of their reaching home so the tramp could be waiting at the appointed time in the vestibule.

"She fell for my stuff," says the lieutenant cynically, in speaking of his dead wife's credulity in drawing money out of the bank and giving it to him unsuspectingly.

So the deed was done, and Wanderer, whose plan was carried out so neatly, could no longer conceal his part and broke down and confessed.

His recital of the crime is proof that murder will out, although in many cases revelation is slow in presenting itself.

War, which has been the making of many men, was the undoing of Wanderer. His war glory, with cross and medal, made him in his own opinion a superhero who could try to triumph over the ordinary exigencies of domestic life.

He would kill his wife and unborn child, he decided, and none would be the wiser. Why not? Hadn't he killed many in the war at close range, and others who got within the range of his gun? He didn't know their names, of course, hadn't known them in civil life. How could he know the enemy, and what difference would it make killing them?

"Then, he would argue with himself, if you want to kill someone you hate, and what a hateful thing a wife and child can be when you want only to have a good time, when you want to kill, why let the fact that you are personally acquainted with your 'enemy' stop things?"

Wanderer's act is one of the most horrible of crimes. It would be revoltingly ordinary. But the murderer was considered a hero, decorated as such. Probably many young men whose duties prevented them from fighting or whose health forced them to fight the war from a swivel chair, envied him, or patronized him.

His deed gives rise to the question often put as to the precise nature of physical courage. Does real valor necessarily have a part in it? Is it not something merely the manifestation of brutish instinct and insensitiveness?

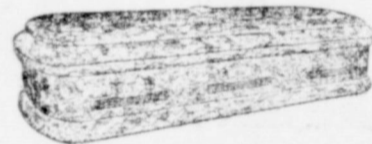

OIL PRODUCTIONS OF EASTLAND COUNTY THIRTEEN MILLIONS

The oil interests of Eastland county have made tax renditions for the year of over \$1,000,000 more than the total rendition of the entire county of Eastland rendered two years ago.

Two years ago the total renditions of the county was a little over \$12,000,000, while the renditions of twelve oil companies and one pipe line company for this year totals \$13,710,860, or nearly one million and a half dollars more than the entire county two years ago.

This sum represents the personal property, the leases and the vast amount of improvements that the oil companies have made in Eastland county in the year and one-half that they have been in Eastland county.

This rendition does not include the great number of smaller companies whose renditions will not go much over \$100,000, nor does it include the many other industries, and personal property belonging to the citizens of the county which will make the total renditions of the county approximate \$50,000,000 for the present year.

The renditions of the Prairie Oil & Gas company is nearly one-half of all the sum rendered by the big companies.

OIL NEAR COLORADO ADVANCES PRICE OF ALL TOWN PROPERTY

COLORADO, July 23.—On the strength of Colorado having an oil well one piece of real estate has just sold for \$30,000 and other city property is mounting in price.

The Texas and Pacific No. 1 of the Underwriters' Oil company, ten miles west of town, is estimated conservatively to be good for 200 barrels a day on the pump. W. S. Cooper, secretary of the local chamber of commerce, in a statement to the West Texas chamber of commerce, declares after watching hauling for some time, 90 barrels were brought up without lowering the oil appreciably.

Other wells are to be spudded in shortly. Many new oil operators are drifting into the field. The well will be put on the pump as soon as the apparatus arrives.

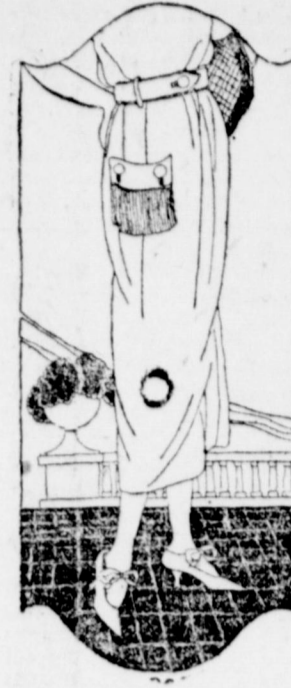

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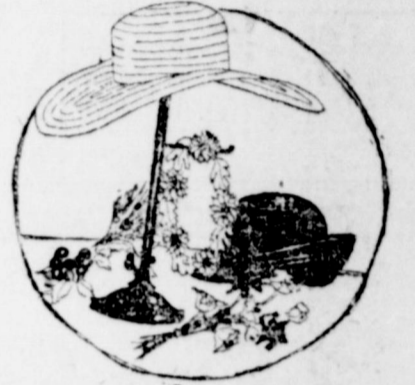
