# BUTLER CASE

### Time and Place for Trial Await Formal Papers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. - The formal charges upon which Maj. Gen. Smedley D. Butler, U. S. M. C., must face a court-martial will be in the hands of Secretary of the Navy Charles Francis Adams either this afternoon or Monday, according to information at the office of the Judge-Advocate of the navy.

While none would reveal the exact charges it was considered cer-tain that Butler's comments upon Premier Mussolini, of Italy, which caused his prosecution would be viewed in the official papers either as conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman or as conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline. Arrangements Wait.

Secretary Adams said today he had not determined either the time or the place for the trial. It was helieved it would be held in Washington or at one of the naval establish ments near by and that court would convene within the next two weeks. Definite announcement of time and place is expected to follow the presentation of the papers to Adams.

(By United Press) The spectre of mob violence inshrouded three Texas cities tonight

and two negroes were guarded from open threats of lynching. A white man charged with murder was whisked from town and taken to the Dallas county jail for safe-keeping. The negro suspected of attempting to assault a white woman at Midland at noon today was lodged in

Midland's new jail. Tonight after angry crowds gathered on the streets the negro, who had not been identified by the woman, was saved from lynching by Chief of Police Lee Haynes who rushed the suspect to a cell and assembled guards around the building hurriedly.

Violence threatened at Mount Pleasant today following the death of Willie Stewart, 31-year-old farmer, from injuries received when he was struck by a hammer thrown by Harvey Riley, negro. # Nearly 1,200 Paid to 6 o'Clock Saturday evening ....

The extent of public interest in the forthcoming city election is re-flected in the volume of poll taxes paid at the city hall prior to today. The total of poll taxes paid and exemption certificates issued exceeds by several hundred the number of such receipts and certificates issued last year, according to City Secretary W. B. Statham.

At 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. Statham said that 905 poll taxes had been paid and 216 exemption certificates issued making a total of 1121 citizens who had qualified for participating in the city election next April. The full number of voters who have qualified themselves cannot be determined until Monday or Tuesday, however, due to the fact that many payments were placed in the mails Saturday and receipts cannot be issued until they arrive at the secretary's office. Many other citizens paid their poll taxes in person at the secretary's office after o'clock Saturday evening, the office remaining open until 9 o'clock to take care of those wishing to obtain their receipts.

Fayment of ad valorem taxes has been good, Mr. Statham said. Such payments have been about on par with previous years.


