Failures Increase **During November**

AUSTIN, Dec. 11.—Commercial ailures increased sharply in Texas during November, and the liabilities of the bankrupt firms were also substantially greater than those of the preceding month and the corresponding month last year. according to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

The number of failures during the month averaged six each week just twice the weekly average of the preciding month and November last year.

Total liabilities of \$203,000 represented increases of 34 per cent and 27 per cent over the two comparable periods, but average per cent and 40 per cent respec-


