AMERICANS IN AUSTRALIA

The American navy touring the Pacific has arrived in Australia, and is receiving a fervid welcome. Everywhere the Americans are received with enthusiasm. The Victoria parliament adjourns for three weeks to enable members to do their share of entertaining. A threatened street car strike in Melbourne is called off because the unionists do not want to interfere with the pleasure of the visitors. The public shows its friendship in unmistakable ways.

All this is natural and expected, though none the less grateful to the visitors and their people at home. The Americans and Australians are largely of the same blood, Australian orators remark, and their two great democracies are akin in spirit. The American soldiers in Europe during the World War found it easier to fraternize with the Australians than with any other contingent there. The two nations understand and like each other as nations seldom do.

The visit of the American fleet is a fortunate event for both, because it serves to emphasize this friendship Each is destined to play a big part in future history, at opposite ends of the greatest of oceans.

There is nothing menacing, either, in this visit to our. antipodean friends, as some of our Mongolian friends feared. It is good for navies to visit other countries as messengers of peace.

NATURALIZATION SNAGS

It is not only harder to get into the United States than it used to be. It is harder to get naturalized after the alien arrives.

Many former Canadians are now discovering this to their sorrow. They are those who have not come through the regular immigration channels, or who for some other reason have failed to establish a record of their entrance. Candidates for naturalization are now required to produce a certificate of arrival. Those who have no such certificate are technically not in the country, and so of course not eligible to citizenship. Thus Canadians who have come by "bootleg" routes, instead of through the regular ports EASTLAND'S FLOWER SHOW of entry, pay dearly for the slight trouble and expense they avoided. 





These certificates are second class be-cause they are obtained by examination. All certificates obtained by examination after September 1, 1925 will be second class and all those obtained through college training will be first class.

"The second class elementary certificate is legally valid in any public school in the elementary grades, but the second class high school certificate is only legally valid only in unclassified high schools of the third class. All cer-tificates issued prior to September 1, 1925 have the same validity as heretofore. The certificates issued, valid for life, to a person who has taught six years on a state first grade certificate since 1910 is only a first grade certificate and not a permanent certificate within the meaning of the law. It has not been legal to issue a county certificate of any kind since September

ne letter states that the cor-ondence in the state superinnt's office at Austin indicates mistaken idea prevails concerning the school age. This ex-tends from 7 to 21 years as heretofore, the bill offered in the legislature to reduce the age to 6 years having failed to pass.
