Turkey Growers To File Certificates

Turkey producers and growers and contract producers who have not already done so should contact their ASCS County Offices immediately to determine their eligibility to vote on the proposed national turkey marketing order and to certify the quantity of turkeys they marketed in 1961. Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said June 1st.

Those eligible to vote in the referendum will include producer-growers who marketed more than 3,600 pounds (liveweight) of turkeys in 1961, and contract producers who in 1961 had a risk of loss contract in turkeys produced by a producer grower.

The Chairman explained that the general voting on the turkey marketing order will extend from June 18 through 22, at the ASCS County office where the producer's certifications are filed.

To become effective, the turkey marketing order must be approved by at least two-thirds of the producers voting, by number or by volume of their production. If the order is approved, the growers would then have two market supply management measures available to them whenever needed as determined and operated by an Industry Administrative Committee.

Under one method, the quantity of turkeys handlers could acquire from producers would be limited to producer "allotments." The other method would require handlers to set aside quantities of turkeys considered surplus for a marketink year or period. Such turkeys could not be marketed in normal channels. The set-asides would be disposed of by the Industry Administrative Committee, and net proceeds from the eventual sale of the set-aside pool would be distributed to producers.

Only the second described method could be used for 1962 should producers approve the turkey marketing order in the June referendum.

The only motel in Texas catering exclusively to cattle, is located some two miles west of Baird on U. S. Highway 80. Three West Texans, one from Baird and two from Abilene, pooled their ideas and resources and the C & C Cattle Rest was the result.

The first problem confronting the three men: Jake Collins, Baird cattle trucker; Jimmy Parker, Abilene order cattle buyer, and Bryant Taylor, Abilene cattle trucker, was location. After looking over several in the area, they selected a 24 acre tract at the top of the hill west of Baird on Highway 80. Some two months ago, they got possession of the land and started construction.

The plant, though far from being completed, went into use this week as more than 500 cattle moved in to await shipment to California. At the present time, there are eight sturdy holding pens and rest pens, and four treating pens. There is a long alley dividing the two groups of pens, which also leads to the double decker loading chute.

The principal service offered by the cattle motel is holding cattle for area buyers and the providing of a rest station on long hauls. Buyers can make the area sales and bring their purchases to the holding pens where they will be kept until a load is accumulated. The rest pens are used by truckers who pick up loads in Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi or Louisiana for shipment to Arizona and on to the West Coast. The rest stop breaks the trip for the driver and for the cattle. Feed and water is provided during the stay, which usually is six to eight hours. Doctoring pens and chutes are provided for cattle which are hurt or need treatment in any way. Cattle are easily unloaded and are just as easily reloaded.

New 15-ton beam type scales, measuring 9x22 feet are being constructed for use by buyers in the area. The scales are the most accurate available and the beam construction allows correct weight at whatever location the animals are placed on the platform.

Jake Collins of Baird, is resident manager of the operation. He said that employees would be on hand 24 hours a day to care for animals whenever they arrive.

Future plans call for building of additional pens, the erection of a feed barn and office, and the building of large signs. In the plans for the future, is a feed lot operation where cattle are fed out for market, Collins said.

The operators invited everyone to visit and inspect the new operation. It was also pointed out that area livestock raisers were invited to bring their cattle to the pens for dehorning, vaccination, or for many other services which many ranches are not equipped to do. Small service charges will be made for this service.






