JUDGE RULES INCOME CASE TO BE HEARD

CHICAGO, July 31.—Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson today permitted attorneys for "Scarface" Al Capone to withdraw the gang leader's plea of guilty in the income tax case, but reserved decision on the prohibition conspiracy plea until September 8.

Justice Wilkerson upset prearranged plans to rule on the case this afternoon by calling Capone, his attorneys, a number of the federal grand jury and government prosecutors into court this morning.

Capone was not in court, although ordered in by the judge. United States marshals were unable to find him on such short notice.

The liquor conspiracy case charging 5,000 violations was ordered re-submitted to the federal grand jury for return of indictments providing a higher penalty than that provided on a conspiracy charge.

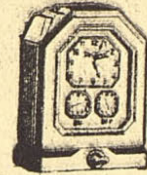

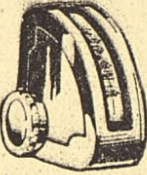

RANDOLPH TO ASK SUPPORT OF CITIZENS

By E. BUFORD ISAACK, Dean Randolph College

In our last article we called attention as they now are, it is time Randolph but in no less a degree Randolph college needs Cisco. Their interests are mutual and it is just as necessary for Cisco to support Randolph as for Randolph to support Cisco. It seems to me that with conditions as they now are, it is time for every loyal citizen of Cisco to forget any grievance he may have had in the past, put his shoulder to the wheel and do all in his power to insure the success of Randolph. Now is the time for every good citizen to come to the aid of his college. You ask how you can help. There are several ways that we will mention in this article.

Need Students

Probably the biggest service you can render to Randolph is to send your child there for the first two years of his college education. No college can exist without students and a large per cent of these students must come from the community in which the college is located. Randolph needs 135 students next year to be able to pay running expenses and 50 of these must come from Cisco. If you send your boy or girl away to school it will cut that number by one and will make Randolph's income lack \$100.00 of being sufficient to meet her expenses and to that extent cripple the college. How can a citizen be loyal to Cisco and send his child to some other college than Randolph? Our merchants and business men are trying to educate the people to trade at home for they realize that home institutions must be kept going. The person consistent buys his goods away from home is not a good citizen. Yet some of the people of Cisco who preach that doctrine the least send their children away to college when they could send them to Randolph and help a home institution. If I am disloyal to my home town when I buy from a mail order house what about the merchant, the business man, or the average citizen when he patronizes a college in another city rather than Randolph. His home town college?

Obtain Credits

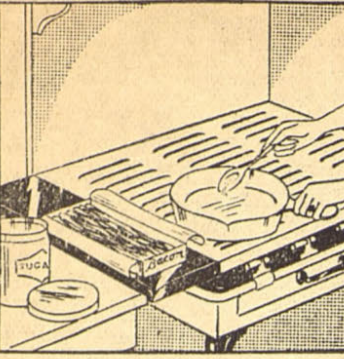
It would be different if equal advantages could not be secured at Randolph but whatever line of work the student may desire to follow, the first two years are mostly general in nature and can be secured at Randolph as well as elsewhere. In fact it is now generally conceded that a junior college gives better training than does a senior college or a university in its first two years. If Randolph is to succeed it must have your boy or girl as a student. We must adopt the motto: "Every eligible Cisco boy or girl a student in Randolph next year."

Another way you can help is to bring students from other communities to Cisco to attend Randolph. Practically every man and woman in Cisco has a younger brother or sister, a nephew or a niece or a cousin in who is eligible this year to attend college. Arrange for one of them to live in your home and attend Randolph. This is being done in a small way every year but this year should be done on a much larger scale. In this way students could be secured from all over the state and every student thus secured makes us just one nearer of attaining our goal and running the college on a cash basis.

Perhaps, if you are unable to accommodate one of them in your home, you could be instrumental in persuading him to stay in the dormitory. If every man and woman of Cisco would think over the list of his kinsfolk or friends in other places and write a letter to any that are eligible to attend college, and urge them to come to Randolph many new students could be secured.

Some of our best students are working their way through school and you will be doing a service to them as well as to the college if you help them.

Many other ways might be mentioned whereby you could help Randolph and we hope that every resident of Cisco will be in a sympathetic helpful attitude, ready to do whatever is necessary. Randolph must succeed and it cannot succeed unless it has the undivided support of the people of Cisco.

COLUMBUS, O., July 31. — Mary Katharine Campbell, of this city, twice winner of the Atlantic City beauty tournament, is sorry that she was ever considered the most beautiful girl in the United States.

It was nine years ago that Miss Campbell, then a 16-year-old high school graduate, was crowned Miss Columbus, and later, by a committee of artists, as Miss America. Her triumph was repeated for the second consecutive year in 1923 when she defeated Charlotte Nash, Miss St. Louis, who recently was acquitted by a French jury on a charge of murdering her husband a wealthy Philadelphia man.

In an interview, Miss Campbell, who now divides her time between keeping house for her father, H. R. Campbell, and modelling dresses, denounced any notoriety which she had gained by reason of her achievement.

"I wish that I had not been chosen Miss America. I wish people would forget that I was ever considered the most beautiful girl

in the country, so that I might live my own life," she exclaimed.

Miss Campbell retains all the charm that made her the first choice of a nation. Five feet six inches tall, she weighs 130 pounds, and her friends wonder how she manages to keep the beauty and figure that caused her to win the contest.

The young lady has been in the limelight in her home city ever since she won the contest amid the country's applause.

PENNSYLVANIA MAY USE RADIO TO FIGHT FIRES

The Juab State Relief Society of the Mormon church is in the market for all the flies that can be caught. It has already purchased 51 quarts on the theory that a steady campaign will reduce the fly nuisance in this community.

GERMAN HARMONICAS LURES U. S. DOLLARS

Last year Germany exported 50,000,000 mouth organs worth over \$5,000,000 and 700,000 accordions, the United States being one of the best customers.

summer parks are overcrowded, their soft-drink pavilions, vaudeville shows and circuses doing a usucy business. Beer cellars rarely have a vacant seat.

In the long white nights the sound of recordio floats through the green boulevards that circle Moscow in two wide concentric rings. Youth sings and plays and flirts, forgetful of the Pattenka and disdainful of the radio horns which blab unintelligibly in the public squares. Red soldiers with their arms around servant girls make marvelous economies of space, sometimes three couples on a single bench, with room to spare.

Movies Popular

Moving picture shows are jammed, especially those which advertise ancient productions of Harold Lloyd and Charlie Chaplin; the populace has a way of patronizing most enthusiastically those films which the politicians of art denounce as "ideologically harmful." Theater tickets must be reserved days or weeks ahead.

Notwithstanding physical hardships and ceaseless political dictation from above, the horizons of existence have broadened out for the majority of Russians. Perhaps 50,000,000 of them have at least learned to read and write and are losing their superstitious awe of the printed word. About 60,000,000 men, women and children have begun, unwillingly most of them, to pool their toil on collective farms and are familiarizing themselves with modern machinery, regular hours of labor, schools, clubs, dispensaries, libraries—all of which previously they dared not even dream.

Aside from the faithful Communists, many of whom bring a religious fervor to their difficult tasks, there is a growing army of so-called "udarniki," or "shock troops." These are men and women, even more so boys and girls, who dedicate themselves to the cause of greater production. As against the passive mass, these are the active vanguard.

Much of the dedication of course, is empty lip-service. To be an "udarnik" gives one not only greater political prestige, but an important slice of privilege in matters of food, clothing, housing and schooling for the children. A large proportion enroll as "udarniki" for what there is in it. Enough of these troops though are genuinely imbued with the crusading spirit, gen-
