County Commissioners Working On Equalization Of Tax Roll

Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson and the four commissioners have spent the past two weeks studying the tax and financial structure of the county in preparation for the valuation program now underway by the commissioners court.

At the regular meeting of the commissioners court Monday the commissioners set a minimum valuation on land in Callahan County for taxing purposes at \$6 per acre exclusive of improvements. The figure is the minimum, it was pointed out. It will mean an increase for the majority of the holders of the some 548,000 acres of farm and ranch land in Callahan County, and in some instances there will possibly be a decrease.

Commissioners pointed out that the increase was brought about by a loss in tax revenue from oil and utility properties and other losses. Much of the land, it was pointed out, is on the tax rolls at the same valuation carried in 1919. While cost of government, and the requirements have increased many times, taxes have remained much the same for many years, in the rural areas particularly, it was reported.

Notices will be mailed to all whose tax picture is being changed, and those who desire, may appear before the board to present their case. A recent audit report reflected the importance of the increase, it was reported. The report showed that the county had been spending each year considerable more than income, and that the surplus which was on hand a few years ago, has diminished.

Visitors were taken on a tour of the attractive and modern units. There are 16 apartments in four categories. There are four with three bedrooms, four with two bedrooms, four with one bedroom and four small apartments with combination living-bedroom.

All who saw the apartments were high in their praise for the units. They are complete in every detail and were planned for maximum efficiency. Visitors complimented members of the local authority on a fine job, and the local authority praised the general contractors for the quality work and for completing the job well ahead of schedule.

Applications for rentals are being taken at the offices of the authority located in the Callahan County Abstract building.

Flood Control Bids Called For

Invitations for bids to build Sites 1A and 1B, Turkey Creek are being circulated by the Soil Conservation Service. Bids will be opened at 2:00 p.m. June 5, 1963, in Temple, Texas, State headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service.

Estimated contents of the major items of construction are: 260,750 cubic yards of compacted earthfill material, 133 cubic yards of reinforced concrete and 410 feet of spun concrete pipe for installation of principal spillways; 193 feet of corrugated metal pipe for toe drains; 81,460 square yards of topsoil to be placed in emergency spillway and embankments for establishing grass; and 18,700 feet of fencing to protect dams and spillways for minimum maintenance costs.

Construction is scheduled to begin with in 20 days following awarding of contract on June 5, and shall be completed within 305 calendar days from beginning. Construction of the two floodwater retarding structures will be under the supervision of Ralph W. White, Project Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service in Brownwood, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, Brownwood. Sites 1A and 1B Turkey Creek represent the eleventh and twelfth of the planned thirteen floodwater retarding structures to be contracted. Site 11, located approximately three miles below Cross Plains is the only structure remaining for construction.

Land rights and easements for construction are provided by the Turkey Creek Conservation District with operation and maintenance performed by the Central Colorado and Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Districts and Commissioners Courts from Callahan and Brown Counties. Conservation Programs on the land above floodwater retarding structures are a vital part of the Upstream Flood Prevention Program and assistance is provided for planning and applying conservation measures by Work Unit offices of the Soil Conservation Service at Baird and Rising Star, according to Hughes.

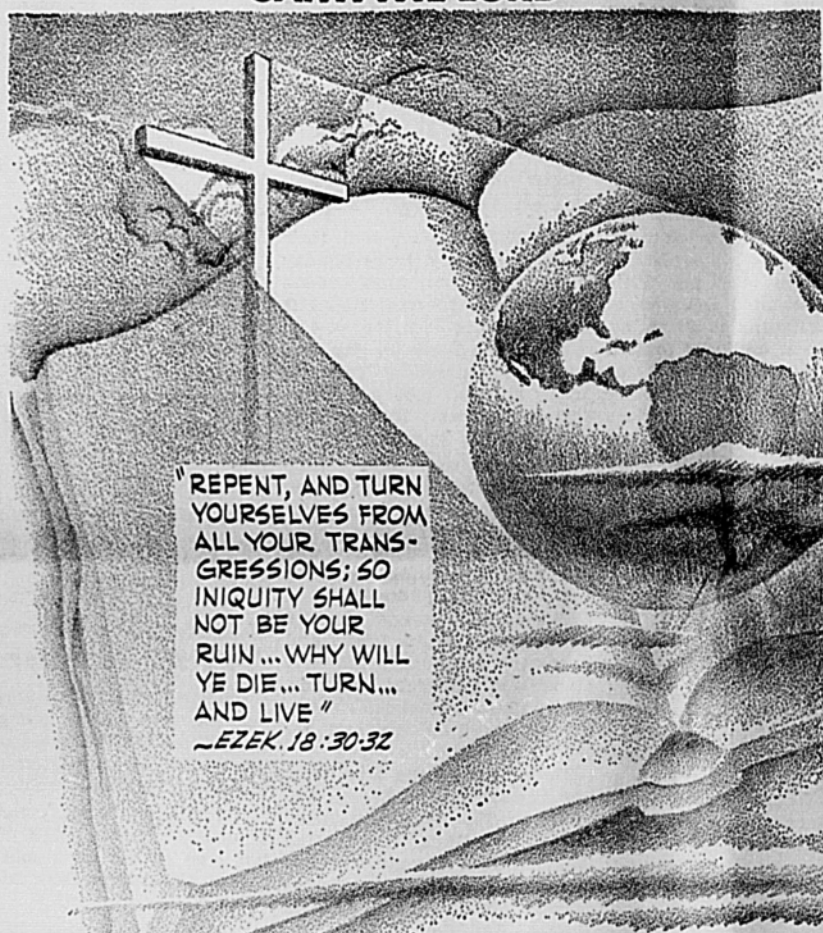



Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample boxes along their routes. "USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Gilbreath explains. "It is important everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Terrell Williams, Route 1; L. C. Gillit, Star Route 1; and Mrs. Winnie Burks, Star Route 2. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Gilbreath concludes.

"Soil Stewardship Week," May 19-26

"We Turn Our Eyes to the Future" is a fitting theme for the observance of Soil Stewardship Week, May 19 through 26, for we face major decisions as the management of our soil and water in a swiftly changing pattern of land use. What we decide today will have far-reaching effects tomorrow," it was pointed out this week by D. C. Cox, S.C.S. work supervisor for this area.

"Soil Stewardship Week is a time to reflect on the pleasures and benefits we derive from God's life-giving gifts of soil and water. It is a time to remember that these gifts were given to us for continuing use — not just for today. That they were bestowed on all of us — not just a few. That we all are utterly dependent on them for our very existence, to say nothing of our standard of living," Cox said.

"These are the material things. We should never cease to be grateful also for the richness that land and water add to our lives. What greater source of inner pleasure and serenity has our Creator given us than a beautiful landscape or a rippling stream? We have been blessed with much, and much is expected of us as stewards of these blessings."

"Today we are placing more demands on our land and water resources than ever before. New housing spreads out from cities into once - agricultural lands. New industries look for locations where water is plentiful. Non-farm folks look for open, green places for recreation and relaxation. Air conditioning systems and other modern improvements call for increasing amounts of water. These plus demands not yet envisioned provide the challenges and opportunities."

"It is up to us, as good stewards, to develop the potential richness of our soil and water resources. Conserve them we must, but conserving them means using them to fulfill our needs. Future generations will thus be grateful for the blessings that have been ours and are theirs."

"Land owners and operators in the more than 2,900 soil and water conservation districts across the Nation are looking to the future. They have broadened their concepts to include resource conservation planning for community - wide benefits. Urban people, too, are coming to recognize their direct role in resource development and are joining the team.

"We have been endowed with a great trust. All of us — not just a few of us — have the responsibility for stewardship and to plan for our needs for today and the future."

Full Info Needed On Screwworms

Livestockmen sending larvae specimens to screwworm eradication headquarters at Mission are urged by County Agent Pat C. Garner to be sure the information sheet that should accompany the sample is filled out completely and accurately.

Eradication officials have reported that numerous samples are received with no information included. Some have been identified as screwworms. Garner stated that prompt action is taken whenever an infestation is confirmed. In most instances, additional sterile flies are dispersed over the infested farm or ranch and livestock near the infested premises are sprayed at program expense.

"When samples are received with no information as to where it was collected, no action can be taken," the county agent said. "This could permit additional infestations to develop because no special sterile fly and spray treatment can be given to the area."

Eradication officials report less than 20 per cent as many screwworm infestations have been experienced during the first four months of 1963 as during the same period last year. If livestock producers continue to inspect their animals at least twice a week, treat wounds and infestations, collect samples and report cases, officials feel there should be no recurrence of heavy infestations as experienced last year.

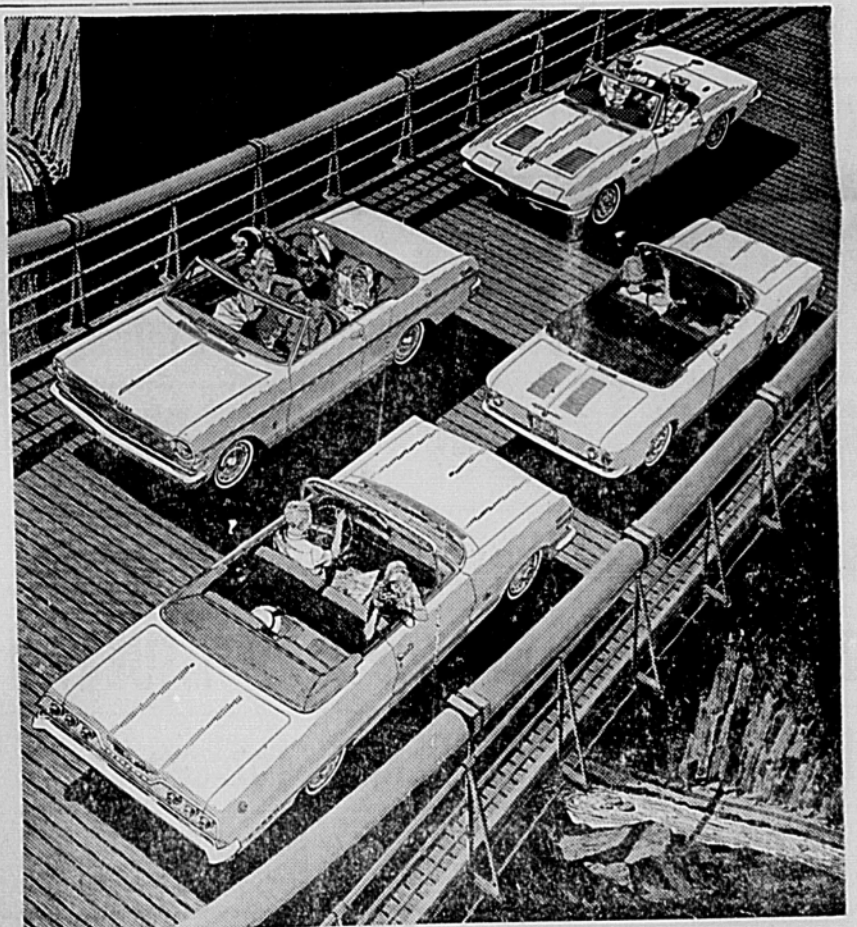
