Cisco, Eastland and Ranger today were voting upon whether or not sale of 3.2 per cent beer should be legalized within the limits of those

The vote at midday was slow, reflecting little public interest in the election. However, it was expected that late afternoon would bring out as many votes as had already been counted by 2:30 o'clock when 217 ballots had been registered at the two Cisco boxes.

Of this number 40 were cast in the East Cisco box and 177 in the

West Cisco box. Sheriff Virge Foster, in Cisco this morning to check up on alleged illegal sales of the brew, said that even if the vote is in favor of legalization of the sale, no dealer can lawfully handle it until he has obtained the proper licenses from the county clerk and the city, if city licenses are required.



TEXAS RELIEF BONDS

Texas is going to have to make good on its relief bond issue and provide a sum equal to that already expended by the federal government since October 20 or there will be no more relief grants from Washington, Harry L. Hopkins, national relief administrator, has notified Col. Lawrence Westbrook, Texas administrator. About \$3,000,000 in federal money has been spent in Texas by Uncle Sam on civil service relief since that time. Meanwhile Texas is having difficulty in disposing of state relief bonds authorized by recent constitutional amendment and voted by the legislature. Bids from banks and individuals at Austin yesterday failed to subscribe all the \$2,750,000 quota that was advertised. However, there was a possibility that bids yet in the mails would absorb the remainder of the issue.

The difficulty in disposing of these relief bonds-against which no valid issue as to soundness can be raised—seems to lie in the fact that no commission is allowed for their handling, which does not permit the issue to be underwritten by investment houses and parcelled out by them to their customers in the customary manner. And while the guests of the inn slept peacefully, there among the dumb beasts, because there was no room for them in the inn, a child was born—The King of Kings.

And that King of Kings said, "Suffer little children come unto me." And thus it was that the greatest short story ever told was written 2000 years ago. BILLIONS OF ASSETS

According to the census bureau of the government assets of \$17,032,539,620 for commercial companies operating electric light and power stations is shown in a bureau bulletin announcement of its census of electric industries. These statistics do not include establishments which consume all the energies generated, such as factories, hotels and other enterprises not in the nature of public utilities. And think of it, Samuel Insull, a former king of light and power, has been requested by the government of Greece to find a place of refuge under another flag or else face deportation.

CULY COBB AND HIS COTTON FIGURES

Cully Cobb of Washington, government cotton chief, made public figures to show that the south would be paid almost twice as much for its 1933 cotton crop as it would have received without the plow-up campaign. His figures are interesting. They show that if the farm price averages 9 1-2 cents a pound, "as now appears probable, the current crop will bring \$787,000,000 as contrasted with \$397,000,000 producers received for cotton in 1932." He pointed out that the yield per acre of land left in cultivation, estimated by the crop reporting board at 209.4 pounds, was one of the highest per acre yields on record. Now for 1934.





Mosquitoes are responsible for the spread of malaria, dengue, and yellow fever. Malaria is spread by the bite of the Anopheles or malaria mosquito. The best way to prevent these diseases is to destroy the breeding places of the mosquito They breed in any standing water, therefore, you should drain, ditch or fill such places, spray oil on water each week, too, or stock the water with surface minnows, as they will eat the wiggle-tails. Houses should be screened.

A Filthy Pest Flies help spread typhoid fever dysentery, diarrhea, tuberculosis anthrax and cholera They breed ve and feed in filth. To prevent their increase, all refuse should be isposed of at once, garbage kept in overed containers, privies made anitary and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies, so that their number is an excellent index to the sanitary condition. Typhoid vaccine is a harmless soution. This is injected under the skin in the upper part of the arm, n three doses, usually at weekly intervals. It ordinarily protects against the disease two to three years or longer, although one who is definitely exposed to infection should be revaccinated more fre-


