District Agent R. G. Burwell Will Retire January 31

Russell G. Burwell, district agricultural agent in Central Texas since 1947 with headquarters in Stephenville, will retire on January 31. His district includes Eastland County.

The transplanted Mississippian has served Texas agriculture for 40 years: first as a teacher of vocational agriculture at Santa Rosa, then as a U. S. Department of Agriculture plant quarantine inspector and since 1930 as an employee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Burwell began his long and distinguished career in the Extension Service as county agricultural agent in Willacy County in 1930. In 1934 he was transferred to the same position in Hidalgo County and in 1940 was named district agent for the South Texas district with headquarters in College Station. He moved from Bryan to Stephenville in 1947.

In making the announcement, Extension Director John E. Hutchison, said Burwell has made many outstanding contributions to Extension during his 35 years of dedicated service. His ability to counsel and train agents, his sense of humor and devotion to duty are but a few of his attributes. Burwell has always been a strong teacher with the ability to see the practical approach to most problems. Few Extension workers have ever en-

joyed more their contacts with the residents of the area they served than has Burwell. "We will miss his sense of wit and his practical philosophy as applied to work in the field of education. We wish for him continued good health and happiness in his retirement," the director added.

The retiring district agent is a native of Mississippi; a graduate of Meridian High School and Mississippi State University with a B. S. degree in agricultural education. He has done graduate work at Texas A&M University, University of California at Riverside and Colorado State and Louisiana State Universities. He has also attended many in-service training sessions as a part of his continuing professional improvement effort.

During his youth, he was a 4-H Club member for three years. This, perhaps, was the foundation for his interest in 4-H and aided him in supervising strong youth programs in the counties he served and also in the districts. Many state and national 4-H winners, individuals and judging and demonstration teams, have come from the programs he supervised. His agents have also developed many outstanding 4-H livestock feeders and their records in the major livestock shows and fairs are most impressive.

His district through the years has compiled one of the state's best records in the community improvement program. Farm, ranch and home demonstrations, by both adults and youth, have been successfully used to teach others the value of new practices, new crop varieties and new methods for doing jobs in the ever-changing agricultural industry. Extension training programs for foreign students in his district have been given international recognition. He has always worked closely with research personnel on field days and tours and in taking new findings to his agents and others.

Burwell will continue to make his home in Stephenville where he is active in church and civic affairs. He is a longtime member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, honorary Extension organization and of other organizations working for improvements in agriculture and rural living. Director Hutchison said no successor to Burwell has been named.

The ride back was on the inland side of Mustang Island where there was just as much to see.

A BIG AIRCRAFT carrier put into Corpus Christi during the past week with a load of 70 helicopters from Viet Nam. Many had bullet holes in them. One had the entire front end knocked out. One of the men told us they counted 22 bullet holes going into one of the choppers and only eight going out on the opposite side. It's the kind that hauls a dozen or so men. It gives you a funny feeling to try to figure out what must have happened.

CAPT. TRUDEAU flew B-24s in World War II — 50 or more missions from England over Germany. He's sold on being an Army helicopter pilot. He says the machines are getting better all the time and that they're becoming more and more useful as a military machine.

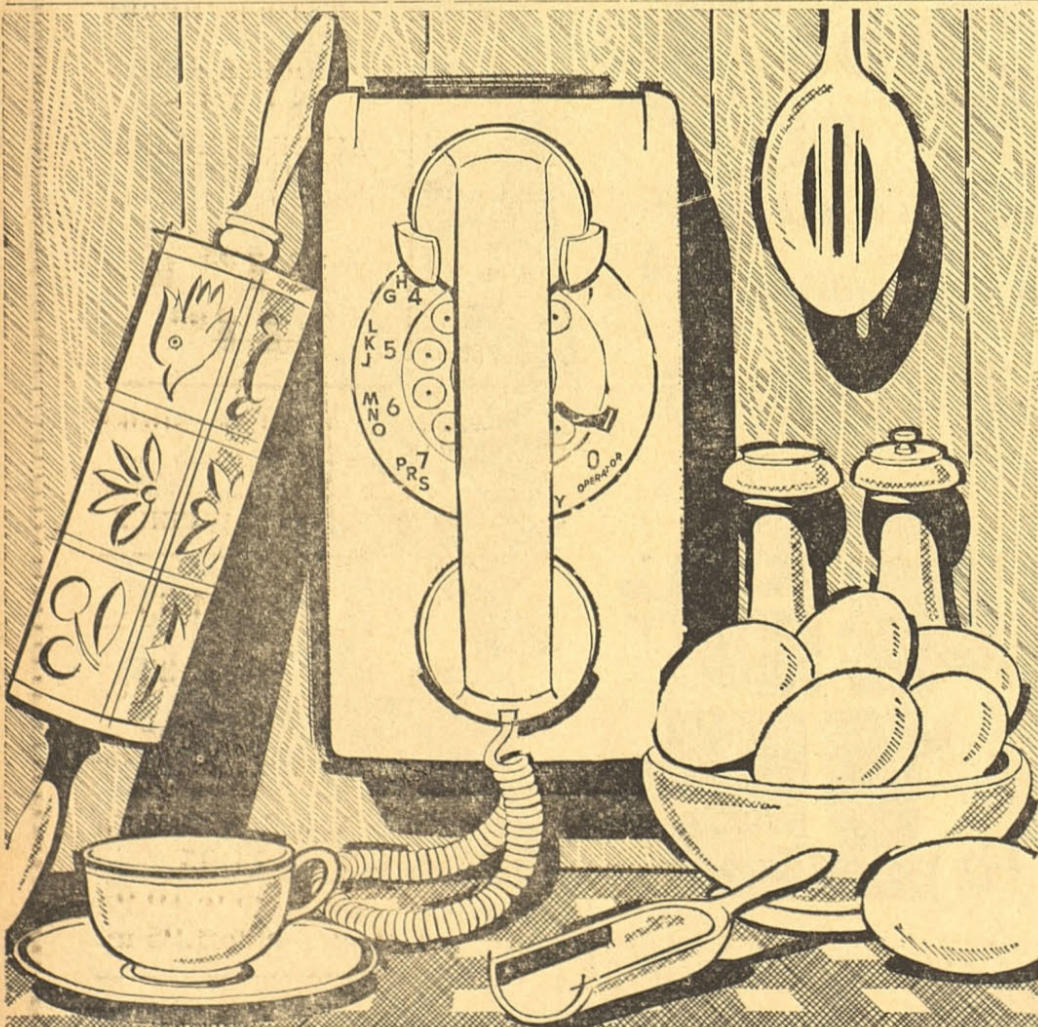

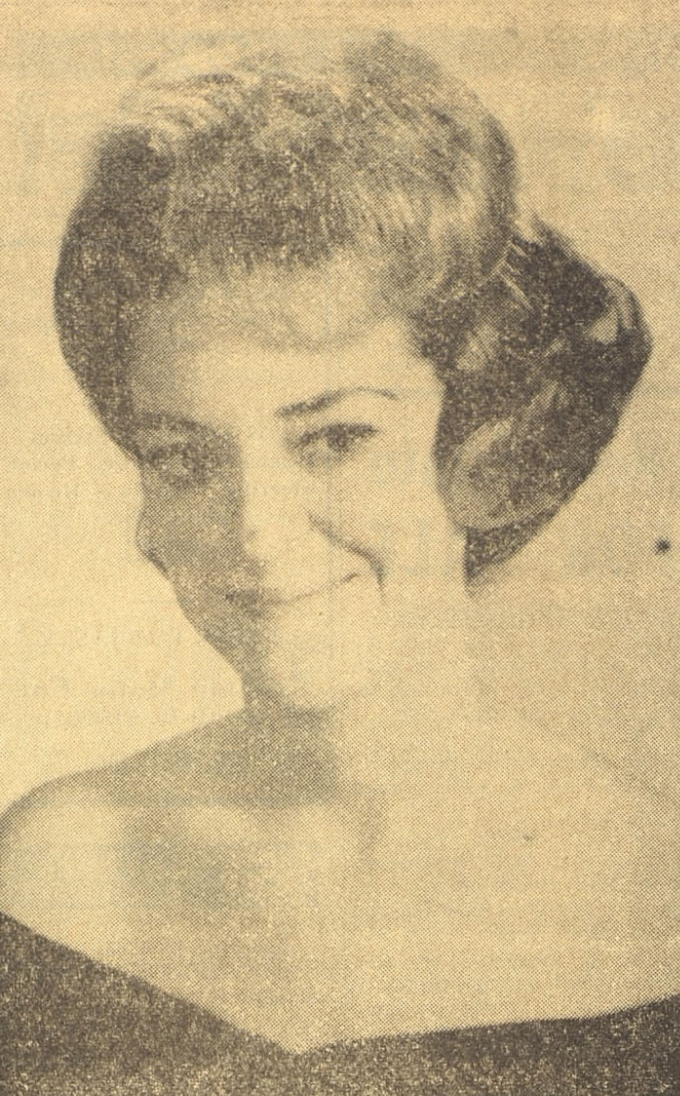

10 PERSONS KILLED IN '64 IN COUNTY TRAFFIC MISHAPS

The rural December traffic accident summary for Eastland County has been reported as follows:

No fatalities, eight personal injuries, and 13 accidents resulting in property damage. There were 13 persons injured and a total of \$10,790 in property damage.

Comparing traffic accidents occurring in 1964 with those in 1963, reports read as follows: 1964, 7 fatal accidents, 1963 -6; 1964, 75 personal injury accidents, 1963 - 67; and 1964, 149 property damage accidents, 1963 -118, making a total of 231 accidents in 1964 and 191 in 1963.

There were 10 deaths in 1964, only 6 in 1963; 114 persons injured in 1964 and 108 in 1963. The total amount of property damage in 1964 was \$141,590 and \$129,545 in 1963.
