PROCEEDS OF SALE MUST SATISFY THE MORTGAGE SHYLOCK

The lower house passed the "Debtor Relief Bill" Tuesday afternoon, by the decisive majority of 111 to 18. However, this bill is not a general moratorium, which is the only measure that can give the debtor class that relief he should have at this time, but it will doubtless serve to check the wholesale foreclosures of mortgage and trust deed liens that are now threatened to dispossess hundreds of their homes. The chief remedial provisions of the bill will prevent the foreclosing mortgage holder from taking any more than what the property brings under forced sale, with no judgment against the debtor for any balance that he may claim to satisfy his mortgage. In other words, when foreclosure proceedings are instituted, and the property is sold, the proceeds will satisfy the debt.

Few holding liens, it is believed, will want to foreclose if they can recover only what the property sells for, as the purpose of the loan shark has been to buy in the property for less than its value and take a judgment against his victim for the difference that may be due after the debt has been credited with the proceeds of the sale.

Reports stated that the passage of the bill in the house was greeted with shout: "Let the farmers know they have some friends in the legislature," when as a matter of fact this but a "tub to the whale," and is no real relief. A general moratorium should have been substituted for this makeshift. What the debtor needs is such relief that will enable him to make enough to pay his obligations. This he can do if he knew his property would not be foreclosed for a definite time.

Zero Weather Felt For First Time In Past 6 or 7 Years

The plant thermometer of the West Texas Utilities Co. at 11 o'clock Monday night stood at 55 degrees above zero; the temperature at midnight had dropped to 4 and recorded an hourly drop to 18, 15, 11, 8, 7, 6, 4 Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock, when a rise was indicated to 5, and then 6, at 10 o'clock. There was no relief during Tuesday, and Tuesday night the zero mark was reached and passed. At 6 p. m. Tuesday the mercury stood at 4 above zero, where it remained till 3 a. m. Wednesday morning, when the mercury stood at 2 above. At 4 a. m. the zero hour was struck, and at 5 o'clock it was 2 below, gradually falling till the temperature registered 3 below, with rising temperature the remainder of the day, as the genial sunshine produced the thaw that melted much of the snow that fell Tuesday night.

Owing to the continued mild weather that preceded the blizzard much damage was done to cars, water pipes, etc., as few believed the forecast that warned of the approaching blizzard.

It is rare that such intensely cold weather is felt in this part of the state. In fact, only once in the past 13 years have we known the mercury to reach zero and below previous to the present spell. It was six or seven

years ago, the winter of 1925 or '26, when the last zero winter was experienced in Cisco. Then the mercury was 4 below on two or more days, and the unusual cold was of longer duration than the present indications are for this severe weather to last. This is written Wednesday night, and the genial sunshine had caused a general thaw of the one inch of snow fall that mantled the earth Tuesday night; and Thursday promised to be a continuance of the sunshine of Wednesday, which will give us relief and permit the average man to resume his job if he is fortunate enough to have a job.

While the sunshine was manifest all day Wednesday, and the air was still, yet it was intensely cold, making outdoor life anything but pleasant. However, it never freezes for any long duration in West Texas, and we may expect milder weather soon.

Such weather is never enjoyed by we natives of the Sunny South, yet this freezing weather will be of incalculable benefit to the country generally. Coming as it did after a month of balmy weather—all through January—it will probably save the fruit crop and exterminate billions of insect life that was hatching or in a state of incubation, caused by the weeks of warm weather preceding. And, we have always noticed that larger and better crops follow a late hard freeze.

No Confirmation of Gov. Ferguson Highway Nominee

The Texas senate Wednesday withheld confirmation of F. L. Denison, Gov. Ferguson's nominee for highway commissioner to succeed Cone Johnson. It is understood the rejection of Denison was based on his activities as highway contractor during a previous Ferguson administration.

So far as dispatches from Austin stated, Gov. Ferguson has not indicated who will be nominated next to succeed Johnson.

Carrying out one plank in the Ferguson platform, a bill has been introduced to place a graduated tax on the chain stores.

Another bill of recent introduction would permit the payment of poll taxes as late as June. Every legislator, practically, was voted for on a platform to reduce the poll tax, as a prerequisite to voting, but so far no provision of this nature has been brought in either house. There is a sharp demand for the elimination of the requirement of a poll tax receipt before one can vote, but as this is a constitutional requirement, relief can come only through reducing the tax. Fifty cents for the state and 25 cents for the county, should be the price of a poll tax. This reduction would increase the revenues from this source, and enfranchise thousands of Texans.

Another plank in the Ferguson platform that has never been mentioned is the one providing for tax forced payments on deeds of trusts, vendor's lien notes and other negotiable paper, by providing this class of property uncollectable till the tax has been paid. If this measure should become a law it would go a long way toward "balancing the budget."

LUBBOCK PARTIES DINED IN CISCO LAST SUNDAY

En route to Austin several Lubbock people were dinner guests at the Mobley last Sunday, and enjoyed one of those famous Sunday dinners served at this popular hostelry by the Donicas, who are famed for their home-cooked meals.

Those in the Lubbock party were Judge Hill Stewart, Ed F. Allen, Dick Williams, J. E. Watson and Elmer Adams. Their mission to Austin was in the interest of R. L. Daniels, of Lubbock, who was being put forward for the place of commissioner of insurance in the Ferguson administration.

Foreclosure Several Cisco Homes Set for Last Tuesday, Feb. 7

According to postings on the city bill board, and general rumor over the town, about 20 pieces of Cisco residence property were scheduled for involuntary transfer of ownership last Tuesday. Hearing that many Cisco people were due to lose their homes by foreclosure under deeds of trust, and knowing that the only place where the names of the victims could be learned was the city bill board, the Citizen editor endeavored to obtain a correct list of those who were the victims of the loan bandits, but we were disappointed. When we scrutinized the "barn door" on which the notices of sale were posted we found that the wind and rain had whipped the notices to shreds, or blown them off entirely, and only fragments of two notices could be found. But we were told that there were about 20 victims in this batch. Previously, during the past 12 months, 50 foreclosures of Cisco homes had been made, according to the best information that we could gather.

Whether these 20 victims lost their homes we could not learn, as there was nothing on the "barn door" to indicate what disposition had been made. One of the proposed victims, which was the only local name we found on the "barn door," stated that the loan bandits had dropped his case, like a hot potato when he filed a plea of usury. That's what each of the other victims should have done. This required some cash outlay, and most of the victims were without funds, so we presume they took the course of least resistance and let their property go by default.

But if the foreclosure really was made this makes near 100 homes that have been legally hijacked from their rightful owners in less than 12 months. And the story is not half told. Others are marked for slaughter unless the "Debtor Relief Bill" becomes a law before the loan pirates can get their legal thieving machinery to working.

The "Debtor Relief Bill," which passed the lower house of the Texas legislature, should be speedily passed

by the senate, and promptly signed by the governor, carrying the emergency clause. If there ever was a measure carrying the "imperative demand and public necessity" it is this identical bill, for if some relief is not given the distressed home owner who has become enmeshed in the tenacles of the loan octopus, a large per cent of the smaller cities of Texas will become largely the property of the loan sharks.

According to our information this legal banditry is being perpetrated by the Continental Building & Loan association and its accomplices.

Last week the Citizen mildly referred to this legal banditry, but stated the foreclosures were being made by the Colonial Building & Loan Co. We understand that we were only partially correct, as to the Colonial, as our information is the Colonial had foreclosed only on a few pieces of property, but had made new loans where such course was possible. However, we were correct in stating it was the Colonial that gypped the editor out of the measly sum of \$2.50, on its own ipse dixit, and to this good day we have never been informed what we bought. But at that, we are glad to have been put right as to the wholesale legal thievery that is being perpetrated on our people, and place the onus of the legal crime where it properly belongs—on the Continental.

Probably these loan sharks realized their day of pillage is nearing an end, and they believed Cisco property will "come back" in the not distant future, and are getting theirs before relief is given the people through legislative enactment. Until the debtors are granted this relief we may expect

LOAN VICTIMS MEETING WAS SLIMLY ATTENDED

The meeting of the victims of the loan sharks, called for last Saturday night at the Denslow hotel, was slimly attended. Only three or four of those whose homes were scheduled to be hijacked from them were present. However, the notice advertised only in the Citizen, caused quite a number to be present who were not directly interested, but were there to help, aid and assist their fellow-townsperson to the limit. POPE BILL SHOULD DIE

The representatives from Eastland county should be requested by every person in this county to vote against the Pope Utility bill, now pending in the house. Unfortunately our florid representative, Cecil A. Lotief, has allowed his name to be attached to the Pope monstrosity, but probably through misrepresentation.

If for no other reason the cumbersome complications of the Pope bill should warrant its demise. In volume it equals a large pamphlet, requiring 20 legal cap pages to say what should have been said in one page.

When leaving for Austin Lotief had already prepared a bill on the subject of utilities that had the approval of some of the best minds in Texas, and his immediate friends here were surprised that he has not presented it to the legislature, instead of aligning himself with the authors of the Pope monstrosity, which if enforced would be more costly than increased utility rates. Get your name off that bill, Cecil, and do it now.

SHOULD CITIES LOBBY?

Lobbies of whatever nature are distasteful in a free country, and much has been said, and little done, to stop the evil. Today every state capital where the legislature is in session, is swarming with representatives of the special interests. Especially is this true of the utility corporation, manifestly so of the gas trust. But there seems to be none in Austin, our own state capital, who are representing the municipalities of the state. Only a few months ago the city officials of Abilene were pleading with the Community Natural hijackers not to impose gas rates so high the people could not pay, and nearly every other community in West Texas were clamoring for relief from the gas monopoly, at a time before the legislature convened, but now that the legislature is in session these same communities have become inactive and are doing nothing. They have no representatives in Austin to advise their representatives and urge remedial measures, but the lobby of the gas trust is there, equipped financially, to seduce your representative, if he is approachable. They have already approached our florid representative, Cecil A. Lotief, with offers to occupy luxurious apartments at the Driscoll, and other favors. Reports have

reached the Citizen that Lotief has turned a deaf ear to these attempted bribes, and is using his best efforts to honestly represent his constituents.

The Citizen does not believe Lotief can be handled by these known representatives of special interests, but not being an attorney there is danger of him placing his confidence in a false friend. This is indicated in his allowing his name to be used in connection with the Pope monstrosity. He has a bill on the utility question that has his and the endorsement of many of his constituents. It is understood that a large number of representatives have assured him of their support of his bill, but for some reason it has not yet been introduced, so far as the Citizen has been able to ascertain. This measure would put a stop for all time to unfair competition as it provides "that when an utility corporation has been petitioned by a community for a reduction in rates, and such corporation refuses to comply, then when a community or an independent concern installs a competitive utility in that community, which establishes a rate requested by that community, the lowering of rates below that charged by the competitive utility is prima facie evidence that such act was initiated for the purpose of injuring or bankrupting the community or independent competitor and such act would be grounds for damages against the original utility." The adoption of this bill would permit competitive utilities to install a plant in Cisco and make a profit on the investment. As is the case at Rising Star, the Southwest Gas Co. was petitioned to lower its rate but refused. Rising Star installed its own gas plant, and immediately the Southwest Gas Co. cut its rate to 50 and 25 cents per 1000. This was done only for the purpose that the Southwest might bankrupt the municipal plant, and when that was done, to immediately restore the old rates.

Cisco should send some man to Austin to get behind Lotief and Chastain, as well as Senator Collie, and help them get the Lotief bill adopted, and assist in killing the Pope bill as quickly as possible.

Texas communities are sleeping while the special interests are wide awake, with plenty of funds to corrupt your representatives, if he possibly can be reached. Now is the time for Texas communities to act, while the legislature is in session. The courts have held that there is plenty good law that allows communities to fix rates, but what we want is some law that will prevent monopolies, and curb the activities of special interests from bankrupting competitors, when competitive utilities are installed.

The Citizen has been informed that the city attorney advised the commission that the Pope bill covered the case, but evidently he has failed to scrutinize the Lotief bill, as the two are as dissimilar as day and night. In fact, there will be little opposition to the Pope bill from utility trusts.
