It has become a habit with a great many voters to deliberately scratch ev ery proposed constitutional amendment which is brought up, knowing little and caring less of its purpose. One great reason for this is the undeniable fact that the people have been hoodwinked so much by scheming politicians and tricked into voting through measures which they found later, through a better understanding of them, that they were undesirable and unsatisfactory to the common people. Another reason for wholesale vateing is that it is an indisputable fact that our statute books are clustered up with laws of various and sundry kinds that it sometimes takes a whole herd of real smart lawyers and a long-drawn expensive lawsuit to determine just what the law does say about the point in question, and in the meantime the injured one suf-

### TEXAS AIMS BLOW AT AUTO TRAFFIC TOLL

Houston. - Following the lead of progressive states in the The famous Oil Belt committee east, a movement is under way in Texas to secure the adoption of a uniform motor vehicle law. The safety department of the Houston Chamber of Commerce has taken the lead in the eligible Wednesday night in a movement, which is being session that was the most crooked sponsored by other civic bodies over the entire state.

The bill proposed, written by Representative R. Bradley, of Houston, provides that a drivto any person under the age of Chauffer's license would not be issued to persons under 18 nor to any individual who is a habitual drunkard or addicted to narcotics.

A boy or girl over 12 years of age and under 16 may secure permission to drive a car only by this means: If two practicing physicians certify the child is physically and mentally competent to drive an automobile, and application for a permit may be granted to the applicant, who is allowed under the law, to drive an automobile until a full license is issued.

Among the grounds on which license are to be revoked are: negligent homicide, resulting from driving, driving a vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, perjury in applying for a license, commission of any felony in which a motor vehicle is used, and conviction for failure to stop and disclose identity in any accident resulting in death to another party.
