## COMMITTEE OF 20 WILL ACT

### Poultry Expert Will Instruct In Methods of Grading, Handling and Marketing Here Saturday Morning

#### WOOTEN SAYS HE WILL ESTABLISH HIS INNOCENCE

Protesting he purchased a Ford touring car from parties in Sweetwater, J. O. Wooten was placed under arrest late Monday by Constable C. S. Looney on a charge of having in his possession a stolen car. Having a description of the stolen car, Looney spotted one that fitted and ascertained the car was claimed by Wooten. Applying a blow torch to the erased numbers the originals were brought out, and were identical with the numbers given of the machine which was reported to have been stolen October 4, from Haskell. The car carried highway numbers 22,999, which Looney stated were registered at Eastland as those formerly used on a Ford coupe previously destroyed by fire.

For the purpose of instructing and assisting poultry men in the proper manner of preparing eggs for the market, in line with the requirements of the Bankhead Poultry Producers Marketing association, V. R. Glazner, poultry expert from A. & M. College, will be in Cisco this Saturday with county Agent Bush, and it is desired that every member of the marketing association be here and attend this meeting, which will be of inestimable value to all members of the association, and to those who may become members hereafter. Mr. Glazner will meet with the poultry people at the chamber of commerce here at 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning, and as his time is limited, poultry people will be on hand early that they may receive full benefit of these instructions. From Cisco they will go to Rising Star where the meeting will be held in that city at 11 a. m. at the chamber of commerce. In addition in the afternoon at 2 o'clock he will meet the producers of the Carbon territory at the T. J. Morris Feed store, following which he will meet the Gorman producers at 4:00 o'clock at a place to be designated. Poultrymen in the Gorman territory are requested to get in touch with C. H. Grow or to see the local paper for the place which will be designated.

#### \$22,525 BUDGET MAINTENANCE OF EASTLAND ROADS

EASTLAND, April 7.—According to the figures making up the budget for the state highway commission for maintenance and general repair work in the highway district, of which Eastland is headquarters, Eastland county will have \$22,525 for maintenance during 1925. The amount to be expended in the district is \$234,955. Of this amount the counties adjoining Eastland county will get the following sums: Brown, \$17,845; Callahan, \$8,180; Comanche, \$22,550; Erath, \$28,150; Palo Pinto, \$12,320; Stephens, \$17,558.

#### Secret Data Secured By Police May Result in Unearthing a Gigantic Dope Ring and Arrest of Vice Kings

CHICAGO, April 7.—Arrests of vice kings throughout the country is expected after the seizure today of the complete records of a vast dope ring, including the names and addresses of bootleggers and dope peddlers all over the country, giving the amount of dope sent to each, and much other information that will aid the police in running down those engaged in the illicit traffic. A large office with twenty bookkeepers and stenographers were maintained by the drug ring. Dozens of filing cabinets filled with secret data was seized.

#### DISTURBANCE AT CITY JAIL MADE BY TWO BAD BOYS

Juvenile ferocity as well as depravity was exemplified in the profanity and conduct of two fourteen-year-old boys who were picked up by the officers here about noon today. Seeing them at the Union station, they were arrested and placed in the city jail, where they were given the freedom of the jail runaround. They kicked the door down connecting the jail with the lavatory, and proceeded to make their get away, but were soon forcibly overpowered and placed in the steel cells. The next disturbance came when smoke was seen to be emerging from the jail, and upon investigation the desk sergeant discovered the young Arabs had fired the blankets in the bunks. Searching them for matches, the sergeant believed he had deprived them of all means of a conflagration, but in a few minutes he found that they had set the broom on fire.

#### ROADS MEET AT GALVESTON

SAN ANTONIO, April 7.—The 1925, annual meeting of the Texas Good Roads association is expected to be held at Galveston, but at a time later than the usual meeting date in April, according to W. T. Wheeler of Fort Worth, secretary-manager of the association.

#### PANNELL AND RIDGELL MAY SECURE PLUMS

Much interest has been shown recently in the pending appointments by Governor Ferguson of three judges for the new 11th court of civil appeals, at Eastland. The appointments have not been made yet, but the Daily News was given a tip today to the effect that Judge William Pannell, of Stephenville, and T. B. Ridgell, lawyer and mayor of Breckenridge, would very likely be two of the appointees, and that Judge Pannell was slated for the chief justiceship. No intimation was given as to the third man.

#### HAND OF ARCH CROOK SEEN IN GARAGE BLAZE

STUEBENVILLE, Ohio, April 7. The garage from which Gerald Chapman, the arch crook, is alleged to have stolen the Lincoln car he used in staging the New Britain robbery, for which he was convicted for the killing of a policeman, burned early today with a loss of a quarter of a million dollars. Eighty-five cars were burned. The flames started in a mysterious manner. The owners of the garage testified against Chapman in the trial at Hartford.

#### JOHN D. LOWERS GASOLINE CENT ON EACH GALLON

NEW YORK, April 7.—The Standard Oil company of New Jersey reduced the price of gasoline one cent per gallon today. This reduction was followed by a similar cut in price by the Gulf Refining company in New Jersey gasoline prices.

#### STEAM ROLLER METHODS USED SAVING FRANCE

PARIS, France, April 7.—Steam roller methods are to be used in rushing Herriot's ten per cent levy plan through the senate today to save France from a financial downfall. Ministers completed putting final touch on bill last night and it will be presented to the chamber this afternoon. Sharp opposition is feared.

#### DR. J. T. WEBB'S BODY BURIED AT ROMNEY TODAY

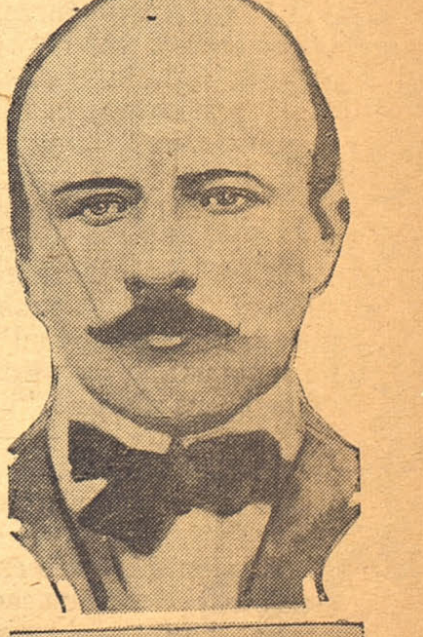

Leaving here at 3:30 this afternoon members of the Cisco lodge conveyed the remains to Romney for burial according to the ritualistic ceremony of the fraternity.

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RECIPE FOR GOOD TIMES

Opinions differ as to what makes good times. Prosperity depends directly, an American economist remarks, on the "full, free exchange of goods and services."

And what are the conditions insuring such a "full, free exchange?" Principally, he says, "that the price relations shall be approximately those to which the people are accustomed; in other words, that what everybody has to sell shall command about the usual quantity of other things."

This simply means steady prices, on a familiar level. It suggests the fallacy of the idea cherished among many business men that every sign of higher prices is a sign of increasing prosperity.

There are more consumers than producers. Everybody has to buy, and fights expense. When prices go up, people buy less; so the lessened demand brings less production and less employment.

JUVENILE IMMIGRANTS

One phase of Canadian immigration that is quite different from anything in the United States is the juvenile immigration. In the fiscal year 1923-24, according to the supervisors' report, 2,080 child immigrants came to Canada.

Canada likes its child immigrants for several reasons. They come to Canada young and grow up regarding Canada as their natural home. They are selected of good British stock, so that their early home training has been similar to what they will receive in their adopted homes.

EVOLVING A HOME-OWNER

The National Association of Real Estate Boards has a cheerful point of view to present on the question of the disappearance of the old-fashioned American home.

Obviously the average American citizen realizes the value and satisfaction of owning his home. Too often he cannot afford to build and maintain a single-family house on a small city lot.

PEACE WITH JAPAN

Japanese statesmen in whom calmness is inbred, are well represented by the new Ambassador Mutsudaira. Regarding the possibility of war between Japan and America, he is as self-contained and reassuring as an image of Buddha.

Both nations, he explains, have disclaimed warlike intentions and expressed a warm desire to live in harmony. "I am curious therefore to know," he says, "who is going to start a war between the two countries, and who is going to fight it."

There is no reason for talking war between these two great nations fronting each other on the Pacific, any more than for talking seriously about the end of the world. The Pacific is wide; there is room for both, each in its own sphere; there is common humanity and common intelligence under white and brown skins.

It would have been impossible to have held a more sensible, better-balanced good roads meeting than the one held at the Cisco chamber of commerce last night. 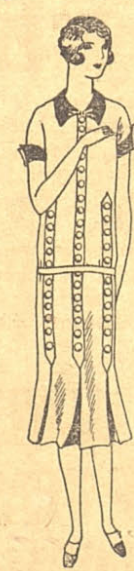

### CONTRACT LET FOR EAST END OF BANKHEAD

ALBANY, April 7.—The commissioners' court has let the contract for the construction of the east end of the Bankhead highway, running from Albany to the Stephens county pike at Hubbard creek. Sixty thousand dollars was the lowest bid for the work, for dirt and drainage. There were three bids which were practically the same, and the lowest three bids were submitted to the state highway commission, which is a late ruling of the state board that all contracts must be submitted to this body and have their approval, which was secured when Judge Richard Dyess went before the commission in Austin and got the o. k. of that body. Now the commissioners' court will meet and get the details rounded up, sign up, and then the dirt will begin moving on this road. In the meantime, a crew of engineers are at work making a survey of the west end of the Bankhead highway.

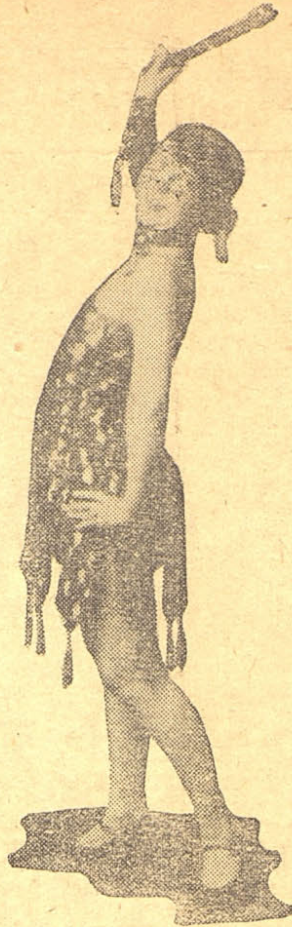
### Osborne Wood Home, Not Broke

### BRECK WALKER PAYS \$70,000 FOR SEDWICK RANCH

ALBANY, April 7.—A \$70,000 realty deal was closed in Albany last week between J. F. Sedwick of Albany and Breckenridge Walker of Breckenridge, involving nearly 3,000 acres of fine farming and ranch land on the Clear Fork of the Brazos river, which has been owned by Mr. Sedwick for a number of years, as one of his centers for development of fine registered Hereford cattle. The purchase of this week completes for Mr. Walker a block of nearly 20,000 acres of the finest ranch and farm land in the north part of Shackelford county; purchases last year of the C. M. Cauble ranch and of the Center ranch as foundation for the Walker holdings here. Mr. Walker is going in extensively for registered Hereford cattle and has many head of the finest animals to be bought. Bulls as high as \$2,000 or more each and cows over \$500 each. The wide reputation of this county as "The Home of the Hereford" is gaining for it nationwide publicity and a place where fine cattle can be found and bought. The famous Hereford bloods have been promoted to large extent and fine registered cattle will be found on all Shackelford county ranches. Premium money in all stock shows for the past year or two has been taken by cattle owned and bred here.

**RANGER PIONEER PASSES**  
RANGER, April 7.—Funeral services of W. E. Lindsey, who died Monday morning at his home in Lackland addition, were held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Central Baptist church, conducted by Rev. A. L. Leake. He was about 80 years old. A resident of Ranger for years, he witnessed the start of the town and watched it grow to its present size. Decedent is survived by his widow, Mrs. W. E. Lindsey and two daughters, Mrs. Lon Williams and Mrs. J. S. Ballew of Ranger. Interment was at Evergreen cemetery of Ranger.

**HAPSBURGS GATHER TO DISCUSS FAMILY FORTUNES**  
LINDAU, Germany, April 7.—A gathering of nearly all of the sixty living members of the Hapsburg family took place here recently, almost unnoticed by the world. Hapsburgs from many countries assembled in a local hotel. Archduke Friedrich, former commander in

chief of the Austro-Hungarian army, presided at the meeting. Friedrich, with his wife, son and six daughters, came from Budapest; Archduke Eugen came from Basle, and his sister, Marie Christine, mother of the King of Spain, from Madrid. She had visited Ex-Empress Zita at Lequito, Spain, before she left to beseech Zita's approval of the meeting. According to the law of the house of Hapsburg, to which the family still adheres, Zita is the head of the family and has authority over all its members. Discussions of the members of this once reigning family, it is said, did not turn to politics, but virtually were limited to consideration of the family fortunes.

**SMACKER WINS TIJUANA FUTURITY WORTH \$9,860**  
SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 7.—Smacker, running in the colors of Colonel W. E. Applegate of Kentucky, won the Tijuana Futurity, worth \$9,860 to the winner, fifth stake of the winter season at the border track here Sunday. Russell Gardner, owned by J. C. McGill, took second money of \$1,000 with Big Sweep and Three Sixty, also from the Applegate barn, getting third and fourth money. The entry was heavily played, paying only \$3.20 to win, and \$2.20 to place and show on each \$2 bet. Smacker took the

lead with the rise of the barrier and was never headed, though Russell Gardner, forced to pull up right after the start and then go around the field, made a world of ground and would have made things interesting with better racing luck. A field of ten started.

### BLACK GOLD IN TRAINING AT CHURCHILL DOWNS

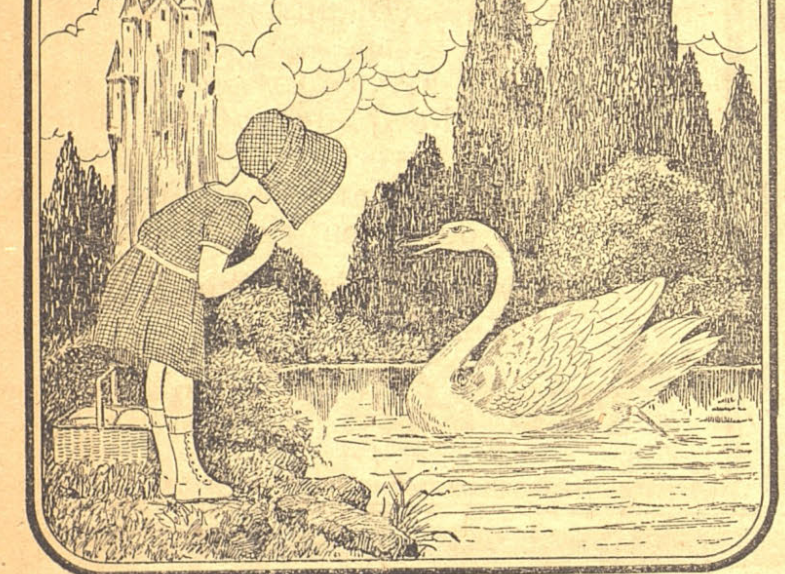
