

RECIPE FOR GOOD TIMES

Opinions differ as to what makes good times. Prosperity depends directly, an American economist remarks, ous fanatics who recently waited in on the "full, free exchange of goods and services." It is a convenient phrase, worth remembering.

And what are the conditions insuring such a "full, free exchange?" Principally, he says, "that the price relations shall be approximately those to which the people are accustomed; in other words, that what everybody has to sell shall command about the usual quantity of other things. When this is the case, there will be employment for all and the products will move into consumption."

This simply means steady prices, on a familiar level It suggests the fallacy of the idea cherished among many business men that every sign of higher prices is a sign of increasing prosperity.

There are more consumers than producers. Everybody has to buy, and fights expense. When prices go up, people buy less; so the lessened demand brings less production and less employment. Prices at a reasonable level encourage buying. It is probably fortunate, therefore, that the tendency for prices to soar this year has subsided.

JUVENILE IMMIGRANTS

One phase of Canadian immigration that is quite different from anything in the United States is the juvenile immigration. In the fiscal year 1923-24, according to the supervisors' report, 2,080 child immigrants came to Canada. In that same period more than 22,000 applications were received, indicating that very careful selection was made. The homes to which such children are sent are also carefully selected and inspection is continued long enough to be sure that the child is happy and properly cared for. A typical inspection report tells of a 9-year-old girl who had come to Canada and been adopted in a childless home at the age of six. The child is now receiving every educational advantage, is well clothed and happy, with foster parents of intelligence as well as affection.

Canada likes its child immigrants for several reasons. They come to Canada young and grow up regarding Canada as their natural home. They are selected of good British stock, so that their early home training has been similar to what they will receive in their adopted homes. The movement happily combines the finding of homes for orphans and needy children with finding children for childless homes. It is said that many of Canada's first child immigrants have become prominent and suc-

Obviously the average American citizen realizes the value and satisfaction of owning his home. Too often he cannot afford to build and maintain a single-family house on a small city lot. So he builds the two-family house instead. Eventually, such a house insures enough income to follow transportation facilities a little farther out of town, where he builds a one-family dwelling and establishes an old-fashioned American home-back yard, flowers, vegetable garden and all.

PEACE WITH JAPAN

Japanese statesmen in whom calmness is inbred, are well represented by the new Ambassador Mutsudaira. Regarding the possibility of war between Japan and America, he is as self-contained and reassuring as an image of

Both nations, he explains, have disclaimed warlike intentions and expressed a warm desire to live in harmony. "I am curious therefore to know," he says, "who is go-

ing to start a war between the two countries, and who is going to fight it. I should not mind witnessing an American-Japanese war in which neither America nor Japan was involved."

There is no reason for talking war between these two great nations fronting each other on the Pacific, any more than for talking seriously about the end of the world. The Pacific is wide; there is room for both, each in its own sphere; there is common humanity and common intelligence under white and brown skins. But each nation must squelch its own jingoes—the most dangerous of "dangerous radicals."






