The Soil Erosion Camp

Farmers of this area are being enlisted to make a trip to Lindale to ask a soil erosion camp to be placed here. Twenty farmers are wanted for the trip, which will be in the nature of a short vacation for those who go.

Cisco has asked for a soil erosion camp before. Each time the answer was the same—No. The reason given for the answer was that this county does not need such a campthat the land is not broken enough by erosion to warrant the planning of one here.

Farmers in this territory, as well as agriculture experts, know that each year the erosion problem is becoming increasingly important to Cisco and the surrounding area. They know that in a few years, if something is not done to stop it, the land hearabouts will be badly cut, that it is blowing away at present as well as washing into the rivers and on into the Gulf of Mexico.

The farmers believe an erosion camp is necessary. Those persons who have had anything to do with the voted upon. The amendments are briefly: soil from an objective point of view believe it is necessary.

J. M. Bird, agriculture expert of the Chamber of Commerce here, has hit upon the idea of having the farmers present their own cause. Where business men have been turned down in the past, farmers who are closer to the soil may be able to secure the camp. Twenty farming men are the state legislature. being sought to make the trip in a school bus, going to Lindale to present their own petition for a camp. They will represent the land. It is to be hoped that they will come back with the news that a camp will be located here.






