At the time this contract was made, the power company was charging 10 cents a kilowatt hour. In the first year under the new plan it cut its rates to 7½ cents a kilowatt hour. It expected, of

The process has been repeated each year until rates are now down to 3.9 cents for the first 50 kilowatt hours, 3.3 cents for the next 50 kilowatt hours, and 2 cents for the next 100 kilowatt hours.

> And how about the financial condition of the company?

Mr. Manly reports that in 1924 the company earned 2.2 times its bond interest. In 1932 after eight rate reductions, it earned 12 times its bond interest. At the same time its earnings on common stock increased from \$25.83 in 2924 to \$68.08 in 1932.

It would seem as if one small 25 watt lamp ought to illuminate this problem sufficiently for even the directors of utility companies to see that profits and not ruin lie in the course the Roosevelt administration has mapped out for them.



Former Cisco Bou Gets Promotion In **Aviation Service**

Marshall McCrea, former Cisco boy, who is now considered an "old timer" in the air service, has recently been transferred as station agent at Abilene to a similar position in Big Spring, according to the Abilene News, which says:

A pioneer in his business, five years being a long time in commercial aviation, was giving Abilene a reluctant au revoir Friday. He is Marshall Mc-Crea, American Airways Inc., representative, who is returning to Big Spring, the company's division point on its transcontinental schedules thru West Texas. He will be station manager there, succeeding George Phiffeur.

Succeeding McCrea is a former Abilenian, M. K. (Sport) Davis, Jr., who was here in late 1932 and early 1933 as radio operator. He will be traffic representative, Gene Taylor continuing as radioman.

McCrea has been AA's man here since June, 1931. He is a bona-fide old-timer in the aviation picture in West Texas. First, he was with Texas Air Transport, a shoestring line running a passenger schedule through Abilene. Then he signed on with A. P. Barrett when Barrett organized Southern Air Transport, Inc., and began buying up weak lines in Texas and Louisiana When American Airways was organized and bought out Barrett, at a big price, McCrea stayed in the personnel picture.

Arrest Three Men For Robbery Of Armory

EASTLAND, March 20 .- Three men were placed in jail today on charges of theft and burglary in connection with the looting of the national guard armory here February 19.

The arrest of the men, L. C. Keel, Jim Vinson and Jim Fox, followed an all-night investigation by Ranger Captain J. M. Robbins of Austin, assisted by Ranger Sid Kelso of San Antonio. and members of the staff of Virge Foster, sheriff here. The rangers signed the complaints.

The officers revealed that their investigation showed evidence of a plot to arm a number of workers and the armory robbery was planned for that purpose. A man arrested here about two months ago when, in attempting to organize CWA employes, a disturbance occurred at headquarters. He was held only a short time and released when he told officers he would cease his organization activities.

Asparagus Bed Should Be in Garden Says Club Woman

Asparagus is one of the very few vegetables which do not need to be planted every year. When asparagus is properly planted and cared for, it will continue to bear for 10 or 15 vears. I have an asparagus bed in my garden because it's one of the early producing vegetables, starts in the spring long before other crops can be planted, stated Mrs. J. R. Morrow garden demonstrator of the North Star Club, near Rising Star.

One-year-old plants are the best for starting the bed. It is advisable to buy plants, as asparagus seed are exceedingly hard to germinate. Only large, vigorous roots should be used. Nothing is gained by using two-yearold roots, and they are usually more expensive than the one-year-old. The Mary Washington variety is the best for this section.

The following method was used in making the bed in my garden: Well cultivated bed, soil well stirred for 10 to 15 inches deep, well rotted manure added and mixed with soil. The rows spaced four to six feet apart, with the plants 18 to 25 inches apart. The furrows were nine inches deep. The plants placed on the bottom of the furrow. Cover with two inches of soil and as the young shoots grow, the soil is gradually pulled in around them. By the end of the first season, the furrow will be completely filled, and then I follow ordinary cultivation to keep the soil loose and the weeds under control.


