A greater number undoubtedly feel that the question of principle is not dress before a gas manufacturers' as- "Hotel de Ville" accommodating sation is not commercialized patriotism and that they who went out, facing dangers and enduring discomfort, left behind other men of the same age and fighting eligibility who reaped the harvest of high wages in munition plants and shipyards and experienced none of the dangers or discomforts of military life.

Still others see in a certain kind of bonus a grave economic risk to the country. This view, rather than the principle of the thing, makes absolutely necessary the bringing forward of all facts in the case. With a full treasury and normal conditions, it is doubtful if a corporal's guard could be mustered against a bonus. Unhappily the treasury is neither full nor conditions normal. To add billions now to the national treasury would, in Mr. Mellon's opinion, delay further the return of prosperity and handicap the country's business

The adjusted compensation bill might supply ready money for many who probably would elect that form of settlement, but if it did that at the expense of opening up mills and factories, the relief would be only temporary. Ready money is very desirable when jobless, but ready money and a steady job are much more preferable for the American service man. There are some economists, one of whom is Mr. Mellon, who wonders how old jobs can be restored and new ones created if further taxes are imposed on the coun-

Yet all this is speculation based on a very high cost of the bonus. Senator McCumber's view be the correct one, the situation would be much different and the adjusted compensation bill, in the Senator's opinion, would work no economic hardship on the nation.







sian Relief.
This Commission is now engaged, in conjunction with the American Re-lief Administration, in purchasing, shipping and distributing food and seed wheat and corn for the Russian

Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce and chairman of the American Relief Administration, is head of the Commission. Other members are Former Governor James P. Goodrich of Indiana, E. M. Flesh, freasurer of the U. S. Grain Corporation, and

Edgar Rickard, director of the ARA.

Under the provisions of the act, signed by the President, appropriating \$20,000,000 for Russian relief, large quantities of food and grain have been bought and at present are being rushed by chips to Russian ports, where the by ships to Russian ports, where the American Relief Administration is handling the distribution.

The Purchasing Commission for Russian Relief is bending every effort towards facilitating the speedy ship-ment of the needed commodities to the famine regions. Large quantities of supplies, grown and purchased in America are being sent as fast as American ships can be chartered and loaded.

Secretary Hoover has announced that 3,000,000 bushels of grain have been shipped as of January 25th and instructions given to rush the shipment of further cargoes.
