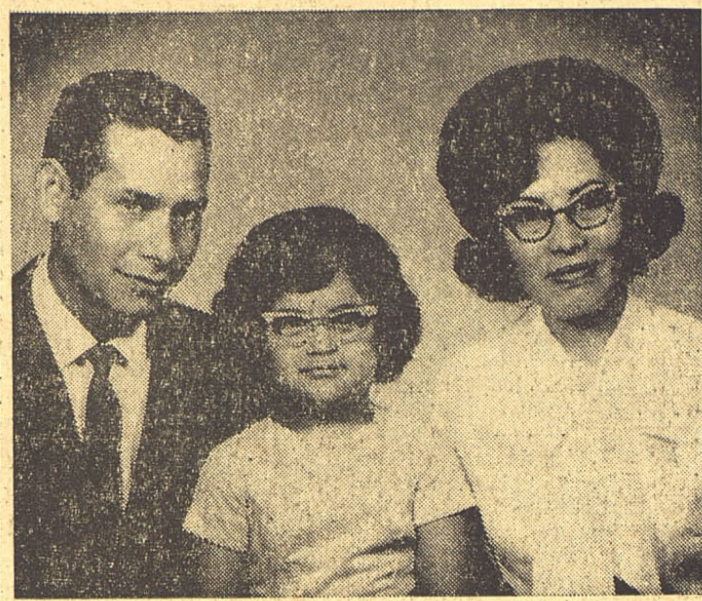
Easter Cantata Planned By First Baptist Choir

Fund To Fight Screw Worms Is Half Raised

Oscar Schaefer, Cook, chairman of the Eastland County Animal Health Committee, stated Saturday that contributions to the screw worms eradication fund are lagging.

Less than 50% of the county's \$3100 quota has been subscribed to date, he said. After conferring with Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and county treasurer for the fund collection drive, as to the amount

that had been turned in, Schaefer urged all community committees to immediately finish soliciting funds from those in their particular areas and turn them in.

Livestock men not immediately contacted are requested to leave their donations at the bank where they do business.

A total of 10¢ per head for all cattle and 2¢ per head for sheep, goats and hogs will more than meet the goal chairman reported. Owners of pets and deer hunters are also urged to make a small contribution. Deer will annually increase if the screw worms are eliminated.

There are 23 different species of flies that lay eggs in animal wounds. The larvae of the screw worm, however, does not eat rotting flesh. It burrows toward the healthy flesh where it twists and tears sucking the body fluids and blood. When vital parts of the animal is reached death occurs.

PLANS FOR LITTLE LEAGUE SEASON ARE MADE AT MEET

All Little League boys should be at Rylee Field at 5 p. m. Monday, April 12, at which time coaches will announce players on each team and time and place of practice sessions, said Vandell Weathers, Little League president.

Event Is Planned At Local College

Plans have been completed for the annual Eastland County pecan budding and grafting school on Tuesday, April 13, with the morning session to be held in the cafeteria at Cisco Junior College and the afternoon period in a pecan grove in the Leon River bottom.

County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper will teach the school. Demonstrations and lectures on when and how to bud, when not to bud, types of budwood, forcing the bud into growth, difference between budding and grafting, latest techniques in grafting, cold storage dormant budwood, seasoning budwood and other subjects are on the agenda for the morning part of the all day affair.

After a Dutch lunch in the cafeteria at noon the group will go to the Kent Wood pecan grove, three miles south of Cisco, for a practice session.

A limited supply of cold storage pecan budwood, peccan knives, plastic tying material and other items will be available for those desiring them, Mr. Cooper said.

The school has been taught annually for the past decade by Mr. Cooper, and although principally for citizens of Eastland County, interested persons from other counties are invited to attend, women as well as men.

Over 100 people from 18 different counties attended the propagation school last spring.

Those attending from Cisco will include Jim Smothers, Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager, and representatives from the agriculture committee, headed by Sam Kimmell and composed of Anton White, Sutton Crofts, Rudolph Schaefer, Tommy Toland, Don Kincaid, Harry Donica, and J. L. Thornton.

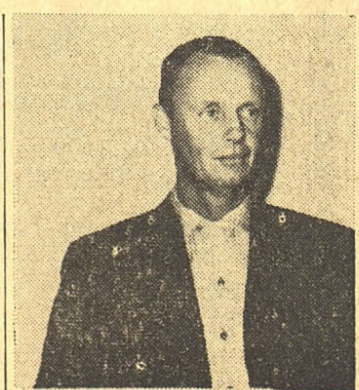
S&M Supply Pushes Sales Passed Million Dollars For First Time

S&M Supply Company celebrated its 10th anniversary last year by pushing gross sales passed the million dollar mark for the first time, according to a report by President J. L. Stafford to the stockholders at their annual meeting last week.

The company had sales totaling \$1,333,054 in the past year, the report showed, and the outlook anticipates continued growth for the company, the president said.

The company deals in roofers supplies, siding for homes and buildings and so forth with warehouses in Cisco, Lubbock, Fort Worth and Dallas. S&M became the state's largest distributor of these supplies during the year, Mr. Stafford said.

To finance a program of continued growth, Mr. Stafford reported to the stockholders that the company will issue \$100,000 worth of 5-year, 6 percent convertible debentures and \$50,000 worth of 5-year, 8 percent non-convertible debentures. Stockholders will be given the first opportunity to buy the debentures, the amount to be based on their stock holdings. Any of the

debentures not taken up by the stockholders will be offered to others, Mr. Stafford added.

The company now represents ALCOA, Kiser, U. S. Steel, Reynolds Metals, and others.

B. D. Wilson, vice president in charge of Northwest S&M Supply Co. at Lubbock, and Harry Lobsiger, vice president of Southwest S&M at Fort Worth and Dallas, were present for the meeting and outlined the activities of their branches of the Cisco firm.

Mr. Stafford announced that arrangements have been completed for all credit, accounting and billing work to be handled out of the Cisco home office.

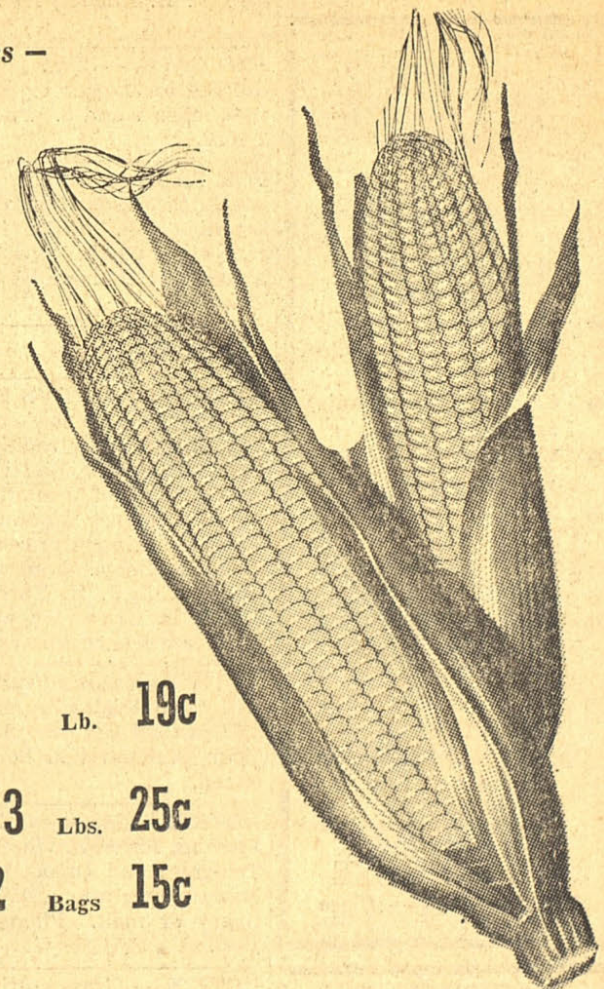

GRID REFEREE HAS BUSY DAY WHEN THE GAME'S TELEVISED

The job of a referee in Southwest Conference football games, particularly if the contest is televised, can be pretty complex, curly Hays of Abilene told the Cisco Lions Club at their luncheon last Wednesday noon at the Victor Hotel.

Mr. Hays, public relations director for West Texas Utilities Company, is a veteran football official who referees regularly in the Southwest Conference. His last appearance was as referee of the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas last January 1.

The referee in a televised football game has to satisfy the program director in addition to keeping on top of the game, Mr. Hays said. The director must see that 18 two-minute commercials are worked into the game during time-outs and the like, and this must be done so that the viewing millions won't miss any of the football action.

Mr. Hays recalled that an inexperienced referee in a bowl game a few years ago ignored the program director and the fans across the country missed all of the scoring as touchdowns were made during commercials.

The referee reports to the stadium four hours before kickoff time for a televised game (or two hours otherwise) so he can go over everything with the tv people as well as the coaches and teams. The referee can run the game, through time-outs at the right time, so that the viewing public will get the most from the game, Mr. Hays said.

Mr. Hays has been refereeing about 25 years. He is a graduate of Tulsa University and had a brief fling at pro football. He won many decorations as a Naval officer in WWII. He referees some 40 games each year — high school, junior and small college and 10 to 15 Southwest Conference games.

Jay Richardson, club vice president, presided in the absence of Bob Hammett, the boss lion. Guests included Joe Storrs and Steve Simmons of Cisco and County Agent J. M. Cooper of Eastland.

Son Of Ciscoan Is Named Pilot Of The Month

Lt. Col. Charles D. Tubbs of Little Rock Air Force Base, son of Mrs. R. G. Huffman of Cisco, was recently named Pilot of the Month in the Combat Crew, magazine of the Strategic Air Command.

The citation stated the honor was won for "Outstanding skill and professional ability in overcoming an in-flight emergency."

His ability to accomplish engine start in the time available and under adverse conditions demonstrates a high degree of proficiency, and resulted in saving a multi-million - dollar aircraft (B-58) for the Strategic Air Command."

Major Tubbs piloted one of the aircraft assigned to fly supersonic missions over this area March 29 through April 2.
