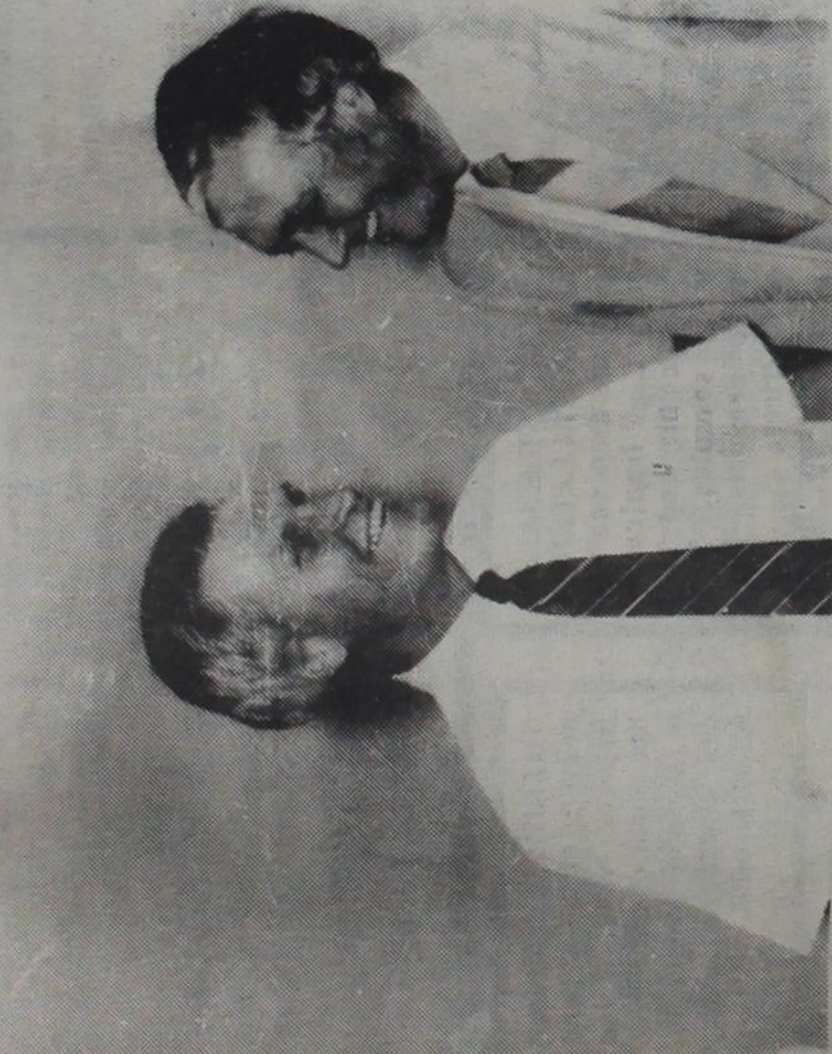

National Issues Report Is Made By Congressman

Stopping in Cisco Wednesday morning in a "report to the people" tour of the 17th Congressional District, Representative Charles Stenholm discussed national problems, the ex-hostages, the budget deficit and answered questions.

The Cisco meeting was held at the Community Room of the First National Bank. The congressman, accompanied by his wife, Cindy, and his area office manager, Bill Longley and wife of Stamford, came here from Baird where he attended a breakfast meeting. He left Cisco at 10 a.m. for Ranger for a similar meeting before attending a luncheon Wednesday noon in Stephenville.

"We are all relieved that that retaliation would not be appropriate without knowing the identity of those we retaliate against." He expressed the hope that "we can deal eventually with terrorists on their terms."

Minorities are back of bombings and terrorists activities throughout the world, Mr. Stenholm said that Reagan's handling of the situation, and I support that view."

Mr. Stenholm suggested that the government, E after their ordeal, with terrorists," Mr. Stenholm said. "A national poll shows that 72 per cent of our people agree with President Reagan's handling of the situation, and I support that view."

The congressman said he would not vote to send troops to Nicaragua or any Central American country. He added that "we must send notice to Russia that we will not allow another 'Cuba' in our hemisphere."

Why do people dislike our government, he was asked? His answer: "Perhaps it's because you and most people do. He suggested that America might seek the advice of allies in efforts to improve the country's international image."

Mobley Restoration Work To Start In Coming Week

A letter of intent, committing both parties to the project, was signed by the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center and the Herman Bennett Construction Co. of Brownwood at a meeting here Friday afternoon.

Mayor Eris Ritchie, president of the Hilton center's board of directors, was studying the letter of intent when the above picture was made at the meeting, which was held at the First National Bank's community room.

The letter of intent will serve as a commitment while a formal contract is being prepared and final plans and specifications for the restoration of the old Mobley Hotel as the first of the far-flung Hilton chain are being made. Mr. Ritchie said.

Architect Gordon Marchant of Fort Worth, here for the meeting, was to make minor changes in the restoration plans and specifications, and an attorney was authorized to prepare the formal construction contract.

Mayor Ritchie said that the Herman Bennett company, one this region's top construction firms, has more in mind than work on the basis of the letter of intent being signed. He expected that activity would begin within a week at the old Mobley.

Plans call for the structure to be restored and to become a community center in every sense of the word, Mr. Ritchie said. The Chamber of Commerce officers will be moved there to be custodians of the building when restoration work is finished in about a year.

Mr. Ritchie said all efforts will be made for the building to be finished by October, 1986, so the formal opening can be part of the state's sesquicentennial program.

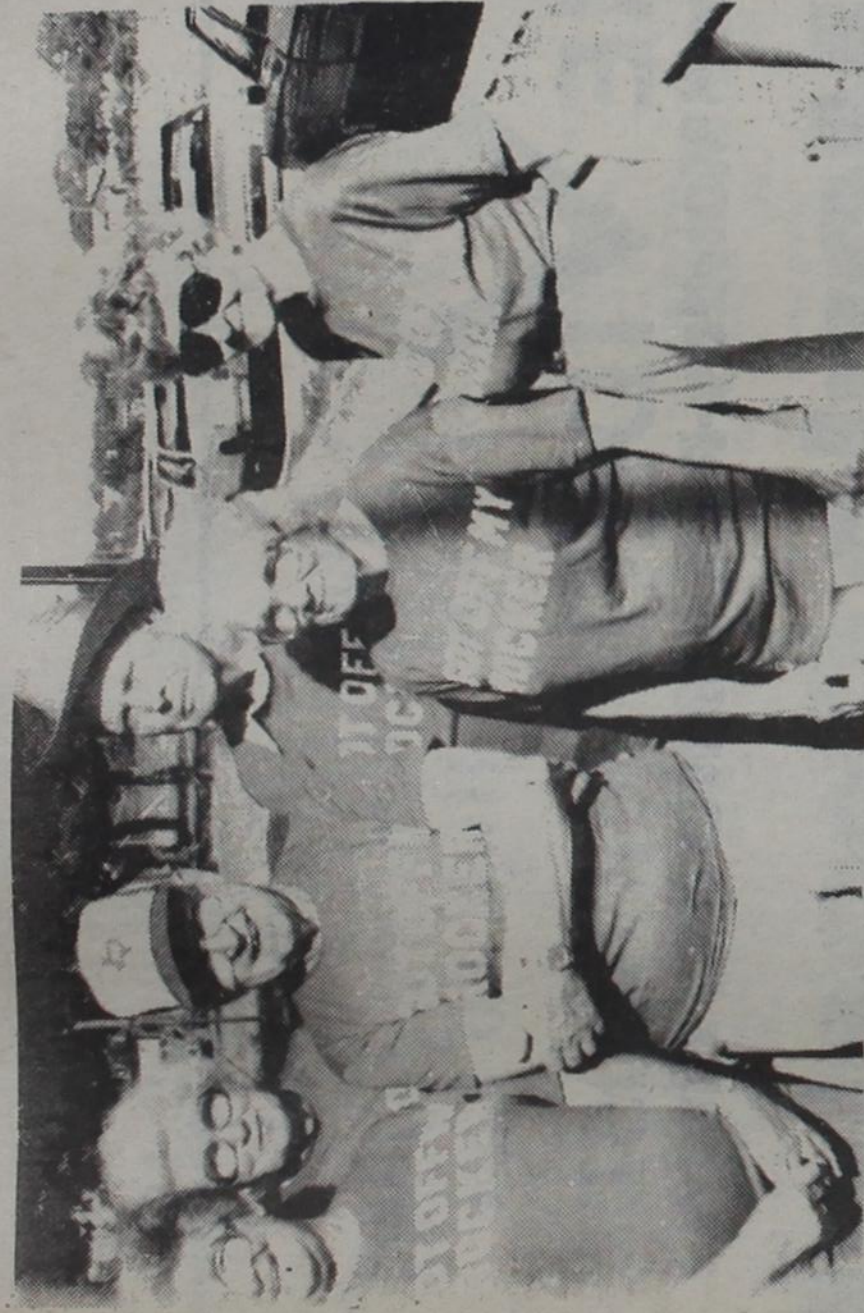

Capitol Update

Jim Parker

Let me become serious, to the extent I can, at least for the purpose of this week's column, and bring you some news I consider to be startling and of serious interest.

House Bill 72, widely known as the education reform package provides, among other things, that high school students in the eleventh and twelfth grades must pass an exit exam to demonstrate sufficient academic skills to justify the granting of a diploma.

The first sample test results are in and the most appropriate adjective that comes to my mind to describe those results is abysmal.

The first sample results indicate that only 51% of those students taking the exam would be able to pass the test if the passing score were set at 70 percent. Only 39% of the Hispanics and 23% of the blacks would pass the test based on the field testing. Since 70 is, and has been, considered a passing grade, that figure is used. The State Board of Education is currently considering reducing the necessary grade for passing from a 70 down to some lower figure as yet undetermined.

In my mind, the significance of this sample exit level test and its results is that it, for the first time, gives absolute, irrefutable proof that a vast number of our students are exiting high school with virtually no academic abilities.

A politician is never supposed to publicly change his mind on an issue; however, this is the best evidence I have seen that we may have some serious problems in the teaching profession, with extra-curricular activities and, primarily, with classroom discipline. I have long realized these problems were present in one form or another but to learn that only one-half of graduating seniors are able to pass a reasonably simple academic skills test is, to say the least, shocking.

Maybe we all need to rethink our attitude on the education issue. I certainly know I am going to do some soul-searching prior to the coming session.

Any comments you have on this subject would be appreciated.

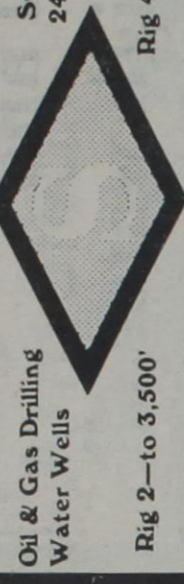

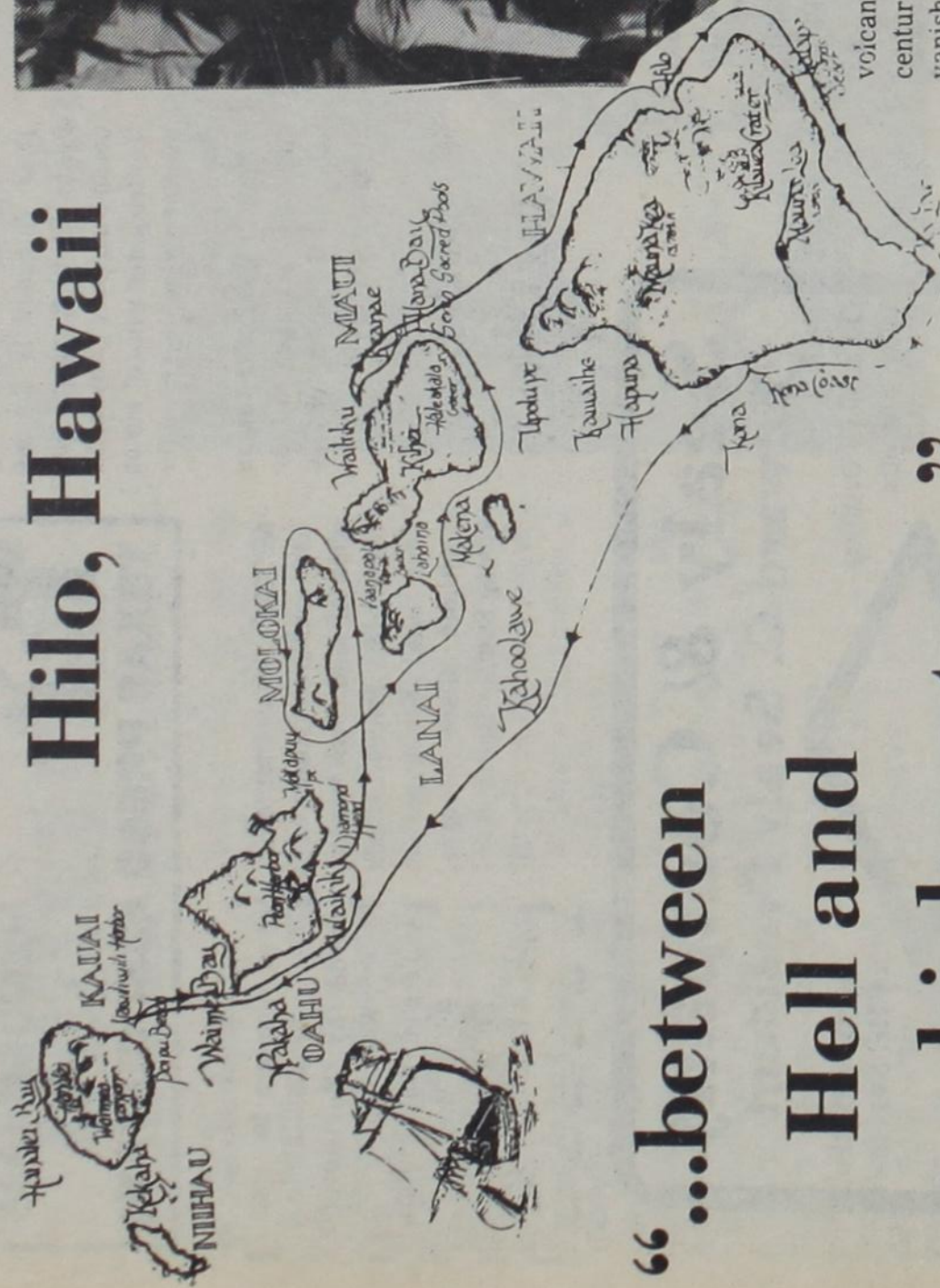

Hilo, Hawaii



“...between

Hell and

high water...”

Tuesday at Hilo, Hawaii (the big island). Capt. Wu's quote of the day was especially meaningful—"Success is a journey, not a destination". The 18th was our 25th wedding anniversary and we made arrangements for the captain to preside at the re-newing of our vows, set for the next day.

Hilo is a quiet tropical seaport town; its history filled with devastation. Much of the coastline was wiped out by a great tidal wave in 1946. Another, in 1960, was less destructive, but took 61 lives and injured 300 more. Though much of the town was rebuilt, the waterfront area in the arc of the bay has been left as a park - and a safety barrier.

In addition to the threats from the sea including tidal waves, Hilo rests in the shadow of two 13,000 foot volcanoes. A local told us: "We live between hell and high water!"

Dormant Mauna Kea is a snow-capped ski spot and is not considered extinct.

Active Mauna Loa may be the largest single mountain on earth. It rises 13,677 feet above sea level and extends another 16,000 feet to the ocean floor. In 1981 lava flowed from Mauna Loa to within a mile and half of downtown Hilo. Flows from the eruption of 1984 stopped 16 miles above downtown.

Steam can be seen rising from the flow area of March, 1984, which has not cooled.

Four-thousand foot Kilauea, the most active volcano in the world, poses little threat to Hilo itself, but to the districts of Puna and Ka'u to the south of Hilo, the wrath is ever imminent. Since January, 1983, Kilauea has erupted nearly once a month - going up on the Wednesday, a week before our arrival. In recent history, lava flows have added some 500 acres to the big island.

Our tour choice naturally (but with a bit of fear and tremble) was to the volcano areas, which also included a side trip to a nursery specializing in orchids and anthuriums, and up through a lush tropical forest and on to Volcano National Park where we had lunch at the Volcano House overlooking Kilauea Crater. Later we viewed the sulphur banks, steam vents, drove on crater rim drive, and the spectacular steaming Halemauau Fire-Pit, and drove the Chain of Crater Road, all the while with a driver who kept suggesting that "Yes, it could blow again, anywhere, even under our couch."

Recent lava flows were evident as we approached the coast and our final stop was at beautiful Kalapana with its jet black sands contrasted by the Pacific swells breaking upon a coconut palm studded beach. Visitors were warned with

signs to "watch for falling coconuts."

The National Park Service, which does such a fantastic job with all our parks, helps explain it well here.

Just as these island were formed as the result of

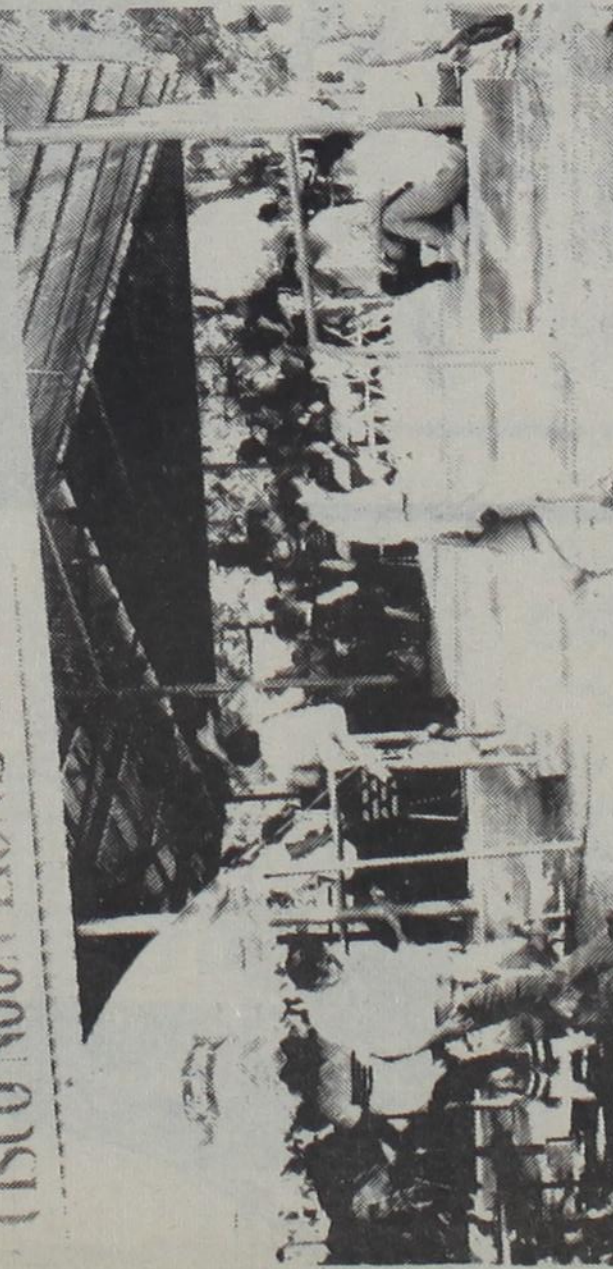

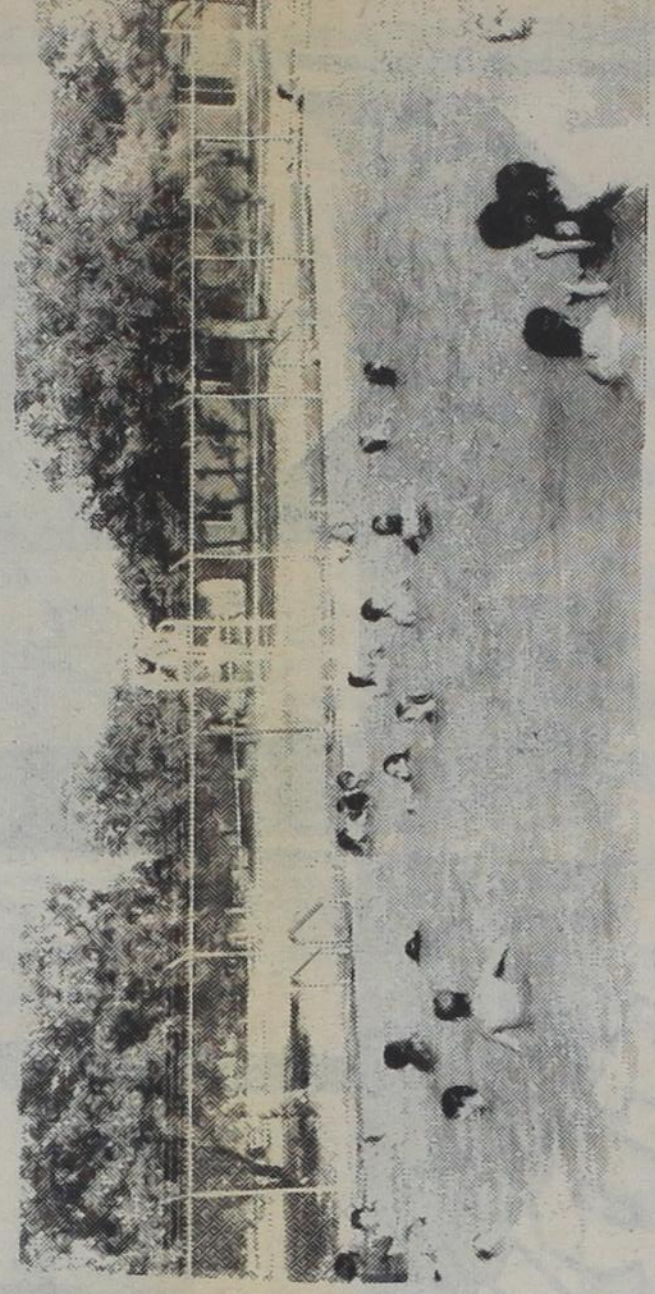

West Texas Utilities Company Files Petition

Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are fixed, but adjustments are possible sooner if actual fuel costs are substantially above or below the amount being charged.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available advantage of a softer natural gas market, Churchill said.

"Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating revenues.

Much of the economy power being bought from other companies now comes through a new high voltage direct current interconnection completed last December near Vernon. This facility allows WTU to import electricity from outside the state of Texas.

WTU proposes to make the refunds to existing customers through a one-time credit to their bills, commencing immediately after Commission approval. Refunding through bill credits would be more timely, efficient and cost effective than attempting to send customers checks, Churchill said.

The credit would be calculated on an individual customer basis using each kilowatt-hour consumption during the period involved. Refund amounts will vary with the amount of the

The Sweet Smell Of Fragrance In The Church

God is so wonderful in all His works. In creating the human body He gave five senses to each person: the senses of sight, hearing, tasting, feeling, and smelling. And it is through these five senses that we discern clearly the atmospheric condition, and some odors are sweet, and some odors are foul. Just to be plain: In the Bible we find that the sense of smell is used symbolically to describe spiritual conditions. For instance we read in (II Cor. 2:14-16), "But thanks be to God, who in Christ always leads us in triumph— as trophies of Christ's victory— and through us spreads and

makes evident the fragrance of the knowledge of God everywhere, for we are the sweet fragrance of Christ (discernable alike) among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing. To the latter it is an aroma (waited) from death to death—a fatal odor, the smell of doom; to the former it is an aroma from life to life—a vital fragrance, living and fresh."

It is wonderful to worship in a congregation where the atmospheric condition is fragrant and sweet, because of the presence of the Holy Spirit, and because the saints love one another, but on the other hand it is so depressing where "the smell of doom" is present. Such is caused by "a root of bit-

terness." We read in (Heb. 12:15), "New Testament Amplified" "Exercise foresight and be on the watch to look (after one another), to see that no one falls back from and fails to secure God's grace (His unmerited favor and spiritual blessings), in order that no root of resentment (rancor, bitter or hatred) shoot forth and cause trouble and bitter torment, and the many become contaminated and defiled by it." He is a 1984 graduate of Wylie High School, Abilene, Texas.



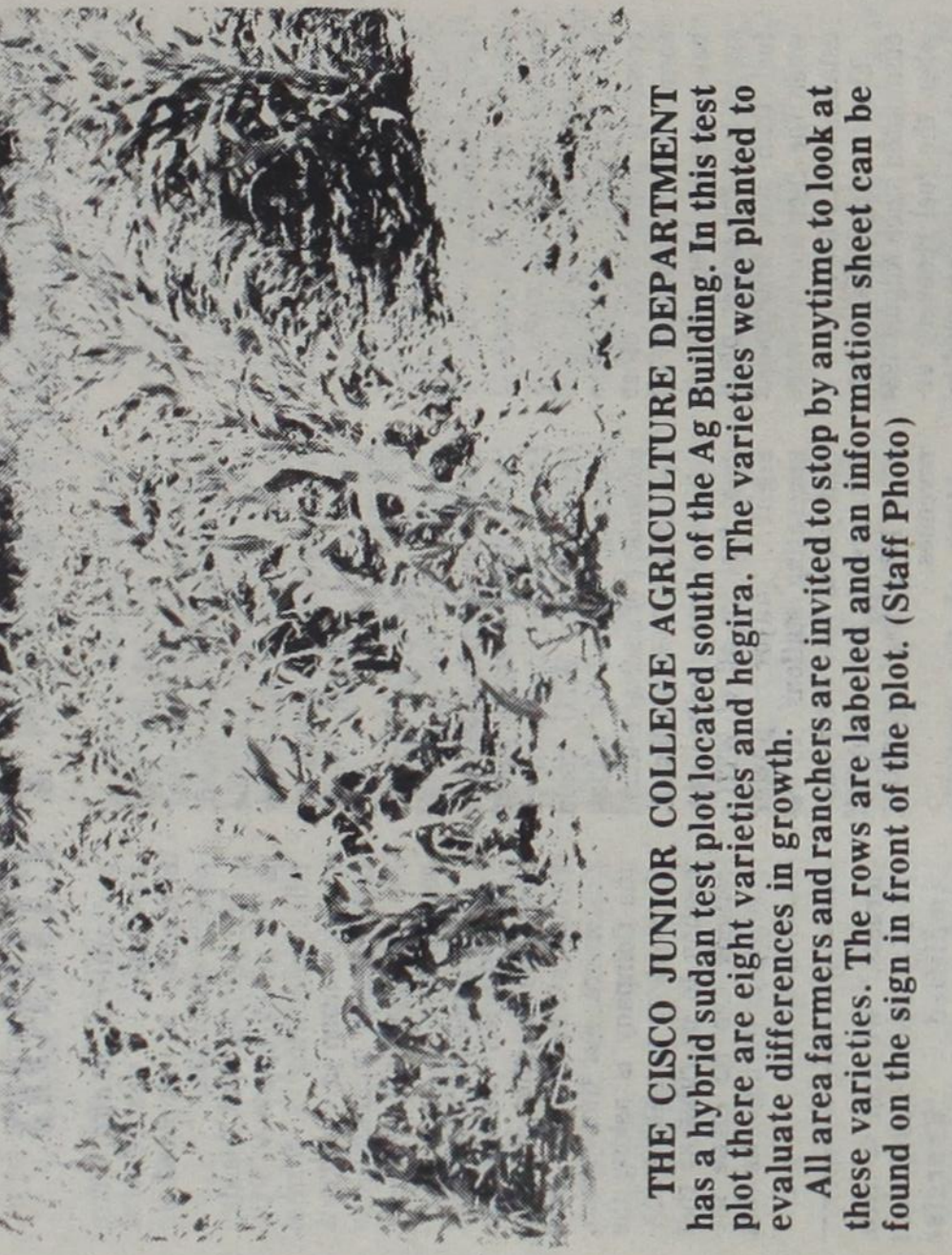

His office is located in the Courthouse beside of District Attorney Emory Walton, and his duties include the full range of the District Attorney's work.

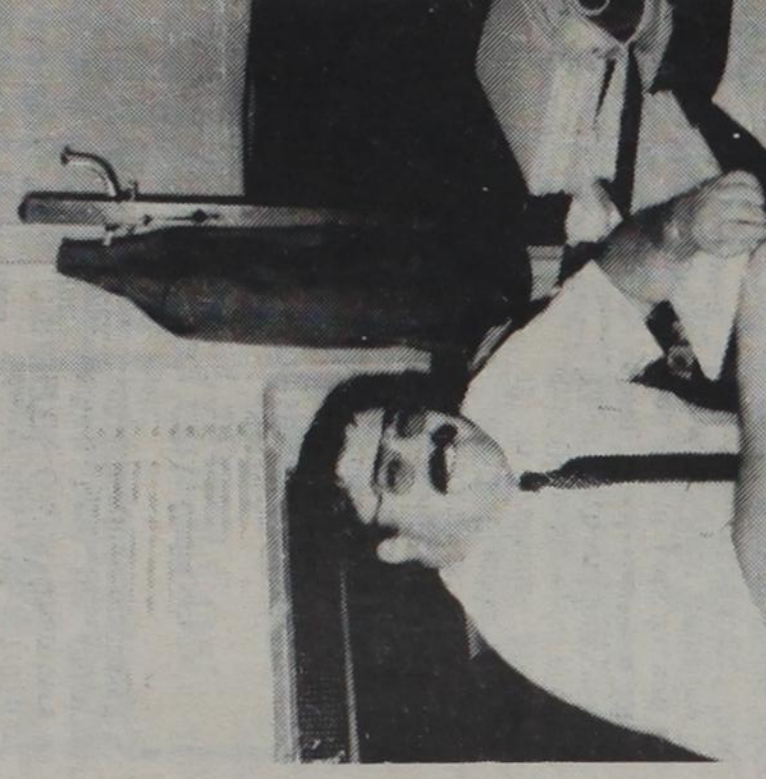

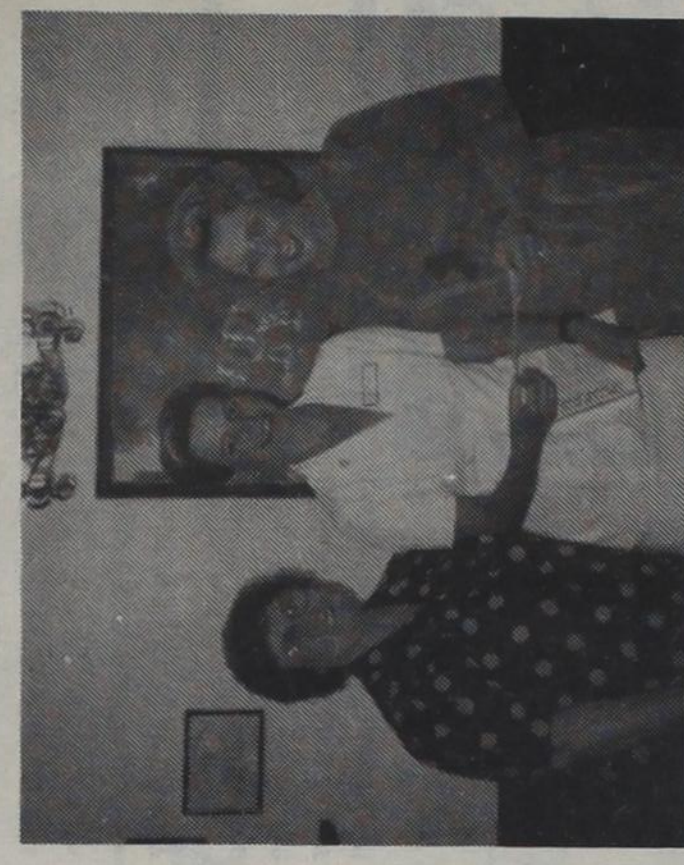

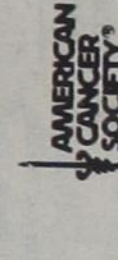
