COOPERATION—BUYING AT HOME

A banker in a little city was asked by local merchants,

prices, appointments and quality of service.

"But that is not the most important reason.

"I buy in Ourtown because I live in Ourtown and I know that we cannot have the kind of stores there that we want unless we patronize them.

"Every business is in some measure dependent for its success upon that of every other business. A proper sense of personal, as of community interest, dictates the greatest possible measure of co-operation. Moreover, dealing with your neighbors brings inevitably a better understanding and appreciation of them.

"The more we buy in Ourtown, the more efficiently do we work to make Ourtown truly a community in the

best sense of that word.' Here is a man with the right idea, and the knack of expressing it. He has told the real reason for loyalty to a town—and it is a good one. There is a real obligation to one's neighbors and the fact that it pays to discharge this obligation to the best of one's ability does not detract from the fact that to do so is a duty.

And the same is true of the merchants of the town and the nearby farmers. When they cooperate with each other—work together—both are benefitted. As an example, it is the merchant's duty to see that the farmer obtains a ffull market price for his cotton and other products of the soil. In turn the farmer should spend his money with the merchants who thus interest themselves in his welfare, because it is proper for him to reciprocate and for the further reason that he is certain to develop a still broader and better market for his cotton, feedstuffs, fruit, melons. chickens and eggs.

SUPREME COURT AUTHORITY

Should the powers of the United States supreme court in the matter of declaring acts of congress unconstitutional be curbed? Is a majority vote on the matter of constitutional law convincing?

These questions will have an important position on the programme of the American Bar association at its annual meeting August 29-31. An elaborate array of legal talent from the United States, England, France, South America and Canada will take part in the discussion. Present and former members of the supreme court also will participate. The symposium will bring out the opinions of the most profound legal minds in the world.

No other occasion, perhaps, could develop opinion of such importance on this question of the powers of the supreme tribunal of the land as this gathering of lawyers under the auspices of the national law association. The discussion is timely, inasmuch as the question of curbing the supreme court's jurisdiction is cropping up frequently. From it may come a much needed definition of the duties and powers of the supreme court and its relations to the national government.

AMERICA'S CIVILIZATION THE BEST

The best thing the world has derived from the war, says the Ladies' Home Journal editorially, is "an awakening consciousness through the world that American civilization is infinitely the best'so far developed; that relatively it is first-class, while Europe's is hardly second-class and Asia's is about fourth to sixth class.

"The more you cross to Europe in these after war days the deeper this impression grows. It is not a case of telling the world that we are the only it. They tell it to you. Not the politicians, of course, not the aristocrats, nor the rancorous critics whose only outlook on the present or future is bilious; but the really intelligent leaders of thought who read and observe and get about among their neighbors.'

We take it from the above, and much more in the same vein, that the Journal rather approves of the U.S.A. as a place in which to live. None of us disagree with this view of the matter. But everybody realizes that keeping it a good place to live, for today and tomorrow, is a lifesize job, and one that on occasions demands both sacrifice and self-denial.

PUT PEP INTO OFFICE

Lieutenant Governor Davidson specialized in "Putting Pep into the Governor's Office" during Governor Neff's sojourn in Cuba and Central America. One of Governor Davidson's first acts was to offer rewards for murderers and for leaders of mobs.

He let it be known that order must prevail even though it takes the full power of the state to enforce the laws.

This pronouncement undoubtedly threw a scare into some of the peace officers whose idea of duty and their interpretation of their oath of office is to follow the line of least resistance, which generally means sympathizing with the mob and hiding out during its activities.

It was suggested by many, not unkindly perhaps, that Governor Neff could have extended his vacation indefinitely without injury to the state. Certainly Governor Davidson set a good example in law enforcement




