





Ideas On Cutting Food Costs

Meat - a mainstay of the American diet - commands a large portion of the food dollar, so focus on your meat dollar to cut food costs, advises Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist.

A key in buying meat is the "cost per serving," she says. Ms. Haggard is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Because some cuts of meat have more bone and fat waste than others, "price per pound" is not a true guide to the cost per serving," she explains.

Remember, three ounces of lean, cooked meat is considered a standard adult serving.

COST PER SERVING

Different cuts of meat yield different numbers of servings, so you must have some "basic yields" in mind when you shop.

In other words, you must know how many servings a pound of a particular cut of meat will yield. Once you

That translates another way - the ribs cost twice as much per serving as the ground beef, even though their price "per pound" is

Remember, it all depends on how much you get from each pound - so be sure to figure the "cost per serving."

Here are some guidelines on a few cuts of meat and their yields:

1) Boneless meat generally yield three to four servings per pound. These include ground beef, flank steak, round steak, stew meat and liver.

2) Meats with the bone in generally yield two to three servings per pound. These include most roasts and steaks.

3) Meats with considerable bone and fat provide only one to two servings per pound.

These include spare ribs, short ribs, porterhouse steaks and T-bone steaks. MORE COST-CUTTING IDEAS

Here are some other costcutting ideas:







Dear Par-Please send our organization some information on a new agency that has been set up to handle a nation-wide program for the elimination of architectural barriers. Please include committee members names and we would like to know the percentage of handicapped members on this board .- Mr. M.D.M., Jr., Kansas.

Dear Mr. M.-I am sure you must be referring to the establishment of the National Center for Barrier Environment(NCBFE). It is a national non-profit organization concerned exclusively with the creation of physical facilities which are accessible to persons with

disabilities. The center has announced plans for a major expansion of its accessibility-related services. The new effort, made possible by a contract recently awarded to NCBFE through an inter-agency funding agreement between HEW's Office of Civil Rights and the Community Services Administration, will open several new positions, for which applications are invited immediately.

Under the contract, the National Center will develop an Access Center which will become the Nation's most comprehensive source of information, education, technical assistance and research on accessibility matters. The Access Center's programs will be an extension of the services which NCBFE has been providing since 1974.

Jack Armstrong, NCBFE Executive Director, stated the Access Center will include a computerized information system-data bank, a telephone "Hot Line", technical assistance services and an extensive publication program. "The implementation of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 is causing a tremendous demand from Federal fund recipients for information about accessibility and barrier free design," he said. "The Access Center will be designed to provide such information, as well as assistance with problems related to the creation of an accessible environment. We anticipate participation by other Federal agencies during the coming year, and the Access Center should eventually become a centralized resource which any Federal agency can use to respond to inquiries from its fund recipients. The Access Center's services will also be available to the general

public." Knowledge of accessibility issues and barrier free design principles will be given strong consideration in the selection of candidates to fill the available positions. People with disabilities are specifically urged to apply. All applicants must be willing to relocate to the Washington, D.C. area, but funds will not be available for moving expenses.

Salaries for each position will be competitive with salaries for similar positions

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
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Field Dressing Critical To Successful Deer Hunt

UVALDE - Stalking and shooting a prize buck (or doe) is a big part of the challenge deer hunting offers sportsmen. But there's a lot more to it than just "aim and shoot."

For the beginning or inexperienced hunter, the sequence of events occurring immediately after the kill can well mean the difference between taking home a handsome wall mount or returning with a severely butchered-up carcass and perhaps little else to show for the effort.

Yet, performing this critical function correctly isn't as complicated as one might tend to assume, says Dr. Dwight Guynn, Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist headquarted in Uvalde.

Guvnn advises leaving the skin free of custs forward of the front legs so the taxidermist will have enough hide to make a good mount. He says it's also a good idea to salt or freeze the head and skin until it is delivered for moun-

But if the head is not to be mounted, hang the carcass by its head and skin it from

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

A dozen eggs, a sack of potatoes, a slab of bacon, a steak, a chilled fresh fryer, a carton of milk and hundreds of other items can be bought at almost any food store at almost any time and at a comparatively reasonable cost - reasonable, that is, compared with the cost of most other things.

While the overall cost of living has advanced 13 percent from a year ago, food prices in the grocery store have increased less than 10 percent," Anderson explains. "Americans, on average, spend 17 percent of their income on food compared to 45 percent for people in Russia.'

One out of every 25 Texans is a farmer or rancher, yet 30 percent of the state's retail trade business is directly associated with agricultural

production and selling of food and fiber products. Thousands of businesses are active in food and fiber production, transportation, processing, packaging, storing, advertising, distribution and other activities associated with feeding, clothing and, to some extent, housing people, notes the economist.

"In Texas, movement of food and fiber from field to factory to the family table furnishes jobs and income for about a fourth of the working force," points out Anderson.

The future for continued growth in Texas agriculture is bright, he believes. Demand for food and fiber from countries overseas is growing. And, with good export facilities, the state's agricultural industry is ready to expand its share of the export market. This means more jobs and in-





Reflections In Perspective By I. Will Ussery

The sun-drenched city of Valera, Venezuela nestles in a bowl-shaped high valley in the foothills of the Eastern branch of the Andes mountains. Its climate compares favourably to that of Los Teques, except that the annual rainfall is far less. It is also at a slightly lower elevation. But it is a lovely, pleasant little state capital skirting which on the northwest-to-southwest flows the Rio Frio.

Founded originally by the Spanish conquistadores, Valera grew, gradually, to a city of some 25,000 inhabitants. Its growth paused when travel from Carcas and other centers to the northwest took to the Pan American highway which bypassed Valera by several miles. But alongside the remaining and original 'Carretera Nacional' (National Highway) was built, in the edge of the city a lovely and perfectly appointed motel where we spent a most restful and en-

After a very quiet night, we went for a stroll to try to find the center of the city. That far out, few of the streets were paved, but there were paved sidewalks along the most of the way. And along one of the paved stretches of walk we passed a lady who was tending her lovely flower garden behind a wrought iron grillwork garden wall. She smiled kindly and most graciously greeted us as we walked past.

Up the street a little way two boys were 'coasting' down the slight incline on the walk on the other side of the street. Their vehicle was a handmade 'scooter' consisting of little more than a few boards riding on wheels of questionable origin. But it picked up considerable speed before reaching the bottom of the slope. From that point, the lads towed the cart back to the top of the block for another run. They insisted that my wife and two daughters take a ride with them, as it was comfortably a two-passenger flyer (if the two people were not very

They took advantage of the hospitality of the boys, which appeared to please them, no end. The lads were rewarded with a coin when the fun was over. The fun consisted of one ride, only, for each of the three ladies.

Crossing again to the side of the street from whence we'd begun our stroll, we met a couple who were obviously 'montanerous' (mountain people). Scrubbed and washed until they virtually glowed, they were a smiling, kindly pair. She was dressed in an ankle-length skirt of faded print bodice to match and an equally faded but spotlessly clean ruffled sunbonnet. His garb conbsisted of faded blue bib overalls and shirt, but equally spotless. His hat was somewhat nonedescript felt, and was removed when he spoke to us. They paused to ask us if we were attending 'the fiesta'. Apparently there (was some sort of local fair going on toward the center of the city ('en la plaza').

Now there was something else unusual about that plain, humble, but appealingly attractive couple. The man was holding a length of what appeared to be hand-spun rope, attached to the other end by a sort of harness was a pig! He was leading the pig, while his mate urged the animal along with an occasional tap of a willow switch.

Hesitantly, the man asked if we could direct him to 'el matadero' the local slaughterhouse. We apologised for our ignorance, which could be explained by the fact that we lived in Las Maroches, far to the west. But perhaps the lady who was still tending her flowers could help them. With profuse expressions of thanks, they proceeded down the street, the pig complaining now and then. The lady in the flower garden met them at the garden wall, and from her gesticulations it was apparent that she directed them to 'el matadero'. That pig couldn't have weighed in at more than forty pounds, harness, rope and all.

But I can't help but wonder how much the montanero pair got for their pig.
