## FORT WORTH HEADS FOR NOME, ALASKA

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 8 .- The airplane Fort Worth, piloted by Reg Robbins and Harold Jones, passed over Prince George. just before 11:30 a. m. CST today. The plane evidently was making slightly less than 100 miles an hour.

### FLIERS HOP OFF AT 5:59 A. M.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 8 .- Two army fliers with an innovation in transocean flying, started their plane, the Fort Worth, through the fog of early morning today Tokio as the goal of their endeavor.

The men. Reginald Robbins and H. S. Jones, started on a non-trop refueling flight at 5:59 a. m. CST. The new idea in flying was for refueling at Nome, Alaska, taking on there the last gas load before setting out across the vast miles to Japan. They hoped to win large prize money by being the first "ponstoppers" to fly the Pacific from this

Their craft will be refueled Nome by Nick Greener and Jim Mattern who will accompany them the treacherous

stretch from Fairbanks to Nome. The trim little vellow and white monoplane was all ready for the fliers when they arrived at the airport at 3:35 a. m. and the take-off was speedy.

They started warming up the motor of the plane at 5:50 a. m. and eight minutes later lumbered slowly down the runway. The plane was heavy with its load of gasoline which was scheduled to take it 1.600 miles to Fairbanks and it had reached the end of the runway be-






