question but that the violation question but that the violation of this statute has been winked
at too often, and convictions have alwtays drawn sentences inadequate to make the law ef fective. Rarely ever is a case of drunken driving properly docketed by the officers, for the rule has been to charge the offender with "reckless driving, disturbing the peace, drunkenness, or some other offense
that comes under the head of a misdemeanor, punishable by a light fine.
There are two reasons for
