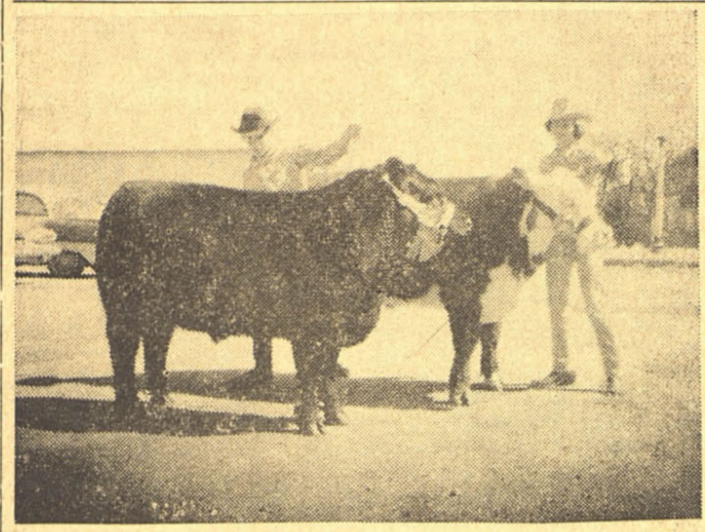

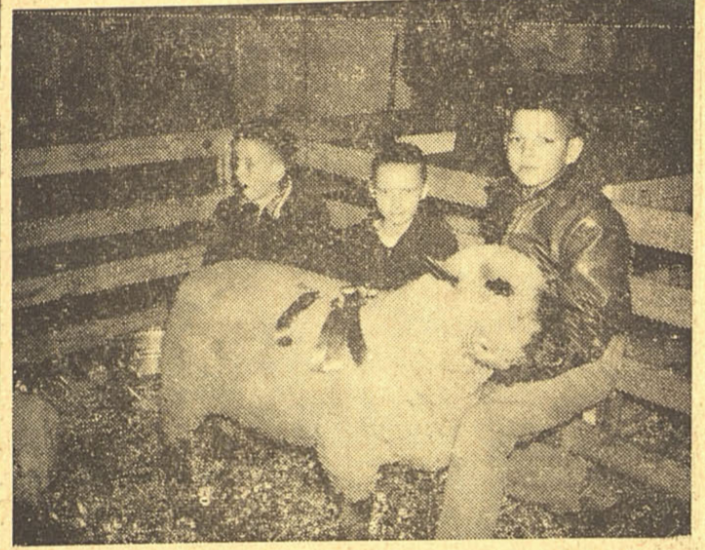

Ivy Ferguson, Cisco 4-H Clubber, showed the grand champion and reserve champion female hogs and the grand champion barrow during swine judging of the Cisco FFA and 4-H Livestock Show here last Friday.

The reserve champion barrow was shown by Darwin Pharr, and Allen Senterfitt, FFA, won the showmanship award in swine judging.

Two 4-Hers, Mike Farnsworth and Lynn Pippen, vied for the award for championship of the steer division Saturday, with Judge W. L. (Dub) Sims, vocational agriculture teacher of Eastland High School, finally giving the nod to Mike's "Jim," an 825 pound Angus. Sims picked Lynn's 900 pound Hereford, named "Ronnie," as reserve champion.

Mike's Angus was bred by Jim Sauls of Cisco, and Lynne's Hereford was from the herd owned by her father, Irvin Pippen. Both will be entered in the Eastland County Livestock Show to be held next Friday and Saturday in Eastland, along with nearly all other animals entered in the Cisco show.

The Ferguson girl, was the top exhibitor in the show, winning the fat lamb competition and showing the grand champion ram. Bill Farnsworth showed the grand champion ewe and reserve mutton lamb.

Ten-year old Brit Ferguson, who showed his sister's crossbred Hamp to the title, won the lamb showmanship award. Ross Honea, FFA, won the showmanship award in steer competition. Awards were provided by County Commissioner C. B. Dill of Precinct 4.

The show secretary, Judy Graham, who is sweetheart of the Cisco FFA Chapter, was assisted by Jeannie Bryant, runnerup in the sweetheart contest.

City Ballot Lists Three Names For Each Vacancy

There will be three candidates for each vacancy on the city commission and one for each place on the board of trustees of the Cisco Public Schools in the regular April elections, officials announced this week after the filing deadlines had passed.

Candidates for city vacancies were listed as follows: Mayor — Douglas Fry, Roy M. Benton and E. L. Jackson; city commission — C. F. Coats, J. W. Slaughter, Carrel Smith, Roy Pippen, Jack Sawyers and Winston Heidenheimer.

City Secretary Hal Lavery reported that there would be a drawing at the regular commission meeting tonight for places on the ballot. Absentee voting will begin Wednesday in the April 6th city election, he added.

There will be no runoffs in the city election as the law provides for the men receiving the most votes to fill the vacancies, Mr. Lavery said. The annual Cisco Public School election will be held at the city hall April 3 to elect three trustees to ballot on a bond assumption question. The three candidates for the vacancies are Richard Moore, Dr. E. E. Addy and Louis Morgan.

The bond assumption ballot will comply with the law for the consolidated Cisco and Scranton districts to assume jointly the bonded debts of both districts.

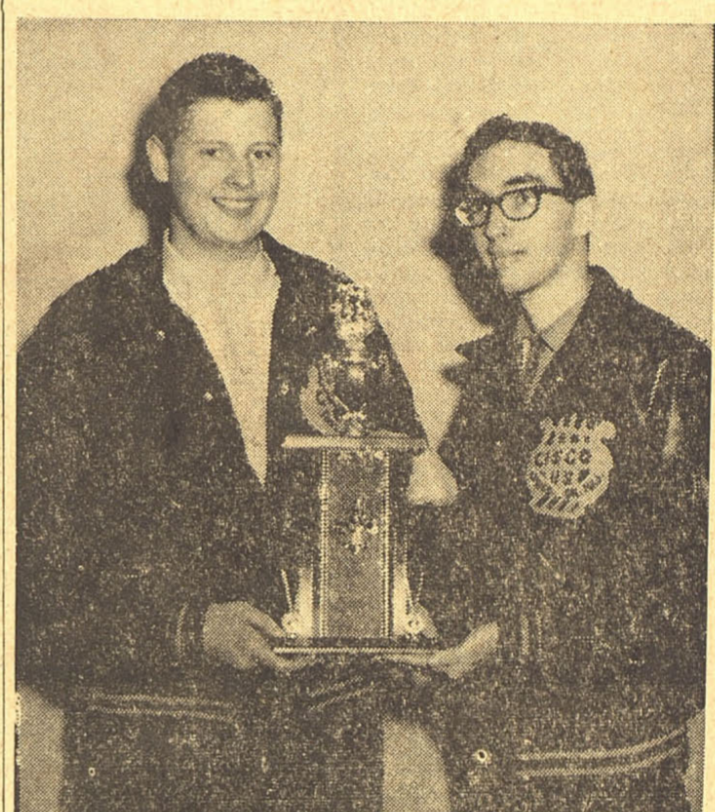

CJC Ends Season With 30-3 Record

The basketball team of Cisco Junior College turned in their uniforms Monday after completing the finest year in the history of the school — 30 victories and three defeats.

The three losses, which were by a combined total of seven points, were costly. The first, last December, was to Wharton in a tournament final; next, Wharton beat Cisco in the finals of the Texas Junior College Athletic Association zone playoff finals, and last Saturday night, Howard County JC of Big Spring scored a 97-to-94 victory in the finals of the Region Five tournament at Amarillo.

The game at Amarillo went an over-time period before Cisco lost the three-point decision. The Wranglers won over New Mexico Military Institute, 79-to-64, in the opening game, and over Decatur Baptist College, 85-to-79, in the second round.

A capacity crowd filled the Amarillo gym for the tournament finals program, which included a game between Ranger and Decatur for 3rd place. Decatur won the contest.

Cisco Junior College had its Wrangler Belles and Band in the stands during the tournament, and the drill team staged a half-time show each night. The Cisco team and student group received good news coverage in the Amarillo newspapers.

Three of the 10 players named to the all-Region Five basketball team were Wrangler players — Harry Gunner, Johnny Sellers and Preston Sheard. Two Wranglers — Sheard and Sellers — made the all region Five NJCAA Tournament team.

Harry Gunner of CJC placed 4th in all-time scoring for the Region Five NJCAA tournament with 69 points in three games. He produced 33 points in the final contest. He was 6th leading scorer in 18 years of Region Five tournament play.

The CJC team was ranked as high and 2nd in the nation one week and finished the season with a national rating of No. 3. The Wranglers were the north zone champions with a 12-0 record and were the TJCAC runnerup as well as the Region Five NJCAA tourney runnerup.

Coach Leland Willis of the Wrangler reported that "I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Cisco for the tremendous backing we have received this year. Without this support we would not have produced as well as we did. We hope that we did not disappoint the people. It was a great disappointment for our players to lose the three games that were important."

"Again, I want to thank the Cisco Boosters Club who sponsored our new uniforms. We were certainly proud to represent Cisco, Texas, in them."
