### Meat Situation Bad But Local People Unhurt

#### NEW YORK EATING HORSE FLESH BUT WE HAVE T-BONES

Advantages Of Small Town Life Again Being Felt By Cross Plains People

Cross Plains people who have for years realized that small town life enjoys innumerable advantages which are not to be found in the larger cities, are again experiencing the correctness of their conclusion. With newspapers daily telling of more and more meat counters over the nation becoming barren, and work being delayed for the lack of protein found in meat diets, Cross Plains people continue to purchase at local markets with very slight differences in what they're always bought. True, bacon is virtually impossible to secure, but whereas, steak has become more extensive throughout much of the nation, Cross Plains stores are still offering their choice of loin, T-bone, seven, porterhouse or round. Large packing houses have virtually no meat to sell in cities throughout the nation local slaughtering is absolutely inadequate to supply demands. Reports say that only a very few are able to buy necessary supplies of meat. Some blame OPA, others say the supply of livestock is inadequate. Through it all, though, Cross Plains stores by depending 98 percent upon home slaughtering are continuing to offer their customers delicious choices in the various varieties of beef and pork.

To keep their stocks complete and supply customers' desires has been no easy matter for proprietors of local markets, nevertheless, any Cross Plains store you visit will be better stocked than the largest meat counters in the principal cities of the United States. The Cross Plains Frozen Food Locker is also proving its worth to the people of this section who have availed themselves to its facilities. Yes, whereas horse meat is being anxiously anticipated in New York City, Cross Plains people are feasting on choice cuts of beef and again thanking their lucky stars for the advantages of small town life.

#### BUFFALOES DEFEAT WILLIAMS 23 TO 0 HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes opened their 1946 football season with a 23 to nothing defeat of the Williams Bulldogs here Friday night. The scoring was launched early in the first quarter when Dock Brown, Buffalo halfback, received a building punt in midfield and raced 50 yards to cross the double stripe for the year's first tally. He also plunged the line for the extra point, putting Cross Plains out in front seven to nothing. The Buffs then kicked off to the visitors who fumbled and lost possession of the ball on their own 30. A sustained drive, featuring Claudell Joy, Buddy Sheehan and Brown advanced the leather to the 11 yard line, from which point W. L. Duprest raced over, on an end around play. The extra point was again added on a plunge through the line with Billy Wayne Lamneck carrying this time. After a scoreless second quarter, Brown again showed his heels to the Williams team with a spectacular 34 yard sprint and the game's third touchdown. Sheehan raced through the middle of the line for the extra point, and Cross Plains was ahead 21 to nothing. From this point on Cross Plains failed to make another running play, allowing the back to the visitors every time they came in possession of the ball. About midway in the fourth quarter, though, the Bulldogs were pushed back to their own two yard stripe from which point an attempted punt was blocked by a swarm of Buffalo linemen. The visitors, however, covered the ball and the tally went to a safety and two points for Cross Plains, making the score 23 to nothing.

From all practical points of view the game might as well have ended at this point, for never again was a scoring threat offered by either team. Williams did unleash a somewhat effective passing attempt but it failed to carry past their own 40 yard line. Every man in playing uniform save service a stellar game. Charles Colburn, 210 pound Buffalo tackle, was by far the most noticeable. His terrific lunges into the visiting backfield besides would-be ball carriers many times before their plays ever got underway. This week end the Buffaloes play May at Rising Star, while Williams plays host to an invasion of the Bangs Dracons.

#### Strike Palo Pinto Lime In Oil Test Of Rowden Area

Oil activity in the Rowden community became sharper this week with possible opening of a new Palo Pinto pay area one mile north for the Martin Properties No. 1 W. N. Foster, 330 feet from the North and West lines of lot 7, block 337, Victoria county school survey. The Palo Pinto lime is a new oil strata test in this section as distinguished from the Strawn sand series, both reached at approximately the same depth. Operators have set pipe on a Palo Pinto show at 2,323 feet after drilling to 2,500 feet. Acidizing is reported to have been completed this week. Royalty purchases on surrounding tracts are reported brisk. C. D. Lane of this city and L. M. White of Ft. Worth have encountered one million feet of gas at a depth of 600 feet on the Buster George place, three miles north of the Octane bulk station between Baird and Putnam. Operators will drill to 700 feet where they expect to reach the lower Tannhill production, which is the same production encountered around Albany. Lane and White spudded in two weeks ago and have been running only daylight hours. Drilling was begun last week on two new wildcats in the county, the Ted H. Ivey and H. F. Burton No. 1 L. J. Gorsuch et ux, 1,650 foot cable tool test five miles north of Clyde and the Hedrick Oil Co. No. 1 R. D. Williams, 2,150 foot cable tool test eight miles northeast of Baird. The Boyd Gillespie No. 3 Tom Windham six miles southeast of Baird has been abandoned dry with no commercial shows to depth of 1,162 feet. No reports have been available on a wildcat well drilling on the Fomy tract near Cross Cut, except that operators have contacted the Ellenburger lime.

#### BUFFALOES TO PLAY MAY FRIDAY NIGHT 5C AIR MAIL GOES INTO EFFECT HERE

Three and possibly four regulars were unable to see service for Coach Hughes team. They are: Larry Adams and Richter, all of whom were unable to play last Friday night, and possibly Claudell Joy, a mainstay in the backfield. Joy sustained a leg injury in practice this week and it is possible that he will see little or no action in the May game. His place will be filled by Buck Gibson freshman letter lugger who gives promise of big things before playing out his string four years hence. Cross Plains' probable starting line-up for the May game will be: Tyler and Duprest at ends, Covert and Lamneck at tackles, Weaver and Siger at guards, Rudolph Brown at center and Dock Brown, Lane Glenn, Buddy Sheehan and either Joy or Gibson in the backfield. By virtue of their 23 to nothing defeat of Williams last week end the Buffaloes are expected to defeat the May team, however, it is remembered that the May team, also has to their credit a victory over Williams this year. The Tigers beat Williams 13 to nothing the first week of the season.

FAILURE TO STOP AND RENDER AID CARRIES THREAT OF PRISON SENTENCE  
Texas highway laws provide penalties for failure of operators of motor vehicles to stop and render aid after colliding with any person or vehicle containing any person. The law requires that the driver of and all individuals in control of the vehicle shall stop and render aid to the person struck or to the occupants of the other vehicle collided with. That assistance shall include the carrying of the injured parties to a physician or surgeon for medical or surgical treatment, if that is needed or if such carrying is requested by the person or occupant struck.

#### SANTA ANNA MAN MOVING IN M'CORD BUILDING ON MAIN

Has 30 Years Experience In Baking Business And Big Plant Modern Throughout  
A big, modern bakery, headed by a man with more than 30 years experience in the business, will open in Cross Plains about the middle of this month. The plant is being brought here by Marvin L. Moore, who has been operating a bakery at Santa Anna, Machinery began arriving in Cross Plains Wednesday morning and is being installed in the McCord building on South Main Street. Mr. Moore visited Cross Plains about 10 days ago and met with local grocers, explaining to them what he had and would bring here. He was given an enthusiastic reception and decided to move his plant here. In a telephone conversation after Monday afternoon Mr. Moore said he had already torn out equipment at Santa Anna and that it would begin arriving here Wednesday. Installation of the machinery will take several days, he informed, and his estimate was that he would be ready for business about the middle of this month. Mr. Moore has had more than 30 years experience in the baking industry, some of which was with the largest concerns in the Southwest. Too, he is known by virtually every baker in this section and has been recommended to the people of Cross Plains as a "baker without a peer". In addition to his bread business, Mr. Moore will operate a large wholesale pastry business, continuing to supply a large route he is now serving throughout the Coleman-Santa Anna area. Cross Plains will again be the only town in Callahan county possessing a bakery, and housewives are urged by merchants and civic groups to support the new local enterprise.



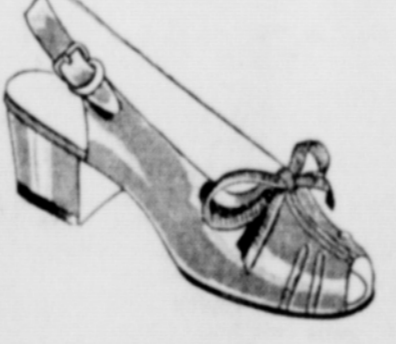

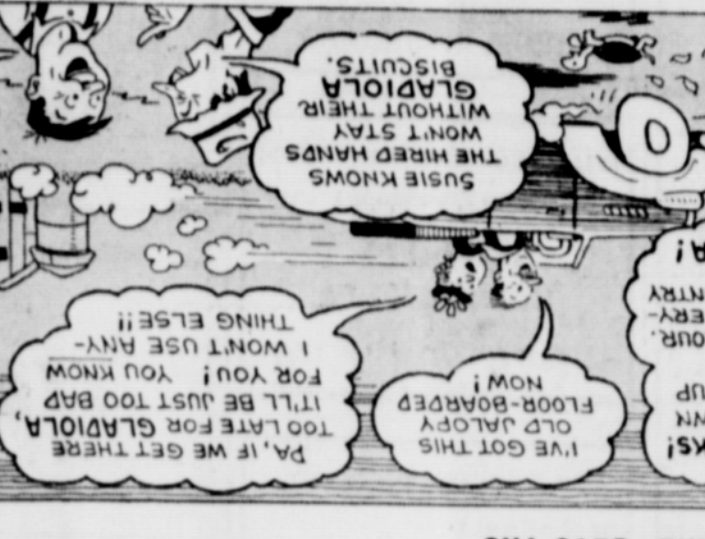

Dr. Cox Advises  
On Winter Disease  
And Its Prevention

Young children may suffer as much from winter illnesses as do from those commonly known as "summer complaints," in the opinion of Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, and his advice to parents is to guard babies and young children against these winter health hazards.

Influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and asthma are included among these diseases which may be dangerous winter illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such disease as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold, they may follow as an after effect of measles or whooping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. These diseases of the respiratory system are more prevalent in winter than in summer and are much more difficult to combat than digestive ailments such as summer complaint.

"These winter diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense," Dr. Cox cautioned, "is to strengthen the powers of resistance against disease; the second is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure they avoid contact with others who have colds, coughs or fevers."

ASK FARM YOUTHS TO  
HELP IN PREVENTING  
HUGE LOSSES BY FIRE

The sharp eyes and keen powers of observation of farm youths are called upon by the National Fire Protection Association, sponsors of Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12, and aid in discovering and getting rid of the common causes of farm fires this week and throughout the year.

Pointing out the authoritative estimates indicate an increase of 22% in property losses from fires during 1946 over an 85 million dollar loss suffered this year, plus the fact that nine out of ten fires are preventable by the use of reasonable care and precaution, the NFPA urged farm youth to enlist in the fight.

The Association declared that many 4-H Clubs have rendered valuable aid in the fight against farm fires and suggested that all 4-H Club members could perform a valuable service to their communities by cooperating with their Co. Agents to learn the common fire hazards on farms and then carrying on a concerted drive to correct them on every farm in their area.

SERIES OF 13 FARM  
BUREAU MEETINGS TO  
BE HELD IN OCTOBER

A series of 13 district Farm Bureau meetings will be conducted throughout the state of Texas during the month of October, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, state Farm Bureau president.

One of the meetings will be held in the Brownwood Hotel at Brownwood on Friday, October 11. Raymond McElrath of Coleman, state director, will preside. The meeting, which will begin at 10:30 A.M., will be attended by Hammond and State Organization Director Marvin Carter.

"The chief job of organized agriculture is to maintain farm prices at a fair exchange level," Hammond said. This was not done following World War I and the result was depression. After the other war farm prices dropped 53 percent. By 1935 two million farmers were foreclosed. Industrial goods dropped only 14 percent.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE OPERATION OF PLACES USED OR MAINTAINED AS JUNK YARDS OR DUMPING GROUNDS, OR FOR THE WRECKING OR DISSEMBLING OF AUTOMOBILES, TRUCKS, TRACTORS OR MACHINERY OF ANY KIND, OR OF ANY OF THE PARTS THEREOF, OR FOR THE ACCUMULATION OF RUBBISH OF ANY DESCRIPTION; PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE; AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS:

Section 1. Hereafter any place used or maintained by any person, partnership, or corporation as a junk yard or dumping ground, or for the wrecking or dissembling of automobiles, trucks, tractors, or machinery of any kind, or for the storing or leaving of worn out, wrecked, or abandoned automobiles, trucks, tractors, or machinery of any kind, or of any of the parts thereof, or for the maintenance or operation of such place for the accumulation of rubbish of any description, is hereby declared to be a public and common nuisance, being obnoxious and offensive to the inhabitants of the City of Cross Plains, because of its interference with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property by said inhabitants, and is prohibited within the city limits of said city, unless the same is conducted in the manner hereafter stated, following the payment of the license fee hereafter prescribed.

Section 2. Any person, partnership, or corporation desiring to use or maintain any property within the City of Cross Plains, Texas, for any of the purpose mentioned in Section 1 hereof, shall make written application to the City Secretary for a license which said application shall set forth the name and address of the applicant and a legal description of the property or premises upon which said business is to be conducted, and the said city secretary shall have the power either to grant or reject such application. If the application is granted, a license to operate such business shall be issued by said city secretary upon the payment of a fee of \$5.00 per annum. Any license so issued shall expire on January 1 next succeeding the date of its issuance, but may be renewed from year to year in like manner as is provided for the original license.

Section 3. Any person, partnership, or corporation granted a license as provided for in Section 2 hereof, shall keep the premises used in the operation and maintenance of said business in a neat and orderly condition. The property and premises upon which such business is conducted shall be enclosed by a tight board fence at least 10 feet high, and said fence shall be kept in a neatly painted condition, and no junk of any character, or parts, or machinery of any kind shall be allowed to remain outside such fence; provided, however, that any existing business of this character now being operated and maintained in the City of Cross Plains shall be allowed six months within which to construct a fence of the kind and character required hereby.

Section 4. The City Council of the City of Cross Plains shall have the power to revoke the license provided for herein at any time for good cause, but only after notice has been given the owner or owners of the business of a hearing to be held not less than ten days after the service of such notice.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the terms and conditions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$100.00. Passed, approved, and adopted, this the 17th day of September, 1946.
