
The remains laid in state at the church until the funeral hour. Funeral services were directed by the Wylie Funeral Home.

The Letter That Was Never Mailed

In a Red Cross folder distributed in Baird this week is the picture of a mother working in the surgical dressing room, making gauze dressings.

As 1942 drew to a close production of these bandages had grown to 500,000 per hour. The Ladies of Baird who worked so faithfully in the surgical dressing room contributed to this supply of dressing.

The following letter was written by one of the million Red Cross production workers to her son, who was "missing in action."

Dear Son:






