3 TRUSTEES AND 2 ALDERMEN MUST BE NAMED BY VOTERS



Nominations May Be Made By Submitting Petition On Which 10 Electors Sign

Two elections confront citizens of Cross Plains during the first week of April. On the first Saturday, April third, three school trustees are to be named. Then the following Tuesday, April sixth, two city aldermen must be chosen.

For the trustee balloting the polls will be located in the office of the Cook Insurance Company on South Main Street, with Mesdames, Bill Wagner, Maggie Cook and John Westerman acting as officials.

Three trustees are to be named. Terms of Porter J. Davis, E. I. Vestal and Edwin Erwin expire at that time. Mr. Erwin has intimated that he will not be a candidate for reelection.

The trustees are chosen for tenures of the following Tuesday the city election is to be held at the city office. Judges for this referendum had not been named as this article was prepared for publication. Terms of Willis J. Brown and H. C. Freeman expire in April.

City aldermen are chosen for two year terms. To nominate a candidate for either alderman or school trustee a petition must be submitted upon which are the signatures of at least 10 qualified electors. Trustee petitions must be filed with C. R. Cook school secretary on or before midnight March 23. In the city election petitions may be presented up to the morning of April 6 at nine o'clock.

Two elections face the electorate of Cross Plains during the first week of April. On the first Tuesday in the month—April 2—two city aldermen are to be chosen then on the following Saturday.
