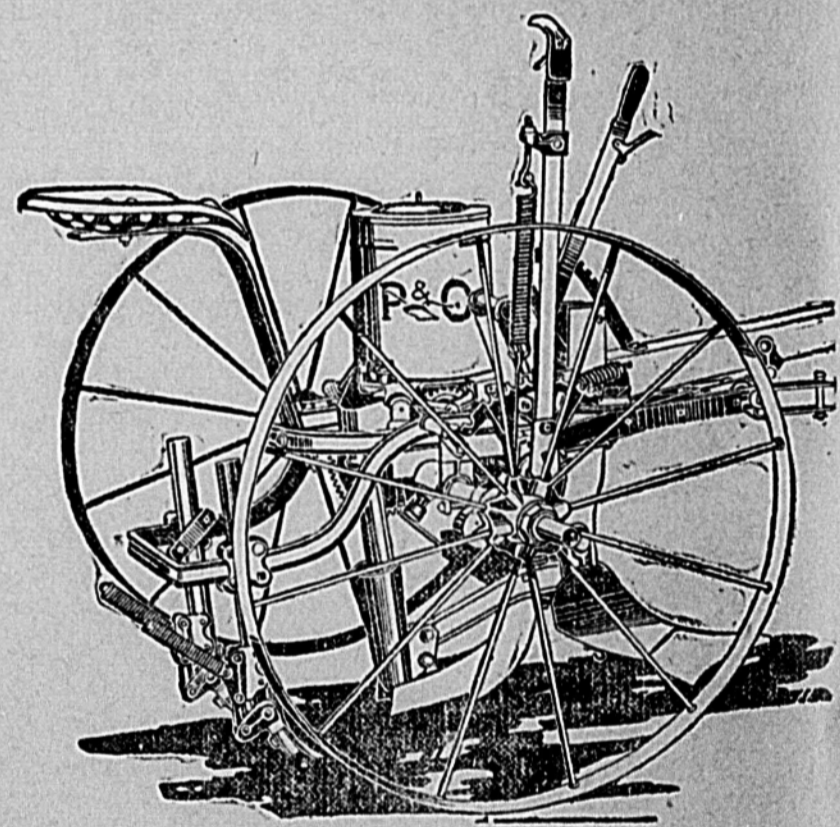

### STOCK RAISERS ASSOCIATION TO BE ORGANIZED

Rising Star X-Ray

That Eastland County raises more stock to the square mile than any of the counties west of us is startling news to most of us. This statement is made by Mr. R. F. Cox, who lives northeast of town, and who was recently made chairman for Eastland County in the temporary organization of a stock association for Eastland, Callahan and Stephens counties. In response to the request of the editor Mr. Cox has given the following statement about this new move:

On Jan. 6th a temporary organization of the counties of Eastland, Callahan and Stephens, met at Cisco in what should be one of the most far reaching organizations in West Texas. At that meeting a number of the best posted live stock men in the West were present, men who know all about the proposition. It was

very interesting to hear their talks.

It is a well known fact that we farmers and stock raisers have slept on our rights. We have been satisfied to raise just any kind of stock. A cow that would bring up a brindle calf every year or so, or an old sow that would raise pigs that would weigh a hundred pounds at twelve months old has been good enough. But let me say now that such old methods will not do any more. The farmer who feeds such stock is on the road to ruin. A new era is at hand. Old methods must go. We had just as well face the present day situation.

The stock association is not a pure bred association. It is a move for better live stock on our farms and ranches. All cannot raise pure bred stock but all can improve on what they do raise. The association is a co-operative move. It will bring better sires into the country, and it will help in buying and selling. The association will hold semi-annual sales at Cisco, and this will be the biggest single feature. It will

be of great importance to the buyer, for he can buy the very best stock knowing that he can sell at sales that are well advertised. Men who know live stock will be at the sales in large numbers and will be willing to pay a fair price for all stock that measures up to the standard.

Our people will soon learn values. No place will better determine values than in the sales ring where hundreds of buyers who know buy at auction. Some of us breeders have felt this need for many years. Other sections have profited by such sales and are today enjoying a splendid success.

Some people say this is no stock country, but a little investigation will show that we raise more stock to the square mile than any county west of us. This idea is largely due to the fact that stock raising is only one of our industries, while in many western counties it is about all they can do. We produce numbers already, but how about the quality? Other sections produce animals that sell readily at from one to ten thousand dollars. They haven't any more intelligence, and most of them not half the opportunity we have.

Will you help put the live stock business in this country where it should be? It so, get busy. The next meeting will be held at Cisco City Hall Feb. 24th at 2 p. m., at which a permanent organization will be perfected and officers elected for the year. Will you be there? You will hear the best of speakers and Cisco will see that you are well entertained.

The only expense to you will be \$1.00 per year for membership. Let every one who is at all interested come in and help us make this a going, growing thing. Leave your name with the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

The completion this week by Crabb, McNeal and Tom Bryant of the McDonough No. 1, located 8 miles southeast of town, and the drilling in of the Newton No. 1, by Gillman et al, has beyond question in the minds of a large number of the oil fraternity opened a new field that is destined to add many laurels to those already won by this locality. The sand carries much resemblance to that found in the Wichita Falls district, differing principally in color, being somewhat lighter shade than that of the Red River country. The oil is a very high gravity, testing above 41, thereby commanding the top price under the grading schedule.

An estimate of the actual production of either of the new wells is very hard to obtain as neither has been completed, that of Gillman et al, being some four feet in the sand and standing well up in oil but without sufficient gas to flow. The completion of this well has been greatly hampered by trouble with water encountered several feet up the hole above the pay and which did not shut off when the 100 inch pipe was run which has necessitated under-reaming and delayed drilling farther into the pay, though experienced operators place the well in the 100 barrel class when finished. The McDonough No. 1, of Crabb, McNeal and Tom Bryant which touched the pay Saturday, immediately showing oil, was shut down over Sunday waiting on a string of 6 inch casing and without further drilling began flowing Monday afternoon while the pipe was being run, the first flow lasting 40 minutes and was followed by a similar flow about 5 hours later and has been flowing at intervals of five to eight hours since though only 4 feet in the top of the sand, which was found at 1315 feet. This well shows but little gas and its flows favor more of the artesian nature than the spectacular action where gas is more abundant, the fluid rising only a few feet above the top of the casing. Tankage is being moved in and the well will perhaps be completed today and its actual production then ascertained, present estimate placing it from 75 to 150 barrels.

Many new locations are now being made in that locality though well scattered over a scope some two or three miles in extent. McCamey-Sheerin associated with F. W. Stone & Co. on the M. Wright No. 1, are reported still fishing for 10 inch casing which parted when attempts were made to raise it to under-ream.

East of town the Pennant Co. are drilling at 1200 feet on the No. 3, Albin and the Gooch No. 9, of Keough Bros. is reported on the pay preparing to drill in.

It is now reliably reported that a location is being made some distance west of the Acker well of G. O. Moore and will start work immediately.

Oil showed another 10c advance last week bringing the present posted price to \$2.50 on the high grade crude of this section and with the apparent opening of the Cross Cut country to big drilling at once and with more drilling in sight between Cross Plains and Pioneer the coming weeks promise much in new developments in this section.

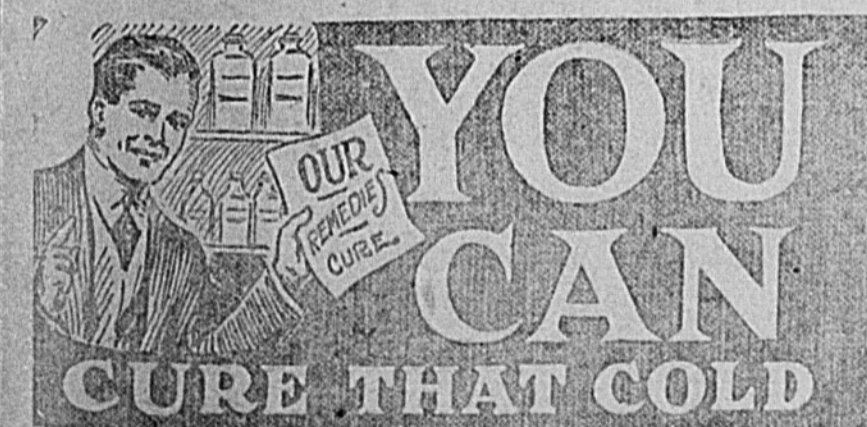

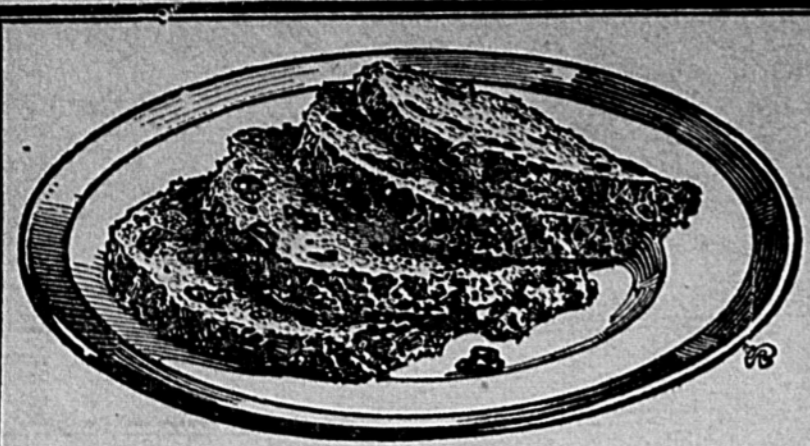

## 122 MINERS ENTOMBED BY BLAST

Hundreds of Women and Children Gather at Pit While Guards Keeping Order.

Dawson, N. M.—A terrific explosion that rocked the workings of coal mine No. 1 of the Phelps-Dodge Corporation here entombed 122 miners working inside. Two bodies have been recovered and a statement given out by the company declared "we don't know whether the men in the mine are alive or not."

The explosion tore away all of the heavy concrete work at the mouth of the main entry.

Within a short time after the blast, rescue workers had cleared the debris from the mouth of the mine and a rescue crew, led by W. D. Brennan, general manager of the mine, entered.

The interested miners are believed to be about 6,000 feet from the portal of the mine.

The explosion did not wreck the mine fan and ventilation soon was established.

The cause of the explosion is a mystery. A statement by the company declared the mine was well sprinkled and not gaseous.

The explosion is the second in Phelps Dodge property here, a similar accident in mine No. 2, wipled out 263 lives in 1913.

While company's workers who volunteered for rescue duty were continuing their efforts the United States Bureau of Mines started a rescue car here from Hanna, Wyo., and a second car sent by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, was on the way from Trinidad, Colo.

Almost before the reverberation from the explosion had ended, scores of women and children, members of the families of the miners, ran to the mouth of the property. Weeping for their loved ones inside, they pressed forward about the cordon of guards formed in front of the mouth of the mine. The guards kept them back so that the work of the rescue parties would not be hampered.

Mine No. 1 at Dawson is owned by the Phelps-Dodge Corporation. Calls for help have been dispatched to the St. Louis Rock Mountain and Pacific Mining Company at Raton.

The mine where the disaster is reported to have occurred is the largest in the Dawson district. It was the scene of an explosion in 1913, in which many miners lost their lives.

## BRITIAN IGNORES TURKISH ORDERS

Military Maneuvers Are Playing Part in Game of Bluff Now Being Waged.

London—The Turks are strongly fortifying the coast at Smyrna, six inch guns are being mounted on the south side of the gulf, where the shallow waters force ships eastward or leaving the harbor to hug the shore. British authorities have forbidden English subjects to enter the city of Smyrna.

Constantinople—The Near Eastern powder keg is perilously near the fire according to press dispatches.

Advices here stated that the British war vessels in Smyrna harbor were to "stand fast" and the allied commissioners warned the Turks that grave consequences would ensue if the Turkish guns opened fire from the Smyrna fortifications at the expiration of the ultimatum.

It was pointed out here that refusal of the British ships to withdraw as demanded, if accompanied by a Turkish cannonade or other form of coercion, would certainly result in a return volley or other proper response on the part of the British men of war.

In case untoward events in the Smyrna Harbor precipitate a war, the Turks, it is generally believed, would gain considerably in the first stages of the conflict.

The British would have to refrain from boring deeper into Turkish territory because that would necessitate the use of at least a half million troops, which would take months perhaps to transport from England and her colonies to the Near East.

Greece, it is anticipated, would come to the aid of England, as the Hellenic Nation is still anxious for revenge because of the rout of her armies by the Turks last summer.

The great danger in the situation lies in the possibility that Russia, Poland, Roumania, Jugo-Slavia and Bulgaria would join in such a conflict.

It is known that the Turks can bring 300,000 troops into the field. A large army is now concentrated at Diarbekr under Djavad Pasha, a Turkish General who distinguished himself at Gallipoli. Diarbekr is within two days' marching distance of Mosul, the rich oil territory which is held by Britain under mandate of the League of Nations.

Since the British only have a garrison of about 1,200 men in Mosul, there is little question but what the Turks could wipe out such a small force before English or Greek reinforcements could come to the rescue.

## THE VIEWS ON ALIEN PROPERTY DIFFER

House Members Report On Enemy Goods That Had Been Seized During War.

Washington.—Differences among members of the House Interstate Commerce Committee on the question of whether enemy alien property seized by the American Government during the war should be held as security for the payment of claims of American citizens against the former enemy countries found expression in majority and minority reports filed in the House.

The majority report declared that until Germany, Austria and Hungary made "suitable provision" for satisfying the claims of Americans for damages growing out of the war the committee was not warranted in recommending the return of a greater amount of the alien property held by the United States than the \$10,000 of each trust proposed in the administration bill. This measure was favorably reported to the House.

On the other hand the minority report, signed by Representatives Rayburn, Texas; Huddleston, Alabama; Johnson, Mississippi; and Hawes, Missouri, all Democrats, declared the "confiscation" of private property for such a purpose would "violate the usages of civilized Nations and every tradition of our Government from its very beginning."

The "plain question before Congress" the report added, "was whether it would support the march of civilization or support Secretary Hughes in his demand that private property shall be held and used for the payment of a public debt."

**Appeal Dismissed.**  
Austin, Texas.—Because the record was not in proper form, the Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed appeal in the case of T. E. Isaenbaugh et al., from Limestone County, convicted of unlawfully exhibiting a dancing performance by women.

**Fruit Crop Not Hurt.**  
Weatherford, Texas.—Reports from the fruit growers of Parker County show that the recent cold weather has not hurt the fruit crop.

**Cattle Die During Cold Weather.**  
Shreveport, La.—The recent snow and sleet storm, the worst here since 1898, proved fatal for a number of cattle in Caddo Parish, according to reports reaching the office of Hal M. Gatt, tick eradication inspector. According to the reports thirty-five head of cattle in this parish perished from effects of the cold, and Inspector Gatt said he was confident many more had not reported to him had died from the same cause.

**Parish Free From Quarantine.**  
Shreveport, La.—Tick-free cattle for South Texas ranches for stock purposes are being shipped from Caddo Parish at the rate of a car load daily, and have been since Jan. 1. Hal M. Gatt, in charge of tick eradication work, announced. This is the only parish in North Louisiana that enjoys the privilege of release from Federal quarantine, Inspector Gatt said.

## AMERICAS LAST TROOPS HOME FROM WAR

Notable Welcome Accorded Returning Veterans At Savannah Georgia.

Savannah, Ga.—America's "last thousand" have returned home from Europe, signaling the Nation's closing action in its participation in the World War.

From the deck of the United States army transport St. Mihel, the soldiers who kept watch on the Rhine gained their first glimpse of their home land after an absence of five years. With them were French, Belgian and German wives and children, who saw for the first time the land they are to call home.

Savannah turned out en masse to welcome home in behalf of America the returning troops and to greet the women and children from the country's former allies and enemy Nations.

The reception began when the cutter Yamacraw and the tug McCauley met the transport beyond Tybee bar. At quarantine a party of Congressmen, Governor Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia, Mayor Paul E. Bearbrook and other State and local officials and army officers boarded the St. Mihel from the cutter.

As the transport neared Savannah she was greeted by a salvo from two historic cannons presented to the Chatan Artillery by George Washington and from a battery of French 75s, trophies of the World War. The soldiers answered each blast with cheers. Bells, whistles and sirens throughout the city and in rivers craft took up the cry.

Spectators scattered along a mile and a half of water front kept pace with the transport as she sped up the river.

**Resolution On Display of Flags.**  
Austin, Texas.—The House concurrent resolution providing for the Governor calling for the display of the United States flag at school buildings and at the homes of people on Mother's Day, has been adopted.

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# WAIT FOR ISMET IS FERID BEY'S ADVICE

THINKS THE SITUATION WILL CHANGE ON HIS ARRIVAL AT ANGORA.

# EVERYTHING QUIET AT SMYRA

Moslems Insist That Foreign Warships Shall Leave, French Commissioner Is Informed.

Angora.—The Turkish National Assembly has rejected all the terms of the Lausanne Near Eastern peace treaty, which was drafted by the allies after three months of negotiations.

Paris.—"Wait until Ismet Pasha reaches Angora," is the suggestion of Ferid Bey, Turkish representative here, concerning affairs in the Near East.

Not only is Ismet Pasha favorable to a milder policy than the majority of the Angora Turks, it was explained, but also as soon as he reaches the Capitol he will automatically resume active direction of the Foreign Office, which, during his absence in Lausanne, was under Reouf Bey, who is generally regarded as extreme in tendencies.

Referring to reports that the Turks are being backed financially by the Russians and Germans, Ferid Bey said he was reminded of the Turkish proverb: "If a bald man had any hair he would keep it for himself."

Premier Poincare has decided to comply with the request of the relations committee of the Chamber of Deputies to appear before it and explain the Near East and other situations. No date for the Premier's appearance has yet been fixed.

Constantinople.—The Turkish commander at Smyrna has referred the allied note of protest against the ultimatum ordering warships of the entente out of the Smyrna harbor to the National Assembly at Angora.

It is expected that allied representatives and Turkish officials at the Moslem capital will negotiate regarding the present situation. Admiral Mark Bristol, American commander, from Sausanna, is expected to take part in the deliberations inasmuch as the ultimatum of the Turks was addressed to America as well as the allies.

The Komalatt representative here informed the French High Commissioner that the Angora Government insists that all allied warship leave the Smyrna harbor and that Turkey disclaims all responsibility if the order is not obeyed.

# THINKS INCOME TAX BILL WILL BE KILLED

Same Fate Predicted For Soft Drink Tax Measure.

Austin, Texas.—According to Representative Culp of Bell County, member of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, that committee has practically finished its work for the session and will kill both the income tax bill and that to impose a tax on soft drinks of all kinds. They are the only bills remaining with the committee, all of the other numerous tax bills having been reported favorably or killed.

A subcommittee consisting of Messrs. Culp, Smith of Travis and Simpson was appointed to prepare a substitute for the soft drink tax bill and has agreed on changes; "but the bill will be reported adversely," Mr. Culp declared.

As originally drawn, the bill imposed a tax of 1c on each 10c collect in the sale of all fountain drinks, bottled or otherwise, sherbets, ice cream and puddings, mineral waters, Coca-Cola, near-beer and all others. The substitute would change this basis to a straight occupation tax on the merchant or dispenser of soft drinks, based on his receipts, graduated upward as the business increased.

"But that would be too small and require too much bookkeeping, besides already imposing numerous taxes," said Mr. Culp, "and, as changed I am sure the bill will be adversely reported."

Judge Culp said he has made a poll of the committee as to the State income tax bill; that he found fifteen unequivocally opposed to it, six doubtful and four who might vote for it, though they did not definitely express themselves either way.

Consular Bill Passed By House. Washington.—The administration bill providing for the consolidation of the diplomatic and consular services has been passed by the House.

Siphon 100 Barrels of Whisky. Baltimore, Md.—Digging a tunnel 150 feet long and three feet wide from a cellar of a house to the warehouse of the Stewart Distilling Company's plant, in Highland Town, a suburb, a band of liquor thieves, with the aid of a rubber hose as a "pipe line" and a suction pump siphoned more than 100 barrels of whisky. The robbery was discovered when police, acting on a tip from an unknown source, forced an entrance into the dwelling on South Street.

PARTY PUBLICITY HIDES DISSENSION

NOTHING FROM HEADQUARTERS IN WASHINGTON TELLS OF THE DIVISION ON POLICIES.

BUT MANY OF THESE EXIST

Republicans Opposed to Renomination of President Harding Working for State Primary Legislation—Col. House Cheers the Democrats.

By EDWARD B. CLARK

Washington.—Lest someone should forget it, let it be said that in Washington "we always have politics with us."

There are plenty of innuendoes, charges and things intended to be real information, emanating day by day from the offices of the political chieftains.

Naturally enough, no one gets anything from Republican headquarters concerning the marked differences of opinion on legislation which exist between the so-called progressives and the so-called conservatives within the halls of congress.

It is perfectly true that in the ranks of Republicanism, as in the ranks of Democracy, there are friends of the League of Nations proposition, and there are more friends of some kind of a plan for straightening out the affairs of Europe, but the divided schools of thought are unable to exploit their views by means of headquarters' propaganda because doing it would disclose the fact of the division of sentiment.

Scheme of Harding Opponents. Just now it is known that the leaders of one element of Republicanism are endeavoring to secure from the legislatures of six or seven states which are in session this winter the enactment of presidential primary legislation.

It also should be said that Republican leaders in the house and senate, the administration leaders, think that they can iron out between now and June, 1924, such wrinkles of difference as there may be between them and the beloved ones who disagree with them, and that therefore all will be harmonious in the national convention and that, if seemingly he shall deserve it, President Harding will get his renomination without trouble.

Nursing Factional Disputes. Democratic leaders in Washington, while they say nothing about differences in their own party, are paying great attention to the differences in the party of the opposition.

Col. E. M. House, who for years was a close friend and adviser of former President Woodrow Wilson, has come out of semi-retirement to express a hopeful view of the Democratic future.

Party Publicity Ignores Dissension. There are as yet no signs that worry is departing from official circles in the capital over the French invasion of the Ruhr valley with its possible and even probable consequences.

There are all sorts of views in the European proceedings in Washington. One of them is that nothing can be done to avert troubles in the future which shall be worse than the troubles of the present except a revision of the Versailles treaty.

This suggestion of a revision of the Versailles pact with the United States as a participant, of course, is a good one or a bad one, according to the viewpoint. One trouble is that nothing of the kind can be attempted without the sanction of the senate, and possibly without the sanction of both the senate and the house.

Of course if such a thing as the revision of the Versailles treaty is undertaken, the other nations must concur, but there still is a feeling in Washington that the other nations will do anything that the United States would like to have done short of an actual surrender of their seeming rights in the case.

It is probable that no partisanship can be discovered in the statement that for five years the United States has been going to do something to help Europe, and for five years it has done nothing. Politicians have prevented anything like participation in the endeavors of the European governments to arrive at post-war understandings.

A Republican President when he was a candidate for office suggested the beauty of an association of nations. Nothing has been done to forward such an association and the reason unquestionably has been the known opposition within the ranks of the Republican party in congress to anything of the kind.

It has been somewhat irritatingly amusing through the months and the years to listen to senators and others in Washington as they have preached from the text of "Let something be done," and then haven't been able to suggest anything to be done which could secure the support of enough of their colleagues to give it sanction, or support from any element large enough in the American community to make it appear that the country was willing.

To change the figure of speech a little, it can be said today there have been a multitude of doctors, no two of whom seemingly have been able to agree on what should be done to cure or to give even temporary relief to the European patient.

Politicians here are worrying over the present situation. They know that Europe is worse off than ever and they know that nothing the leaders of either party has suggested has been put to the test for trial.

He brought home a number of films of his recent official tour of the French colonies in northern Africa, and it is now one of his greatest pleasures to watch, in one of the big reception rooms of the Elysee, the screen representation of his travels.

The Yaqui, if not at fault, was very uncertain. His falcon eyes searched and roved, and became fixed at length at the southwest, and toward this he turned his horse.

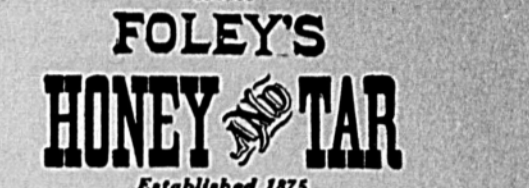
In the basins between the ridges, to right and left along the floor of low plains the mirage glistened, wavered, faded, vanished—lakes and trees and clouds.

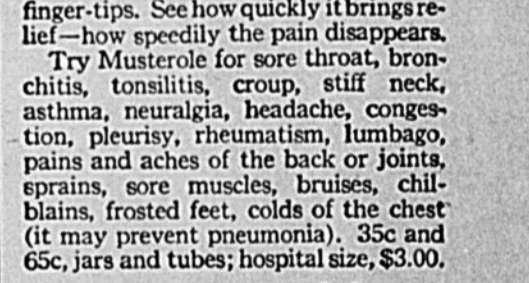

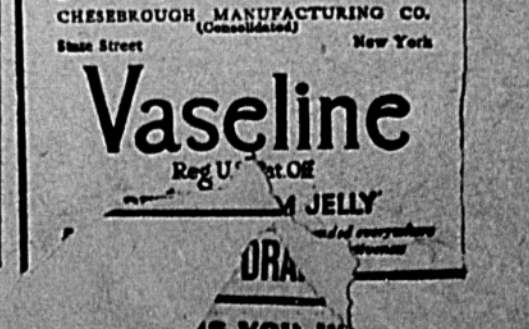

#### LOCOMOTIVE "CARBURETOR"

An automatic device which it is estimated can save nearly 400 of the 2,000 tons of coal used every year by each of the 65,000 locomotives in the United States is being tested at the Purdue university locomotive laboratory by Prof. Harry R. Rubenkenig.

#### WHEN HAIR "STANDS ON END"

Scientific Explanation of Feeling Most People Have Experienced at Some Time.

While the expression "hair standing on end" is merely a figure of speech, the fact remains that this is one of the involuntary effects of sudden terror. Such reactions cannot be controlled except by a prolonged effort of the will, for they are the natural way in which certain muscles of the body act under certain influences.

Each individual hair has a tiny muscle at its root which, in the ordinary way, keeps the hair lying flat on the head or in whatever position we have trained it to grow. The sensation of fright transmits a message from the brain to these muscles, and they pull tight, causing a feeling on the scalp as if the hairs were standing bolt upright.

In the case of short-haired animals, the hairs will rise at the slightest provocation—a provision of nature which enables them to appear larger than they really are, and thus frighten their enemies.

#### EDISON OF ANCIENT GREECE

Inventor Who Was Apprentice Also Made Machines to Operate by Putting Coin in Slot.

An old Greek experimenter of Alexandria was working on a steam engine invention 150 years before the Christian era. He had an apprentice named Hero.

Hero constructed the first steam turbine engine, which was of the reactionary type, but for all that it would spin like a top.

He also invented a steam whistle and a pneumatic blower by which he could sound trumpets and organ pipes in a way that mystified his public.

Hero also made temple doors open and close mysteriously by use of compressed air and pistons. He made a fountain which is still a philosophic toy known by his name.

He made the first machines to be put in operation by inserting a coin in a slot and a "dioptric of spying tube," which was the forerunner of the modern spyglass and opera-glass.

#### LUMBER WASTE UTILIZED

Only a few years ago the amount of waste in the lumber industry was appalling. From the time of cutting down a tree until it reached the condition for the consumer much more than half of it was wasted. Bogalusa, La., is the greatest lumber city in the world and there are establishments there to make use of nearly all the material that has been rejected in the course of the operation of dressing lumber. There are factories for using the odds and ends of wood, others engaged in the extraction of turpentine and other materials from the wood and mills for making pulp from parts which have not been otherwise made use of.

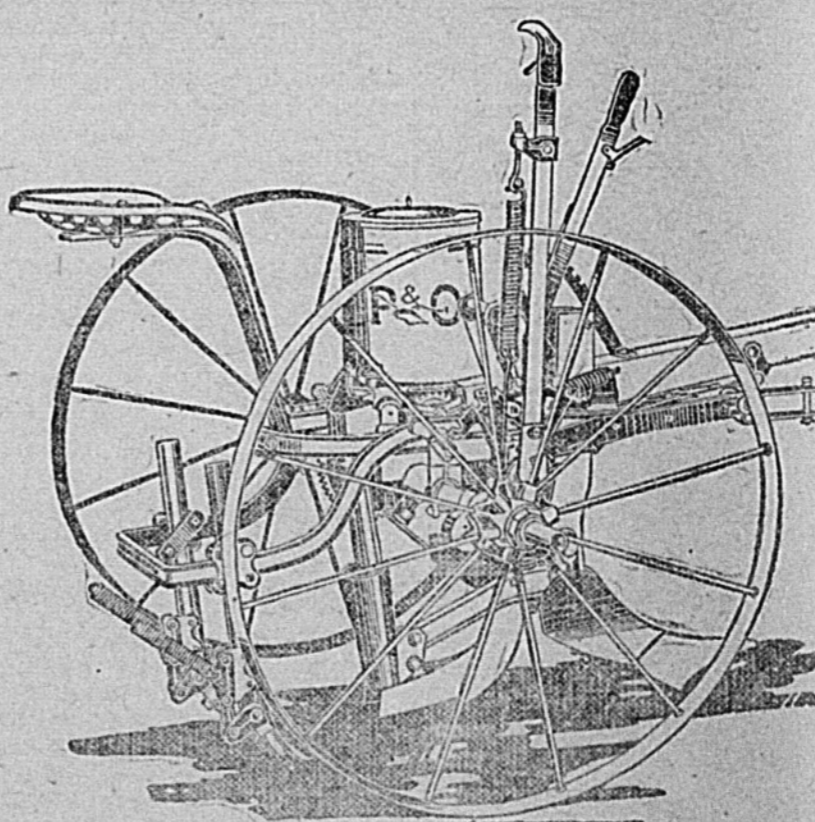
