
Miller agreed they were high. But everything else is high, too, these days, he said.

The federal government, in its grants to hospitals in war-emer-gency areas, required the hospitals to become non-profit institutions which would admit all patients re-gardless of creeds, color or nation-

Roy Hallum, Socialized medicine, he said, breeds hypochrondia; those who do not actually need medical treatment rush to the doc-tor on the slightest provocation simply because they're paying for it and it is human nature to want to get the full value from our nearbox.

Millions would bespent in ad-ministration of socialized medi-cine and there would be the red tape usually associated with gov-ernment control.

Difficulty in securing nurses was told by Miss Agnes King, sup-erintendent of nurses. Private hos-pitals simply cannot compete with civil service and the armed servi-ces in the matter of pay and other benefits and Memorial Hospital has resorted to attempts to train local resorted to attempts to train local girls under the supervision of reg-istered nurses.





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

A Yes, The Veterans Administra-tion makes contracts with approved schools and will pay for acredited courses, but no subsistence allow-ances will be naid.




