New Law Cuts **Candidate Crop**

1956 is election year in Callahan County, however, as a re sult of statutes enacted by the legislature, there will be fewer officials to choose than ever be-

The new law extending county offices for tenures of four years, instead of two as heretofore, will cause only a part of Callahan County's official family to stand for re-election.

To be elected this year are: a sheriff, county commissioners from precincts one and three, and county attorney. Holding over for another two years and slated to come up for election in 1958 are the places of: county clerk, county treasurer, county superintendent of public instruction, county judge, county commissioners from precincts two and four, and district clerk.
