Keystone Peanut And Grain Thresher



The vines or straw are moved to the rear of machine by a series of rakes or "Fingers". Peanuts and small parts of vines are separated from the long vines, and pass to the cleaning fan below. UNUSUALLY WIDE CYLINDER THROAT

The aprons, made of sections of wood, prevent the vines from flying through and cause all the vines to fall to the bottom of the separator and to be worked through agitators, so that all must pass through the full length of the machine and receive the thorough shaking that insures the saving of nuts or grain.

THE LONG PERFORATED PAN

Note the long perforated pan under the stirrers. The nuts as they are separated from the vines drop through this onto the pan below. Sticks, vines and other large pieces, however, cannot get through these holes, but pass over with the hay. The grain or nuts falling through the bottom onto the pan are carried clear to the front, this bottom pan working backward and forward and bringing them to the front of th sieves, so that they have the full surface of the sieves to work over just as though they had been separated right at the cylinder.

THE TOP CHAFFER


From the lower pan the nuts roll onto a top chaffer. This further assists in taking out all vines, twigs sticks, etc., and carries this litter out of the machine; any nuts that may be carried with it being dropped through the fingers into the tailings spout at the back of the machine.

BEHIND THE CYLINDER

The nuts that drop into the tailings spout are picked up by the tailings elevator and are carried through the machine again. On ordinary machines these are carried up and passed into the cylinder where, inasmuch as they are not protected by the vines, they are usually smashed. On the Keystone, however, they are delivered into the machine behind the cylinder, thus avoiding the danger of cracking.



State Health Man Discusses Trench Mouth

Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, has released some interesting information concerning Vincent's angina which was commonly called "trench mouth" during World War I.

Dr. Cox states that Vincent's angina is a specific infection producing inflamatory condition of the mucous membranes, more commonly those of the mouth, and the disease is spread by indirect as well as direct contact. "Because of the readiness with

which this disease is transmitted. it has been occasionally found in epidemic form among school children and other groups," Dr. Cox states. "Vincent's angina assumed epidemic proportions in the front line trenches in 1914-1918 and it was during this period that the disease became generally known as trench mouth Although trench mouth is no

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

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

Points To Use For Success In Freezing Foods

Many people have vegetables and fruit in abundance now. Quick reezing is one of the most desirable nethods of preserving most foods. If food is properly processed, packaged, and stored, quick-freezing resins practically the same flavor. olor, texture and nutritive value of the original foods.

Five Points To Success In Freezing 1. Fruits and vegetables to be

rozen should be of the right variety and at the right stage of maturity. The animal should be fat, properly killed, dressed, chilled, and aged. 2. Cleanliness is the first rule. The nain precaution should be to preent germs from getting in the food. Freezing does not destroy all erms, but it prevents their growth Speed in preparation is essential This is especially important with egetables and fish. Promptness in andling, chilling, and freezing any product helps retain quality.

Be accurate in observing direc ions. Follow the proper treatment or the food you are peparing. 3. A moisture-vapor-proof contain er or wrapping should be used. The ore nearly air-tight the package , the longer the product will keep without losing flavor, food value color and without changing text

4. Quick freeze foods or 20 degrees F. in moving air. Freeze proluces changes to a minimum which results in better quality food. 
