Wildlife Service. It was established in 1935 as a watering area for migratory waterfowl. It is the oldest National Wildlife Refuge in Texas.

The male adult sandhill crane may weigh as much as fourteen and three-fourths pounds while the female will weigh around ten pounds.

Color of the bird is an overthers edged with white. On many adult birds, mineral salts in the waters of their nesting areas thers with a rusty brown color. The forepart of the head of adults of both sexes is bright

Both sexes of cranes are similar in their plumage and may not be distinguished, except by trained persons after close examination.

Only minor success has been reported in shooting the wily bird. Patience is required to hunt the crane and stealth must be there as it is extremely difficult to get near the bird.
